3. Committee: Passed Both Houses

4. Title: Opiate addiction treatment; nonmethadone opioid replacements.

5. Summary: Removes certain restrictions on licensure of providers who provide treatment for persons with opiate addiction using opioid replacements that have been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of opioid addiction. Such restrictions include the proximity of the provider to a school and community notice requirements.

6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No

7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: None

8. Fiscal Implications: This bill simply allows programs licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) that provide services to individuals who are addicted to opioids to replacements approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration if their facility is located within ½ mile of a school or daycare center. Currently, many Community Services Boards (CSBs) and private provider facilities are located in settings which are prohibited from using this medication due to this restriction. Exempting non-methadone programs from the ½ mile limit would permit these programs to utilize these medications. This bill merely provides facilities, CSBs, and private providers licensed by DBHDS to offer another medication option for individuals suffering from opioid abuse and therefore does not have a fiscal impact on the operations of the system.
