4. Title: Establish Active Shooter Local Law Enforcement Training Grant Fund

5. Summary: This bill establishes a nonreverting special fund for the deposit of appropriations, donations, gifts, and grants. Disbursements from this account will be used to make grants to localities with small populations and limited resources to use to train their law enforcement officers so they can be better prepared for active shooter situations.

6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No

7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Preliminary (see Item #8)

8. Fiscal Implications: Under this proposed legislation, the Active Shooter Local Law Enforcement Training Grant Fund ("Fund") would be established on the books of the Comptroller to assist localities with smaller populations and fewer resources to provide training to their law enforcement officers in effectively responded to active shooter situations.

The source of the Fund is not definitive and while there's no fiscal impact from creating the Fund, there would be a fiscal impact to the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to administer the Fund. DCJS estimates that an administrative fee of 5 percent of funds collected would cover agency cost to administer the Fund. DCJS will be responsible for establishing grant criteria and adopting all necessary guidelines for governing the Fund.
