## **HOUSE BILL NO. 1106**

- A BILL to amend and reenact § 54.1-2900 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Article 4 of Chapter 29 of Title 54.1 sections numbered 54.1-2957.16 through 54.1-2957, 19, relating to licensure of behavior analysts and assistant behavior analysts.

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Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: That § 54.1-2900 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of 12 1.

Virginia is amended by adding in Article 4 of Chapter 29 of Title 54.1 sections numbered 13 54.1-2957.16 through 54.1-2957.19 as follows: 14

15 § 54.1-2900. Definitions. 16

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

"Acupuncturist" means individuals approved by the Board to practice acupuncture. This is limited to 17 "licensed acupuncturist" which means an individual other than a doctor of medicine, osteopathy, 18 chiropractic or podiatry who has successfully completed the requirements for licensure established by the 19 20 Board (approved titles are limited to: Licensed Acupuncturist, Lic.Ac., and L.Ac.).

21 "Auricular acupuncture" means the subcutaneous insertion of sterile, disposable acupuncture needles in predetermined, bilateral locations in the outer ear when used exclusively and specifically in the 22 23 context of a chemical dependency treatment program. 24

"Board" means the Board of Medicine.

25 "Healing arts" means the arts and sciences dealing with the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure 26 or alleviation of human physical or mental ailments, conditions, diseases, pain or infirmities.

"Medical malpractice judgment" means any final order of any court entering judgment against a 27 28 licensee of the Board that arises out of any tort action or breach of contract action for personal injuries 29 or wrongful death, based on health care or professional services rendered, or that should have been 30 rendered, by a health care provider, to a patient.

"Medical malpractice settlement" means any written agreement and release entered into by or on 31 32 behalf of a licensee of the Board in response to a written claim for money damages that arises out of 33 any personal injuries or wrongful death, based on health care or professional services rendered, or that 34 should have been rendered, by a health care provider, to a patient.

35 "Occupational therapy assistant" means an individual who has met the requirements of the Board for 36 licensure and who works under the supervision of a licensed occupational therapist to assist in the 37 practice of occupational therapy.

"Physician assistant" means an individual who has met the requirements of the Board for licensure 38 39 and who works under the supervision of a licensed doctor of medicine, osteopathy, or podiatry.

40 "Practice of acupuncture" means the stimulation of certain points on or near the surface of the body by the insertion of needles to prevent or modify the perception of pain or to normalize physiological 41 42 functions, including pain control, for the treatment of certain ailments or conditions of the body and 43 includes the techniques of electroacupuncture, cupping and moxibustion. The practice of acupuncture 44 does not include the use of physical therapy, chiropractic, or osteopathic manipulative techniques; the 45 use or prescribing of any drugs, medications, serums or vaccines; or the procedure of auricular 46 acupuncture as exempted in § 54.1-2901 when used in the context of a chemical dependency treatment program for patients eligible for federal, state or local public funds by an employee of the program who 47 48 is trained and approved by the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association or an equivalent 49 certifying body.

"Practice of athletic training" means the prevention, recognition, evaluation, and treatment of injuries 50 51 or conditions related to athletic or recreational activity that requires physical skill and utilizes strength,

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52 power, endurance, speed, flexibility, range of motion or agility or a substantially similar injury or 53 condition resulting from occupational activity immediately upon the onset of such injury or condition; 54 and subsequent treatment and rehabilitation of such injuries or conditions under the direction of a 55 licensed physical therapist and the patient's physician or under the direction of any doctor of medicine, 56 osteopathy, chiropractic, podiatry, or dentistry, while using heat, light, sound, cold, electricity, exercise 57 or mechanical or other devices.

