7	A BILL to amend and reenact § 2.2-2905 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Title 32.1 a chapter numbered 17, consisting of sections numbered 32.1-370 through
8	32.1-379, relating to the creation of the Virginia Network for Geospatial Health Research Authority.
9	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That § 2.2-2905 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia
11	is amended by adding in Title 32.1 a chapter numbered 17, consisting of sections numbered
12	32.1-370 through 32.1-379, as follows:
13 14	§ 2.2-2905. Certain officers and employees exempt from chapter. The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to:
15	1. Officers and employees for whom the Constitution specifically directs the manner of selection;
16	2. Officers and employees of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals;
17	3. Officers appointed by the Governor, whether confirmation by the General Assembly or by either
18	house thereof is required or not;
19 20	4. Officers elected by popular vote or by the General Assembly or either house thereof;
20 21	5. Members of boards and commissions however selected;6. Judges, referees, receivers, arbiters, masters and commissioners in chancery, commissioners of
$\frac{21}{22}$	accounts, and any other persons appointed by any court to exercise judicial functions, and jurors and
$\overline{23}$	notaries public;
24	7. Officers and employees of the General Assembly and persons employed to conduct temporary or
25	special inquiries, investigations, or examinations on its behalf;
26 27	8. The presidents, and teaching and research staffs of state educational institutions;
27 28	9. Commissioned officers and enlisted personnel of the National Guard and the naval militia; 10. Student employees in institutions of learning, and patient or inmate help in other state

30	11. Upon general or special authorization of the Governor, laborers, temporary employees and
31	employees compensated on an hourly or daily basis;
32	12. County, city, town and district officers, deputies, assistants and employees;
33 34	13. The employees of the Virginia Workers' Compensation Commission; 14. The officers and employees of the Virginia Retirement System;
35	15. Employees whose positions are identified by the State Council of Higher Education and the
36	boards of the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, The Science Museum of Virginia, the
37	Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation, the Frontier Culture Museum of Virginia, the Virginia Museum of
38	Natural History, the New College Institute, the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center, and The
39 40	Library of Virginia, and approved by the Director of the Department of Human Resource Management
40 41	as requiring specialized and professional training; 16. Employees of the State Lottery Department;
42	17. Production workers for the Virginia Industries for the Blind Sheltered Workshop programs;
43	18. Employees of the Virginia Commonwealth University Health System Authority;
44	19. Employees of the University of Virginia Medical Center. Any changes in compensation plans for
45	such employees shall be subject to the review and approval of the Board of Visitors of the University of
46 47	Virginia. The University of Virginia shall ensure that its procedures for hiring University of Virginia Medical Center personnel are based on merit and fitness. Such employees shall remain subject to the
48	provisions of the State Grievance Procedure (§ 2.2-3000 et seq.);
49	20. In executive branch agencies the employee who has accepted serving in the capacity of chief
50	deputy, or equivalent, and the employee who has accepted serving in the capacity of a confidential
51	assistant for policy or administration. An employee serving in either one of these two positions shall be
52 53	deemed to serve on an employment-at-will basis. An agency may not exceed two employees who serve in this example appacitut
53 54	in this exempt capacity; 21. Employees of Virginia Correctional Enterprises. Such employees shall remain subject to the
5 4 55	provisions of the State Grievance Procedure (§ 2.2-3000 et seq.);
56	22. Officers and employees of the Virginia Port Authority;
57	23. Employees of the Virginia College Savings Plan;
58	24. Directors of state facilities operated by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental

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60 § 37.2-707. Such employees shall remain subject to the provisions of the State Grievance Procedure 61 (§ 2.2-3000 et seq.);

63 26. Employees of the Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth. Such employees shall be treated as state employees for purposes of participation in the Virginia Retirement System, health insurance, and 64 65 all other employee benefits offered by the Commonwealth to its classified employees; 66

27. Employees of the Virginia Indigent Defense Commission; and

28. Any chief of a campus police department that has been designated by the governing body of a 67 68 public institution of higher education as exempt, pursuant to § 23-232; and

69 29. Members of the Virginia Network for Geospatial Health Research Authority. CHAPTER 17.

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VIRGINIA NETWORK FOR GEOSPATIAL HEALTH RESEARCH AUTHORITY.

§ 32.1-370. Virginia Network for Geospatial Health Research Authority; purpose.

The Virginia Network for Geospatial Health Research Authority (the Authority) is created as a body 73 74 politic and corporate, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth. The Authority shall have the powers 75 and duties hereinafter conferred in this chapter.

