5. Summary:

The proposed legislation would make several changes in the statutes related to asset forfeiture, as follows:

- Waiver—Prohibits any agency seizing property or any other law enforcement agency to request, require, or induce a property owner to waive his interest in or rights to the property until an information has been filed.
- Electronic filing—Authorizes an attorney for the Commonwealth to notify the Department of Motor Vehicles in an electronic format, in addition to certified mail, of the seizure of a motor vehicle.
- Forfeiture stay—Authorizes a court to stay a forfeiture proceeding related to a warrant, in addition to any proceedings related to an indictment or information, as currently authorized.
- Annual report—Requires the Department of Criminal Justice Service to submit annually to the Governor and the General Assembly a report on all forfeiture proceeds and distributions.

8. Fiscal Implications:

DCJS currently requires all agencies participating in the asset forfeiture program to submit a report annually listing the proceeds received and the uses made of the proceeds. To meet the requirement in the proposed legislation, DCJS will need to require local and state agencies to include more detail in their annual reports, such as information on non-drug related forfeitures, and then will need to compile the information into a report for the Governor and General Assembly. It is expected that all agencies involved can comply with the reporting requirement in the proposed legislation with existing resources. Consequently, the legislation is not expected to have any fiscal impact.