58 "Practice of behavior analysis" means the design, implementation, and evaluation of environmental 59 modifications by a behavior analyst to produce socially significant improvements in human behavior. It includes the empirical identification of functional relations between behavior and environmental factors, 60 known as functional assessment and analysis. Applied behavior analysis interventions are based on 61 scientific research and the direct observation and measurement of behavior and environment. They utilize contextual factors, establishing operations, antecedent stimuli, positive reinforcement, and other 62 63 procedures to help people develop new behaviors, increase or decrease existing behaviors, and emit 64 behaviors under specific environmental conditions. The practice of behavior analysis expressly excludes 65 psychological testing, neuropsychology, psychotherapy, cognitive therapy, sex therapy, psychoanalysis, 66 hypnotherapy, and long-term counseling as treatment modalities. 67

68 "Practice of chiropractic" means the adjustment of the 24 movable vertebrae of the spinal column,
69 and assisting nature for the purpose of normalizing the transmission of nerve energy, but does not
70 include the use of surgery, obstetrics, osteopathy or the administration or prescribing of any drugs,
71 medicines, serums or vaccines.

"Practice of medicine or osteopathic medicine" means the prevention, diagnosis and treatment ofhuman physical or mental ailments, conditions, diseases, pain or infirmities by any means or method.

74 "Practice of occupational therapy" means the evaluation, analysis, assessment, and delivery of 75 education and training in activities of daily living (ADL); the design, fabrication, and application of 76 orthoses (splints); guidance in the selection and use of adaptive equipment; therapeutic activities to 77 enhance functional performance; prevocational evaluation and training; and consultation concerning the 78 adaptation of physical environments for individuals who have disabilities.

79 "Practice of podiatry" means the prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and cure or alleviation of physical 80 conditions, diseases, pain, or infirmities of the human foot and ankle, including the medical, mechanical 81 and surgical treatment of the ailments of the human foot and ankle, but does not include amputation of 82 the foot proximal to the transmetatarsal level through the metatarsal shafts. Amputations proximal to the metatarsal-phalangeal joints may only be performed in a hospital or ambulatory surgery facility 83 84 accredited by an organization listed in § 54.1-2939. The practice includes the diagnosis and treatment of 85 lower extremity ulcers; however, the treatment of severe lower extremity ulcers proximal to the foot and ankle may only be performed by appropriately trained, credentialed podiatrists in an approved hospital 86 87 or ambulatory surgery center at which the podiatrist has privileges, as described in § 54.1-2939. The 88 Board of Medicine shall determine whether a specific type of treatment of the foot and ankle is within 89 the scope of practice of podiatry.

90 "Practice of radiologic technology" means the application of x-rays to human beings for diagnostic or
 91 therapeutic purposes.

92 "Practice of respiratory care" means the (i) administration of pharmacological, diagnostic, and 93 therapeutic agents related to respiratory care procedures necessary to implement a treatment, disease 94 prevention, pulmonary rehabilitative, or diagnostic regimen prescribed by a practitioner of medicine or 95 osteopathic medicine; (ii) transcription and implementation of the written or verbal orders of a practitioner of medicine or osteopathic medicine pertaining to the practice of respiratory care; (iii) 96 97 observation and monitoring of signs and symptoms, general behavior, general physical response to respiratory care treatment and diagnostic testing, including determination of whether such signs, 98 99 symptoms, reactions, behavior or general physical response exhibit abnormal characteristics; and (iv) 100 implementation of respiratory care procedures, based on observed abnormalities, or appropriate reporting, 101 referral, respiratory care protocols or changes in treatment pursuant to the written or verbal orders by a licensed practitioner of medicine or osteopathic medicine or the initiation of emergency procedures, 102 pursuant to the Board's regulations or as otherwise authorized by law. The practice of respiratory care 103 may be performed in any clinic, hospital, skilled nursing facility, private dwelling or other place deemed 104 appropriate by the Board in accordance with the written or verbal order of a practitioner of medicine or 105 106 osteopathic medicine, and shall be performed under qualified medical direction.