76 The Authority is established to (i) provide for the continuity and expansion of research within both the public and private sectors using geospatial analysis of health and health care relevant data, (ii) 77 78 develop economies of scale within state health agencies and within public health programs within the Commonwealth's universities, (iii) provide geospatial analytical support to other political subdivisions 79 80 concerned with cost-effective targeting of public health initiatives, and (iv) engage in such other lawful 81 activities as the Board of Directors of the Authority deems reasonable and appropriate. 82

§ 32.1-371. Powers and duties of the Authority.

83 A. The Authority is vested with all the rights, powers, and privileges conferred upon political 84 subdivisions of the Commonwealth and such additional rights, powers, and privileges conferred under this chapter and those conferred upon corporations under the laws of the Commonwealth, including, 85 without limitation, all the corporate powers given to nonstock corporations by the provisions of Chapter 86 87 10 (§ 13.1-801 et seq.) of Title 13.1. The Authority shall also have the power to take, hold, receive, and 88 enjoy any gift, grant, devise, or bequest to the Authority. The Authority shall control and expend the 89 funds appropriated to it by the Commonwealth. 90

B. The Authority shall:

91 1. Establish relationships with academic programs throughout the Commonwealth that use geospatial 92 analysis to understand and assess environmental health, public health, and health care issues to 93 strengthen programs through technical assistance, to provide support for graduate research, and to 94 facilitate sharing of educational opportunities across institutions. The Authority is specifically authorized 95 to serve public health research stakeholders within the Commonwealth by (i) developing a network of 96 experts and a system of peer review that does not limit individual institutions' academic freedom, (ii) 97 supporting educational advancement, (iii) providing a conduit for seeking grant funding for research 98 and practice, (iv) supplying technical geographic information system infrastructure support, and (v)99 assisting state health agencies, policy makers and health administrators in understanding optimal targeting and utilization of resources; 100

2. Support and coordinate academic, state agency, and private sector expertise in geospatial 101 102 analysis, health policy, health planning, environmental health analysis, and epidemiology and facilitate 103 the development of new approaches and methodologies to sustain effective public health and health care 104 interventions across all health-related state agencies throughout the Commonwealth;

3. Coordinate with the Virginia Geographic Information Network Division on a clearinghouse for 105 geospatially referenced health and health systems' relevant data through a web-based geospatial 106 107 data-sharing system;

108 4. Seek to expand research opportunities and increase potential funding opportunities for relevant 109 public health research in Virginia by seeking private sector grants and other funding to the benefit of health and health care stakeholders throughout the Commonwealth; 110

5. Provide a broad array of private and public entities with the requisite data to develop appropriate 111 112 environmental health analysis, health care delivery models, and assessment within the health and health care system in Virginia and provide technical assistance in analyzing such data; 113

114 6. Function as a service organization to cost-effectively leverage existing hardware, software, data, applications, and personnel to support new research projects within its partner organizations; and 115

7. Make geospatial services and data available to faculty and students from educational institutions, 116 as well as to the Department of Health, public health officials and researchers, and others determined 117 by the Authority to be appropriate, with the goal of improving existing public health programs, developing new evidence-based initiatives, and better informing the health policy decision-making 118 119 120 process through health-related assessment activities.

121 C. If for any reason the Authority cannot be deemed an appropriate recipient of grant awards for a

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122 research-related program or initiative, a state entity designated by the Authority may act as agent for 123 the Authority in carrying out its obligations under such agreement or in receiving the benefits 124 thereunder, or both. 125

§ 32.1-372. Board of Directors established; duties; membership; terms; expenses.

126 A. The Authority shall be governed by a Board of Directors as described in this section. The Board 127 shall make and adopt such policies, procedures, and bylaws for the governance and operation of the 128 Authority as the Board deems appropriate. The policies established by the Board shall be generally 129 consistent with and build upon the strategic direction established by the Virginia Geographic 130 Information Network Advisory Board. The Board shall provide an annual report to the Virginia 131 Geographic Information Network Division and shall meet with the Virginia Geographic Information 132 Network Advisory Board periodically as agreed upon or requested.

133 B. The Board of Directors shall consist of 16 members, to be appointed by the Governor after receiving nominations, as follows: two members from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University; 134 two members from the University of Virginia School of Medicine; two members from the Eastern 135 136 Virginia Medical School; two members from the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Medicine; 137 two members from other colleges and universities with programs in Geographical Information Systems; two members from the Department of Health; one member from the Virginia Geographic Information 138 139 Network Board; one member from the Virginia Geographic Information Network Division; and two 140 members at large. The Secretary of Health and Human Resources, the Commissioner of Health, the 141 Commissioner of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, and a member of the Joint 142 Commission on Health Care or their designees shall serve on the Board in an ex officio capacity. Ex 143 officio members shall serve with voting rights and shall serve terms coincident with their terms of office.

