12	hereby is, proposed and referred to the General Assembly at its first regular session held after the next
13	general election of members of the House of Delegates for its concurrence in conformity with the
14	provisions of Section 1 of Article XII of the Constitution of Virginia, namely:
15 16	Amend Section 1 of Article II of the Constitution of Virginia as follows:
10 17	ARTICLE II FRANCHISE AND OFFICERS
18	Section 1. Qualifications of voters.
19	In elections by the people, the qualifications of voters shall be as follows: Each voter shall be a
20	citizen of the United States, shall be eighteen years of age, shall fulfill the residence requirements set
21 22	forth in this section, and shall be registered to vote pursuant to this article. No person who has been convicted of a felony shall be qualified to vote unless his civil rights have been restored by the
$\frac{22}{23}$	Governor or other appropriate authority. However, the General Assembly may provide by general law for
24	the restoration of civil rights to persons who have been convicted of felonies and who have completed
25	service of their sentence, including any period or condition of probation, parole, or suspension of
26 27	sentence. As prescribed by law, no person adjudicated to be mentally incompetent shall be qualified to
28	vote until his competency has been reestablished. The residence requirements shall be that each voter shall be a resident of the Commonwealth and of
29	the precinct where he votes. Residence, for all purposes of qualification to vote, requires both domicile
30	and a place of abode. The General Assembly may provide for persons who are employed overseas, and
31	their spouses and dependents residing with them, and who are qualified to vote except for relinquishing
32	their place of abode in the Commonwealth while overseas, to vote in the Commonwealth subject to
33 34	conditions and time limits defined by law. The General Assembly may provide for persons who are qualified to vote except for having moved their residence from one precinct to another within the
35	Commonwealth to continue to vote in a former precinct subject to conditions and time limits defined by
36	law. The General Assembly may also provide, in elections for President and Vice President of the
37	United States, alternatives to registration for new residents of the Commonwealth.
38	Any person who will be qualified with respect to age to vote at the next general election shall be
39	permitted to register in advance and also to vote in any intervening primary or special election.