"Qualified medical direction" means, in the context of the practice of respiratory care, having readily
accessible to the respiratory care practitioner a licensed practitioner of medicine or osteopathic medicine
who has specialty training or experience in the management of acute and chronic respiratory disorders
and who is responsible for the quality, safety, and appropriateness of the respiratory services provided
by the respiratory care practitioner.

"Radiologic technologist" means an individual, other than a licensed doctor of medicine, osteopathy,
 podiatry, or chiropractic, or a dentist licensed pursuant to Chapter 27 (§ 54.1-2700 et seq.) of this title,

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114 who (i) performs, may be called upon to perform, or who is licensed to perform a comprehensive scope

115 of diagnostic radiologic procedures employing equipment which emits ionizing radiation and (ii) is

116 delegated or exercises responsibility for the operation of radiation-generating equipment, the shielding of 117 patient and staff from unnecessary radiation, the appropriate exposure of radiographs or other procedures

118 which contribute to any significant extent to the site or dosage of ionizing radiation to which a patient is

119 exposed.

"Radiologic technologist, limited" means an individual, other than a licensed radiologic technologist,
dental hygienist or person who is otherwise authorized by the Board of Dentistry under Chapter 27
(§ 54.1-2700 et seq.) of this title and the regulations pursuant thereto, who performs diagnostic
radiographic procedures employing equipment which emits ionizing radiation which is limited to specific
areas of the human body.

125 "Radiologist assistant" means an individual who has met the requirements of the Board for licensure 126 as an advanced-level radiologic technologist and who, under the direct supervision of a licensed doctor 127 of medicine or osteopathy specializing in the field of radiology, is authorized to (i) assess and evaluate the physiological and psychological responsiveness of patients undergoing radiologic procedures; (ii) evaluate image quality, make initial observations, and communicate observations to the supervising 128 129 130 radiologist; (iii) administer contrast media or other medications prescribed by the supervising radiologist; 131 and (iv) perform, or assist the supervising radiologist to perform, any other procedure consistent with the 132 guidelines adopted by the American College of Radiology, the American Society of Radiologic 133 Technologists, and the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists.

"Respiratory care" means the practice of the allied health profession responsible for the direct and
 indirect services, including inhalation therapy and respiratory therapy, in the treatment, management,
 diagnostic testing, control and care of patients with deficiencies and abnormalities associated with the
 cardiopulmonary system under qualified medical direction.

**138** § 54.1-2957.16. Advisory Board on Behavior Analysis; membership; terms.

A. The Advisory Board on Behavior Analysis shall assist the Board in carrying out the provisions of
 this chapter regarding the qualifications, examination, and regulation of licensed behavior analysts and
 licensed assistant behavior analysts.

The Advisory Board shall consist of five members appointed by the Governor for four-year terms.
Three members shall be at the time of appointment board certified behavior analysts who have practiced for not less than three years; one member shall be a board certified assistant behavior analyst who has

**145** practiced for not less than three years; and one member shall be a consumer or a family member of a consumer of behavior analysis services.

- 147 Vacancies occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled for the unexpired term. No148 person shall be eligible to serve on the Advisory Board for more than two consecutive terms.
- B. The Advisory Board shall, under the authority of the Board, recommend to the Board for its
  enactment into regulation the criteria for licensure as a behavior analyst or an assistant behavior
  analyst and the standards of professional conduct for holders of behavior analyst and assistant behavior
  analyst licenses.
- 153 The Advisory Board shall also assist in such other matters dealing with the practice of applied 154 behavior analysis as the Board may in its discretion direct.
- 155 § 54.1-2957.17. Advisory Board on Behavior Analysis; duties.
- **156** The Advisory Board shall, under the authority of the Board:

157 1. Recommend to the Board, for its promulgation into regulation, additional criteria for licensure as
158 a behavior analyst or an assistant behavior analyst and the standards of professional conduct for
159 holders of such licenses.