144 C. The terms of members of the Board shall be four years. No member shall be eligible to serve 145 more than two terms; however, after the expiration of the term of a member appointed to serve three years or less, two additional terms may be served if appointed thereto. Any appointment to fill a 146 147 vacancy shall be for the unexpired term. A person appointed to fill a vacancy may be appointed to serve 148 two additional terms.

149 D. The Governor shall appoint a chairman of the Board, and the initial meeting shall be convened 150 with assistance from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

151 E. The Board shall elect from its membership a vice-chairman and shall also elect a secretary and a 152 treasurer. The Board may also form committees and advisory councils, which may include 153 representatives who are not members of the Board, to undertake activities as directed by the Board.

154 F. The Board may appoint such officers as the Board may determine to be appropriate, with such 155 officers to have such authority and to perform such duties as conferred by the Board, consistent with 156 this chapter. The Board shall also have the authority to hire staff to carry out its duties.

157 G. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the Authority's business, 158 and no vacancy in the membership shall impair the right of a quorum to exercise the rights and perform 159 all duties of the Authority.

160 H. Members of the Board shall receive their expenses and shall be compensated at the rate provided 161 in § 2.2-2104 for each day spent on the business of the Board.

§ 32.1-373. Audit. 162

163 The accounts of the Authority shall be audited annually by the Auditor of Public Accounts, or his 164 legally authorized representative, and the cost of such audit shall be borne by the Authority. The 165 Auditor of Public Accounts through a process of competitive negotiation shall select a certified public 166 accounting firm with the concurrence of the Authority. Copies of the annual audit shall be distributed to 167 the Governor and to the chairmen of the House Committee on Appropriations and the Senate Committee 168 on Finance.

169 § 32.1-374. Agent for the Authority.

170 If for any reason the Authority cannot replace a state entity, agency, or educational institution as a 171 party to any agreement, the Authority may provide that such entities may act as agent for the Authority 172 in carrying out its obligations under such agreement or in receiving the benefits thereunder, or both. 173

§ 32.1-375. Public access to medical records; meetings of the Board.

174 A. Records prepared by or for the Authority shall be exempt from the mandatory disclosure 175 provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.) to the extent such records contain 176 medical information or data obtained from a geographic information system that reveals the identity or 177 location of specific individuals who are the subject of such records. Nothing in this subsection shall be 178 construed to allow the withholding of statistical summaries, abstracts or other information in aggregate 179 form.

180 B. Meetings of the Board may be conducted through electronic communication means provided such 181 meetings are conducted in accordance with the requirements of § 2.2-3708.

C. For the purposes of this section, "medical information" means information that (i) relates to an 182

183 individual's physical or mental condition, medical history, or medical treatment and (ii) is obtained from 184 a medical professional or medical care institution, from the individual or from the individual's spouse,

185 parent, or legal guardian.

186 § 32.1-376. Exemptions from taxation.

187 The Authority shall not be required to pay any taxes or assessments upon any project or any 188 property or upon any operations of the Authority or the income therefrom, or any taxes or assessments 189 upon any project or any property or local obligation acquired or used by the Authority under the 190 provisions of this chapter or upon the income therefrom.

191 § 32.1-377. Cooperation between the Authority and other political subdivisions.

192 The Authority may enter into agreements with any other political subdivision of the Commonwealth 193 for joint or cooperative action in accordance with § 15.2-1300.

194 § 32.1-378. Process or notice.

195 Process against or notice to the corporation may be served only in the City of Richmond upon the 196 Chairman, or Secretary of the Board, or the Executive Director if one should be appointed by the 197 Board. 198

§ 32.1-379. Reporting.

199 The Board of Directors of the Authority shall report annually the status and progress of the 200 implementation of the Authority's goals and objectives to the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, 201 the State Board of Health, the deans and presidents of the respective state educational institutions, and 202 the Governor and the General Assembly. The report shall provide in detail how the Authority has supported state agencies, state universities, and other institutions in fulfilling their missions and how 203 204 private, state, and federal funds were leveraged to accomplish this purpose.

2. The initial staggering of the terms of the Board of Directors of the Virginia Network for 205 Geospatial Health Research Authority created pursuant to this act shall be as follows: one 206 appointee from each category of representation shall serve a one-year term, and the other 207 appointee from each category shall serve a two-year term. The initial member of the Virginia 208 Geographic Information Network Division shall serve a two-year term. The initial member of the 209

210 Virginia Geographic Information Network Board shall serve a one-year term.
