3	A BILL to amend and reenact § 16.1-248.1 of the Code of Virginia, relating to detention of juvenile for
4	noncompliance.

9 10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That § 16.1-248.1 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 16.1-248.1. Criteria for detention or shelter care.
13	A. A juvenile taken into custody whose case is considered by a judge, intake officer or magistrate
14	pursuant to § 16.1-247 shall immediately be released, upon the ascertainment of the necessary facts, to
15	the care, custody and control of such juvenile's parent, guardian, custodian or other suitable person able
16	and willing to provide supervision and care for such juvenile, either on bail or recognizance pursuant to
17	Chapter 9 (§ 19.2-119 et seq.) of Title 19.2 or under such conditions as may be imposed or otherwise.
18	However, at any time prior to an order of final disposition, a juvenile may be detained in a secure
19	facility, pursuant to a detention order or warrant, only upon a finding by the judge, intake officer, or
20	magistrate, that there is probable cause to believe that the juvenile committed the act alleged, and that at
21	least one of the following conditions is met:
22	1. The juvenile is alleged to have (a) violated the terms of his probation or parole when the charge
23	for which he was placed on probation or parole would have been a felony or Class 1 misdemeanor if
24 25	committed by an adult; (b) committed an act that would be a felony or Class 1 misdemeanor if
25 26	committed by an adult; or (c) violated any of the provisions of § 18.2-308.7, and there is clear and convincing evidence that:
27 27	a. Considering the seriousness of the current offense or offenses and other pending charges, the
28	seriousness of prior adjudicated offenses, the legal status of the juvenile and any aggravating and
29	mitigating circumstances, the liberty of the juvenile, constitutes a clear and substantial threat to the
30	person or property of others;
31	b. The liberty of the juvenile would present a clear and substantial threat of serious harm to such
32	juvenile's life or health; or
33	c. The juvenile has threatened to abscond from the court's jurisdiction during the pendency of the
34	instant proceedings or has a record of willful failure to appear at a court hearing within the immediately
35	preceding 12 months.
36 37	2. The juvenile has absconded from a detention home or facility where he has been directed to
37 38	remain by the lawful order of a judge or intake officer. 3. The juvenile is a fugitive from a jurisdiction outside the Commonwealth and subject to a verified
39	petition or warrant, in which case such juvenile may be detained for a period not to exceed that
40	provided for in § 16.1-323 while arrangements are made to return the juvenile to the lawful custody of a
41	parent, guardian or other authority in another state.
42	4. The juvenile has failed to appear in court after having been duly served with a summons in any
43	case in which it is alleged that the juvenile has committed a delinquent act or that the child is in need
44	of services or is in need of supervision; however, a child alleged to be in need of services or in need of
45	supervision may be detained for good cause pursuant to this subsection only until the next day upon
46	which the court sits within the county or city in which the charge against the child is pending, and
47	under no circumstances longer than 72 hours from the time he was taken into custody. If the 72-hour
48 49	period expires on a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which the court is lawfully closed, the 72 hours shall be avtended to the part day that is not a Saturday. Sunday, legal holiday or day on which
49 50	hours shall be extended to the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which the court is lawfully closed.
50 51	5. [The juvenile has failed to adhere to the conditions imposed upon him or the directions given to
51 52	him by the court, intake officer or magistrate upon his release. The juvenile failed to adhere to the
53	conditions imposed upon him by the court, intake officer or magistrate upon his release in lieu of
54	detention in a secure facility pursuant to subdivision 1.]
55	When a juvenile is placed in secure detention, the detention order shall state the offense for which
56	the juvenile is being detained, and, to the extent practicable, other pending and previous charges.
57	B. Any juvenile not meeting the criteria for placement in a secure facility shall be released to a
58	parent, guardian or other person willing and able to provide supervision and care under such conditions
59	as the judge, intake officer or magistrate may impose. However, a juvenile may be placed in shelter care

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60 if:

61 1. The juvenile is eligible for placement in a secure facility;

62 2. The juvenile has failed to adhere to the directions of the court, intake officer or magistrate while 63 on conditional release;

64 3. The juvenile's parent, guardian or other person able to provide supervision cannot be reached 65 within a reasonable time: 66

4. The juvenile does not consent to return home;

5. Neither the juvenile's parent or guardian nor any other person able to provide proper supervision 67 68 can arrive to assume custody within a reasonable time; or

6. The juvenile's parent or guardian refuses to permit the juvenile to return home and no relative or 69 70 other person willing and able to provide proper supervision and care can be located within a reasonable 71 time.

72 C. When a juvenile is detained in a secure facility, the juvenile's probation officer may review such 73 placement for the purpose of seeking a less restrictive alternative to confinement in that secure facility.

74 D. The criteria for continuing the juvenile in detention or shelter care as set forth in this section shall 75 govern the decisions of all persons involved in determining whether the continued detention or shelter 76 care is warranted pending court disposition. Such criteria shall be supported by clear and convincing 77 evidence in support of the decision not to release the juvenile.

78 E. Nothing in this section shall be construed to deprive the court of its power to punish a juvenile 79 summarily for contempt for acts set forth in § 18.2-456, other than acts of disobedience of the court's 80 dispositional order which are committed outside the presence of the court.

F. A detention order may be issued pursuant to subdivision 2 of subsection A by the committing 81 court or by the court in the jurisdiction from which the juvenile fled or where he was taken into 82 83 custody.

G. The court is authorized to detain a juvenile based upon the criteria set forth in subsection A at 84 85 any time after a delinquency petition has been filed, both prior to adjudication and after adjudication pending final disposition subject to the time limitations set forth in § 16.1-277.1. 86

87 H. If the intake officer or magistrate releases the juvenile, either on bail or recognizance or under such conditions as may be imposed, no motion to revoke bail, or change such conditions may be made 88 89 unless (i) the juvenile has violated a term or condition of his release, or is convicted of or taken into 90 custody for an additional offense, or (ii) the attorney for the Commonwealth presents evidence that 91 incorrect or incomplete information regarding the factors in subsection A was relied upon by the intake 92 officer or magistrate establishing the initial terms of release. If the juvenile court releases the juvenile, 93 either on bail or recognizance or under such conditions as may be imposed, over the objection of the 94 attorney for the Commonwealth, the attorney for the Commonwealth may appeal such decision to the 95 circuit court. The order of the juvenile court releasing the juvenile shall remain in effect until the circuit 96 court, Court of Appeals or Supreme Court rules otherwise.