160 2. Assess the qualifications of applicants for licensure and recommend licensure when applicants
161 meet the required criteria. The recommendations of the Advisory Board on licensure of applicants shall
162 be presented to the Board, which shall then issue or deny licenses. Any applicant who is aggrieved by a
163 denial of recommendation for licensure by the Advisory Board may appeal to the Board.

164 3. Receive investigative reports of professional misconduct and unlawful acts and recommend
165 sanctions when appropriate. Any recommendation of sanctions shall be presented to the Board, which
166 may then impose sanctions or take such other action as may be warranted by law.

4. Assist in such other matters dealing with the practice of applied behavior analysis as the Boardmay in its discretion direct.

\$ 54.1-2957.18. Requirements for licensure as a behavior analyst or an assistant behavior analyst;
 provisional license.

A. The Board shall, in consultation with the Advisory Board on Behavior Analysis, promulgate
regulations establishing requirements for licensure as a behavior analyst which shall include, but not be
limited to, the following:

174 1. Documentation that the applicant is currently certified as a Board Certified Behavior Analyst by

175 the Behavior Analyst Certification Board, or any other nationally accredited certification board;

176 2. Documentation that the applicant conducts his professional practice in accordance with the 177 Behavior Analyst Certification Board Guidelines for Responsible Conduct and Professional Ethical and

178 Disciplinary Standards and any other accepted professional and ethical standards the Board deems 179 necessary; and

180 3. Documentation that the applicant for licensure has not had his license or certification as a 181 behavior analyst suspended or revoked and is not the subject of any disciplinary proceedings by the 182 certifying board or in another jurisdiction.

183 B. The Board shall, in consultation with the Advisory Board on Behavior Analysis, promulgate 184 regulations establishing requirements for licensure as an assistant behavior analyst which shall include, 185 but not be limited to, the following:

1. Documentation that the applicant is currently certified as a Board Certified Assistant Behavior 186 187 Analyst by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board or any other nationally accredited certification 188 board:

189 2. Documentation that the applicant conducts his professional practice in accordance with the 190 Behavior Analyst Certification Board Guidelines for Responsible Conduct and Professional Ethical and 191 Disciplinary Standards, and any other accepted professional and ethical standards the Board deems 192 necessary:

193 3. Documentation that the applicant for licensure has not had his license or certification as an 194 assistant behavior analyst suspended or revoked and is not the subject of any disciplinary proceedings 195 by the certifying board or in another jurisdiction; and

196 4. Documentation that the applicant's work is supervised by a licensed behavior analyst in 197 accordance with the supervision requirements and procedures established by the certifying entity.

198 C. The Board shall issue a provisional license to any Board Certified Behavior Analyst or Board Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst on or before December 31, 2012, who makes application for 199 200 licensure prior to January 1, 2013. Such provisional license shall expire on June 30, 2014, and shall 201 not be renewed. This subsection shall not be construed to limit the powers and authority of the Board.

202 § 54.1-2957.19. Unlawful practice and designation as a behavior analyst or assistant behavior 203 analyst; exceptions.

204 A. It shall be unlawful for any person not holding a current and valid license from the Board to practice applied behavior analysis or to use the title "Licensed Behavior Analyst" or to claim to be a 205 206 licensed behavior analyst.

207 B. It shall be unlawful for any person not holding a current and valid license from the Board to 208 practice applied behavior analysis or to use the title "Licensed Assistant Behavior Analyst" or to claim 209 to be a licensed assistant behavior analyst. 210

C. The provisions of this section shall not be construed as prohibiting the following:

211 1. An unlicensed person from providing applied behavior analysis services under the extended authority or direction of a licensed behavior analyst or a licensed assistant behavior analyst who is 212 213 supervised by a licensed behavior analyst in accordance with the supervision requirements and 214 procedures established by the certifying entity; or

215 2. Any professional licensed, certified, or registered by a health regulatory board from acting within the scope of his practice. 216

2. That the Board of Medicine shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this 217 act to be effective within 280 days of its enactment. 218
