4. Title: Admission of in-state students at public institutions of higher education

- 5. Summary: Provides that the board of visitors or other governing body of each public institution of higher education must establish rules and regulations requiring that, beginning with the incoming freshman class of 2010, at least 70 percent of students admitted to the institution be Virginia domiciles. State funds must be withheld from any institution that does not fulfill the 70 percent requirement.
- **6. Fiscal Impact Estimates:** Preliminary. See Line 8.
- 7. **Budget Amendment Necessary:** Yes. If this policy is adopted, the six affected institutions would require additional general fund support.
- **8. Fiscal implications:** Currently, six institutions of higher education fall below 70 percent of in-state students in the freshman classes. See table below:

Per § 4-2.01 b.3.b) of Chapter 879, the 2008 Appropriation Act, the state share of educational costs for in-state students should seek to fund 67 percent from the general fund and 33 percent from tuition and fees, while out-of-state students are supported 100 percent from nongeneral funds.

If these six institutions were required to increase in-state students in freshman classes in order to reach an in-state ratio of 70 percent, it would cost the Commonwealth an additional \$5.9 million in general fund appropriations to support the increased in-state student enrollment starting in FY2010-11. The table also shows that institutions will lose tuition revenue by switching enrollment from out-of-state to in-state students. Given that the additional general fund can cover only a portion of the lost revenue under this proposal, it is likely that these institutions would need to increase their tuition and fees to cover the difference.
