WHEREAS, an innovative leader, Bob Smithwick initiated the Norfolk Ambassadors program, which recognized citizens who promoted new businesses for the City of Norfolk; and

WHEREAS, Bob Smithwick led efforts to develop Norfolk Commerce Park and Lake Wright Executive Center; and

WHEREAS, Bob Smithwick will be fondly remembered for his many contributions to the community and will be greatly missed by his wife of 60 years, Faye; his four children, Dori, David, Rob, and Amy and their spouses; nine grandchildren; two sisters; many nieces and nephews; and numerous friends and admirers; now, therefore, be it
