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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 3 of Title 40.1 an article numbered
12	2.1, consisting of sections numbered 40.1-33.1 through 40.1-33.12, as follows:
13	Article 2.1.
14	Paid Sick Leave.
15	§ 40.1-33.1. Definitions.
16	As used in this article, unless the context requires a different meaning:
17	"Employer" means any employer, as such term is defined in § 40.1-2, that employed 50 or more
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10 19	full-time employee equivalents during the preceding year. "Employer" does not include any state, local, or regional governmental agency or institution.
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20 21	"Family member" means any of the following: 1. A child, which for purposes of this article means a biological, adopted, or foster child; a
21 22	stepchild; a ward; or a child the custody of which has been awarded to the employee by court order.
$\frac{22}{23}$	This definition of a child is applicable regardless of age or dependency status;
23 24	2. A biological, adoptive, or foster parent, stepparent, or legal guardian of an employee or the
25 26	employee's spouse or a child the custody of which has been awarded to the employee by court order;

30 31	"Full-time employee equivalent" means the sum of (i) the number of employees who, with respect to any month, are employed on guarage during the month, not forwar than 40 hours per week and (ii) the
31 32	any month, are employed, on average during the month, not fewer than 40 hours per week and (ii) the
32 33	number obtained by dividing the aggregate number of hours of service of employees who are not described in clause (i) for the month by 160

34 35	"Health care provider" has the same meaning ascribed to the term in § 38.2-3438.
	"Minimum work requirement" means the requirement that an employee work an average of 18 hours
36 37	during each of the weeks comprising the employee's pay period.
37 38	"Paid sick leave" means time off from work that is provided by an employer to an employee pursuant to § 40.1-33.3.
30 39	"Pay period" means the regular pay period established by the employer in accordance with
40	subsection A of § 40.1-29.
40 41	§ 40.1-33.2. Entitlement to paid sick leave.
42	Every employer shall provide to its employees paid sick leave as provided in this article. When an
43	employee uses paid sick leave for a purpose set forth in § 40.1-33.6, the employer shall compensate the
4 3 44	employee uses paid sick leave for a purpose set form in § 40.1-55.0, the employer shall compensate the employee for such time used at the same rate as the wage and with the same benefits that the employee
45	would have earned or accrued had the employee worked such time during regular work hours.
4 6	§ 40.1-33.3. Accrual and use of paid sick leave.
47	A. An employer shall provide paid sick leave to each employee who satisfies the minimum work
48	requirement for a pay period. The duty to provide paid sick leave shall start with the first pay period
4 9	during which an employee satisfied the minimum work requirement. Paid sick leave shall be provided to
5 0	such employees at the following rates:
50 51	1. For each pay period starting in calendar year 2016 in which an employee satisfies the minimum
51 52	work requirement, the employer shall provide the employee one hour of paid sick leave, or
52 53	proportionate share thereof, for each 50 hours worked; and
55 54	2. For each pay period starting in calendar year 2017 or thereafter in which an employee satisfies
54 55	the minimum work requirement, the employer shall provide the employee one hour of paid sick leave, or
	proportionate share thereof, for each 30 hours worked.

57 However, if an employer commences its business operations after January 1, 2016, the employer
58 shall provide each employee who satisfies the minimum work requirement paid sick leave at the rate

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59 specified in subdivision 1 during the first year of its operations and at the rate specified in subdivision 2 60 for periods following its first year of operations.

61 If an employer's pay period is less than one month, the employer shall award paid sick leave for 62 each pay period in such amounts that in the aggregate for each month are equivalent to the monthly 63 paid sick leave required to be awarded pursuant to this subsection.

64 B. An employee shall not be eligible to use paid sick leave that he has accrued under this article until he has been employed by his employer for 180 calendar days. If an employee satisfies this 180-day 65 qualification period with an employer, the employee shall not, following a break in continuous 66 employment with the employer, be required to satisfy another qualification period with the employer. 67 Following satisfaction of the qualification period requirement, an employee may use accrued paid sick **68** leave in any pay period subsequent to the pay period in which it has been earned. Any accrued paid 69 70 sick leave is forfeited upon the employee's termination of employment with the employer for any reason, and the employee is not entitled to payment therefor. However, any employee who returns to 71 employment with a former employer for which the employee has satisfied the 180-day qualification 72 73 period, no matter how long the break in employment or the reasons therefor, is immediately eligible to 74 use any paid sick leave that accrues after his return to the employer's employment. An employee who 75 returns to employment with a former employer for which the employee has not satisfied the 180-day 76 qualification period shall not be eligible to use any paid sick leave until he has been employed by his 77 employer for 180 calendar days following his return to employment.

