15100778D **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 226** 1 2 Offered January 14, 2015 3 Prefiled January 5, 2015 4 Commemorating the 240th anniversary of George Mason's Virginia Declaration of Rights in 2016. 5 Patrons—Puller and Ebbin 6 7 Referred to Committee on Rules 8 9 WHEREAS, on May 6, 1776, in response to a recommendation of the Continental Congress meeting 10 in Philadelphia that the colonies draft documents necessary for the creation of new governments, the fifth Virginia Convention was convened in Williamsburg; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Virginia Convention established a committee to draft a constitution and bill of 13 rights; according to historical accounts, Delegate George Mason arrived in Williamsburg on May 17, 14 1776, and was appointed to the prestigious committee; and 15 WHEREAS, as primary author, George Mason undertook the monumental task of writing the requested constitution and bill of rights, which was reviewed by the committee, presented to the full 16 Convention, and ratified as the Virginia Declaration of Rights on June 12, 1776; and 17 WHEREAS, the Virginia Declaration of Rights expressed ideas of seminal importance that proved 18 19 influential during the transformative period in American history and that are still relevant today; and 20 WHEREAS, in Article 1 of the Virginia Declaration of Rights, George Mason penned, "That all men 21 are by nature equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter 22 into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity; namely, the 23 enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and pursuing and 24 obtaining happiness and safety"; and 25 WHEREAS, in subsequent articles, George Mason expressed, articulated, and called for fundamental liberties and freedoms such as freedom of religion, freedom of the press, and the right to a uniform 26 27 government; he further defined the rights of persons accused of a crime, including the right to a speedy 28 trial by a jury of one's peers and without excessive bail, the right to confront one's accuser, and rights to 29 protect the accused from self-incrimination; and 30 WHEREAS, George Mason provided a framework of government in the Virginia Declaration of Rights based on the belief that all power is vested in and derived from the people and that government 31 32 exists for the benefit, protection, and security of the people; he emphasized the separation of powers and 33 the basic necessity of representation for the people whom government serves; and WHEREAS, in subsequent decades following the ratification of the Virginia Declaration of Rights in 34 35 1776, George Mason's timeless expressions of rights, liberties, and the purpose and necessary structure 36 of a unified government has served as the primary influence for multiple state constitutions, the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights, the French Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen, 37 38 and the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights; and 39 WHEREAS, George Mason expressed the importance of the pursuit of happiness as an inherent right 40 of the individual; his words significantly inspired and informed the drafting of the Declaration of Independence, which was ratified less than one month after the ratification of the Virginia Declaration of 41 42 Rights; and 43 WHEREAS, in recognition of the significant universal impact of the Virginia Declaration of Rights 44 and of George Mason as its principal author, it is fitting and proper that appropriate events recognize and signal the 240th anniversary of the ratification of the Virginia Declaration of Rights throughout the 45 46 year of 2016; now, therefore, be it 47 RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the 240th anniversary of George Mason's Virginia Declaration of Rights be commemorated in 2016; and, be it 48 49 RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the Senate transmit a copy of this resolution to Scott M. Stroh, III, Executive Director of Gunston Hall, requesting that he further disseminate copies of this 50 resolution to his respective constituents so that they may be apprised of the sense of the General 51 52 Assembly of Virginia in this matter.
