12	common cause of cancer deaths for men and women in the United States, affecting men and women
13	equally; and
14	WHEREAS, every three minutes, someone in the United States is diagnosed with colorectal cancer,
15	and every 10 minutes someone in the United States dies from colorectal cancer in the United States; and
16	WHEREAS, the vast majority of colon cancer deaths can be prevented through proper screening and
17 18	early detection; and WHEPEAS only 20 percent of coloractal concer patients have their concers detected at an early
10 19	WHEREAS, only 39 percent of colorectal cancer patients have their cancers detected at an early stage; and
20	WHEREAS, the five-year survival rate of individuals diagnosed with early stage colorectal cancer is
2 0 2 1	90 percent but the five-year survival rate falls to 10 percent among individuals diagnosed after colorectal
$\overline{22}$	cancer has spread to other organs; and
23	WHEREAS, if the majority of people in the United States age 50 or older were screened regularly
24	for colorectal cancer, the death rate from this disease could plummet by up to 70 percent; and
25	WHEREAS, African Americans, Hispanic Americans, Asian Americans, Native Americans, and
26	Alaskan Natives are significantly less likely than Caucasians to be screened for colorectal cancer; and
27	WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is preventable, treatable, and beatable in most cases, and Colorectal
28 29	Cancer Awareness Month provides a special opportunity to offer education on the importance of early detection and screening; now, therefore, be it
29 30	RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the General Assembly designate
