4. Title: Private security services

5. Summary:

Under current law, no person convicted of specified misdemeanors may be employed as a registered or certified employee of a private security services business or issued any of several private security services registrations or certifications. The director of the Department of Criminal Justice Services is authorized to waive such prohibition.

The proposed legislation would require that any grant or denial of a request for a waiver be made in writing within 30 days of the receipt of the written request and shall state the reasons for the decision.
