**8. Fiscal Implications:** This legislation requires the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to develop regulations and certify GPS devices to persons under the supervision of a local pre-trial program. Since this would be a newly mandated agency function, DCJS would be required to promulgate the rules and regulations necessary to comply with this legislation. Additionally, DCJS would have to work with the manufacturers of GPS devices to certify them to the standards, that will subsequently be developed to meet the needs of the local pre-trial programs. In FY 2010, there were 18,232 defendants referred for pre-trial programs with another 5,284 defendants placed directly in local pre-trial programs.

Due to agency staffing reductions, DCJS is unable to absorb this function without additional resources. According to the agency, one analyst grade position will be needed.

The original impact statement did not include benefits for the proposed salaried position.