C. The amount of time an employer provides in any form of paid leave that is used for multiple purposes including use as paid sick leave, such as paid time off or earned time off, shall satisfy the 78 79 requirements of this article, so long as the rate of accrual of such leave satisfies the requirements of 80 this article for the accrual of paid sick leave. That such leave balances may be reduced by an employee 81 utilizing such leave for other purposes, such as taking a vacation, shall not affect the fact that providing 82 83 such leave satisfies the requirements of this article regarding the provision of paid sick leave. 84

§ 40.1-33.4. Maximum accrual of paid sick leave and increment of use.

85 An employee may accumulate up to a maximum of 48 hours of paid sick leave. An employee's 86 balance of paid sick leave shall be reduced on an hour-for-hour basis for each hour or portion thereof 87 that an employee uses paid sick leave for a purpose authorized pursuant to § 40.1-33.6. 88

§ 40.1-33.5. Employee to provide notice of intent to use paid sick leave.

89 Employees shall make reasonable efforts to schedule paid sick leave when possible with the employer 90 in a manner that does not unduly disrupt the employer's operations. Whenever such scheduling is 91 impossible or impracticable, employees shall provide their employers with reasonable written or verbal 92 advance notice of their need to use paid sick leave. Such requests shall include a reason for the absence 93 involved and the expected duration of the leave. Where the requirement for the leave is foreseeable, the 94 employee shall provide such notice at least seven days in advance of such leave or, if giving seven days' 95 advance notice is not possible, notice as soon as practicable after the employee becomes aware of the need to take such leave. Where the requirement for the leave is unforeseeable, the employee shall 96 97 provide notice as soon as practicable after the employee becomes aware of the need to take such leave. 98

§ 40.1-33.6. Authorized use of paid sick leave.

Employees may use paid sick leave for any of the following purposes or reasons:

100 1. To attend to the needs of the employee or a family member of the employee when such individual 101 is suffering from a physical or mental illness, injury, or medical condition or has a need for dental 102 care.

103 2. To obtain professional medical, mental health, or dental diagnosis or care, or preventative 104 medical, mental health, or dental care, for the employee or a family member of the employee; or

3. To participate in any civil or criminal legal proceeding related to or resulting from the employee 105 106 or a family member of the employee being the victim of domestic or sexual violence.

§ 40.1-33.7. Employer may require documentation.

108 An employer may require that a request to use paid sick leave that is either anticipated to last more 109 than three consecutive days or that actually lasts for more than three consecutive days be supported by documentation, issued by a health care provider, certifying that the employee or the employee's family 110 111 member qualified for the use of paid sick leave pursuant to subdivision 1 or 2 of § 40.1-33.6 or appropriate court records establishing the employee's eligibility to use paid sick leave pursuant to 112 113 subdivision 3 of § 40.1-33.6. The employee shall provide such documentation to the employer in a timely 114 manner, not later than 30 days after the first day of the paid sick leave. The employer shall not delay the commencement of the leave or withhold payment of wages for such leave period on the basis that the employer has not yet received such documentation. If an employer requires such documentation and 115 116 117 the employee is not covered by a policy of health insurance that would cover the full medical and direct 118 ancillary costs associated with obtaining such documentation, the employer shall reimburse such 119 employee for any out-of-pocket expenses incurred in obtaining such documentation. An employer may require an employee to provide evidence documenting such unreimbursed medical and direct ancillary 120

121 costs before reimbursing the employee for such expenses. 122

§ 40.1-33.8. Employer may offer rescheduled work hours in lieu of paid sick leave.

