5. Summary: Makes a number of changes, including requiring that the court records for certain sexual misdemeanors be retained for 50 years rather than 10 years; allowing access to juvenile court and records of the Department of Juvenile Justice; addressing challenges to filing defects, including defendants under the Commitment Review Committee; allowing access to sealed records; extending from 60 to 90 days the time for a probable cause hearing and allowing the respondent to waive his right to such hearing; setting a standard for the court to find probably cause; and extending from 90 to 120 the number of days after the probable cause hearing for conduct of the trial.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** The enrolled bill strikes changes in the introduced bill that would have included revisions to §37.2-903.B removes "bodily harm" from the Static-99 threshold which would increase the number of prisoners eligible for Commitment Review Committee (CRC) evaluation. The elimination of "bodily harm" was expected to have some minimal costs to the Virginia Center for Behavioral Rehabilitation, however the enrolled bill will have no fiscal impact.

The anticipated costs to state and local correctional facilities cannot be accurately projected with the data available, but are expected to be minimal.
