2. Patron: Wagner

3. Committee: Commerce and Labor

4. Title: Workers' compensation; recovering damages from other party.

5. Summary: Expands the type of persons against whom an injured employee may bring a cause of action to recover damages for injury, occupational disease, or death to include statutory co-employees. The measure provides that a determination of whether a person is a stranger to the employer's work shall be made without regard to whether the person was performing work that is part of the trade, business, or occupation of the injured employee's employer. The measure affirms that an "other party" shall not include the injured employee's employer or a fellow employee.

8. Fiscal Implications: According to the Workers' Compensation Commission, the proposed legislation is not expected to have a significant fiscal impact for the agency or the Uninsured Employer's Fund.