123 A. If an employee notifies his employer of intent to use accrued paid sick leave, the employer, at its 124 option, may offer the employee the opportunity to reschedule the work hours for which the employee 125 seeks to use the accrued paid sick leave. The employer shall make such rescheduled work hours 126 available within either the same pay period or within two weeks of the hours for which the employee 127 sought to use accrued paid sick leave. An employee may not unreasonably refuse such an offer of 128 rescheduled work hours; an employee who unreasonably refuses such an offer of rescheduled work 129 hours is not eligible to use accrued paid sick leave for those hours he originally notified his employer 130 that he was requesting to use accrued paid sick leave.

131 B. In determining whether an employee unreasonably refused an offer of rescheduled hours, the 132 Department shall consider the nature of the employment, whether the employer made a good faith effort 133 to consider the nature of the employment, whether the employer made a good faith offer of the proposed 134 rescheduled hours, whether the employee made a good faith effort to accommodate the employer's 135 request that the employee work the rescheduled hours, and whether the rescheduled hours would have 136 been an undue hardship upon the employee. A refusal to work is not unreasonable if working the hours 137 offered by the employer would cause an undue hardship for the employee.

138 C. An undue hardship includes any situation where the proposed rescheduled hours would (i) cause 139 the employee to work more than 40 hours per week; (ii) conflict with other previously scheduled 140 employment or scheduled psychological, medical, or dental appointments of the employee or a family 141 member of the employee; (iii) conflict with educational classes; (iv) conflict with court proceedings or 142 appointments with legal counsel; (v) conflict with any court-ordered program, process, or event; (vi) 143 present a hardship because of the employee's disability or medical condition; or (vii) cause child care 144 coverage problems. 145

§ 40.1-33.9. Civil penalties; enforcement actions.

146 A. Any employer who knowingly fails to provide paid sick leave to its employees in accordance with 147 this article shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000 for each violation. The Commissioner 148 shall notify by certified mail any employer who he alleges has violated any provision of this article. 149 Such notice shall contain a description of the alleged violation. The decision of the Commissioner shall 150 be final. Civil penalties owed under this section shall be paid to the Commissioner for deposit into the 151 general fund of the State Treasurer. The Commissioner shall prescribe procedures for the payment of 152 proposed assessments of penalties that are not contested by employers. Such procedures shall include 153 provisions for an employer to consent to abatement of the alleged violation and pay a proposed penalty 154 or a negotiated sum in lieu of such penalty without admission of any civil liability arising from such 155 alleged violation.

156 B. The Commissioner may require a written complaint of the violation of this article and, with the 157 written and signed consent of an employee, may institute proceedings on behalf of an employee to 158 enforce compliance with this article and collect the value of any paid sick leave unlawfully withheld 159 from such employee, which shall be awarded to the employee entitled thereto. Upon entry of a final 160 order of the Commissioner, or upon entry of a judgment against the employer, the Commissioner or the 161 court shall assess attorney fees of one-third of the amount set forth in the final order or judgment.

162 C. Final orders of the Commissioner, the general district courts, or the circuit courts may be 163 recorded, enforced, and satisfied as orders or decrees of a circuit court upon certification of such 164 orders by the Commissioner or the court, as appropriate. 165

§ 40.1-33.10. Waivers prohibited.

166 No employer shall require any employee, except executive personnel, to sign any contract or 167 agreement that provides for the forfeiture of the employee's paid sick leave as a condition of 168 employment or the continuance therein, except as otherwise provided by law.

169 § 40.1-33.11. Paid sick leave statements.

170 An employer, upon request of his employee, shall furnish the employee a written statement of the 171 paid sick leave earned by the employee during any pay period, any amounts deducted therefrom during 172 the pay period, and the balance of the employee's paid sick leave.

173 § 40.1-33.12. Application of article.

174 A. Nothing in this article shall be construed to discourage or prohibit an employer from the adoption 175 or retention of a paid sick leave policy more generous than the provisions required by this article.

176 B. Nothing in this article shall be construed to lessen the obligation of an employer to comply with a 177 contract, collective bargaining agreement, employment benefit plan, or other agreement providing more 178 generous paid sick leave to an employee than required herein.

179 C. This article establishes minimum requirements pertaining to paid sick leave and does not preempt, 180 limit, or otherwise affect the applicability of any other law, regulation, requirement, policy, or standard that provides for greater accrual or use by employees of sick leave, whether paid or unpaid, or that 181

182 extends other protections to an employee.
