8 **Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:**

9 **1. That §§ 2.2-208, 2.2-2101, as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, 22.1-212.23,**
 10 **22.1-253.13:2, 23.1-1100, and 58.1-638 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and**
 11 **that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 22.1 a chapter numbered 19.2, consisting**
 12 **of sections numbered 22.1-349.12 through 22.1-349.16, as follows:**

13 **§ 2.2-208. Position established; agencies for which responsible; powers and duties.**

14 A. The position of Secretary of Education (the Secretary) is created. The Secretary shall be
 15 responsible to the Governor for the following agencies: Department of Education, State Council of
 16 Higher Education, Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, The Science Museum of Virginia, Frontier Culture
 17 Museum of Virginia, The Library of Virginia, Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation, Board of Regents of
 18 Gunston Hall, the Commission for the Arts, and the Board of Visitors of the Virginia School for the
 19 Deaf and the Blind, *and the Board of the Virginia Virtual School*. The Governor may, by executive
 20 order, assign any other state executive agency to the Secretary, or reassign any agency listed above to
 21 another Secretary.

22 B. Unless the Governor expressly reserves such a power to himself, the Secretary may (i) resolve
 23 administrative, jurisdictional, or policy conflicts between any agencies or officers for which he is
 24 responsible and (ii) provide policy direction for programs involving more than a single agency.

25 C. The Secretary may direct the preparation of alternative policies, plans, and budgets for education
 26 for the Governor and, to that end, may require the assistance of the agencies for which he is responsible.

27 D. The Secretary shall direct the formulation of a comprehensive program budget for cultural affairs
 28 encompassing the programs and activities of the agencies involved in cultural affairs.

29 E. The Secretary shall consult with the agencies for which he is responsible and biennially report to
 30 the General Assembly on the coordination efforts among such agencies.

31 **§ 2.2-2101. (Effective until July 1, 2017) Prohibition against service by legislators on boards,**
 32 **commissions, and councils within the executive branch; exceptions.**

33 Members of the General Assembly shall be ineligible to serve on boards, commissions, and councils
 34 within the executive branch of state government who are responsible for administering programs
 35 established by the General Assembly. Such prohibition shall not extend to boards, commissions, and
 36 councils engaged solely in policy studies or commemorative activities. If any law directs the
 37 appointment of any member of the General Assembly to a board, commission, or council in the
 38 executive branch of state government that is responsible for administering programs established by the
 39 General Assembly, such portion of such law shall be void, and the Governor shall appoint another
 40 person from the Commonwealth at large to fill such a position.

41 The provisions of this section shall not apply to members of the Board for Branch Pilots, who shall
 42 be appointed as provided for in § 54.1-901; to members of the Board of Trustees of the Southwest
 43 Virginia Higher Education Center, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 23.1-3126; to members
 44 of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center, who shall be appointed as
 45 provided for in § 23.1-3121; to members of the Board of Directors of the New College Institute who
 46 shall be appointed as provided for in § 23.1-3112; to members of the Virginia Interagency Coordinating
 47 Council who shall be appointed as provided for in § 2.2-5204; to members of the Board of Veterans
 48 Services, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 2.2-2452; to members appointed to the Board of
 49 Trustees of the Roanoke Higher Education Authority pursuant to § 23.1-3117; to members of the
 50 Virginia Geographic Information Network Advisory Board, who shall be appointed as provided for in
 51 § 2.2-2423; to members of the Standards of Learning Innovation Committee, who shall be appointed as
 52 provided for in § 22.1-253.13:10; to members of the Board of Visitors of the Virginia School for the
 53 Deaf and the Blind, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 22.1-346.2; *to members of the Board of*
 54 *the Virginia Virtual School, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 22.1-349.12;* to members of the
 55 Substance Abuse Services Council, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 2.2-2696; to members of
 56 the Criminal Justice Services Board, who shall be appointed as provided in § 9.1-108; to members of the

57 Council on Virginia's Future, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 2.2-2685; to members of the
 58 State Executive Council for Children's Services, who shall be appointed as provided in § 2.2-2648; to
 59 members of the Virginia Board of Workforce Development, who shall be appointed as provided for in
 60 § 2.2-2471; to members of the Volunteer Firefighters' and Rescue Squad Workers' Service Award Fund
 61 Board, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 51.1-1201; to members of the Secure Commonwealth
 62 Panel, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 2.2-222.3; to members of the Forensic Science
 63 Board, who shall be appointed as provided for in § 9.1-1109; to members of the Southwest Virginia
 64 Cultural Heritage Foundation, who shall be appointed as provided in § 2.2-2735; or to members of the
 65 Virginia Growth and Opportunity Board, who shall be appointed as provided in § 2.2-2485.

100 **§ 22.1-212.23. Definitions.**

101 As used in this article:

102 "Multidivision online provider" means (i) a private or nonprofit organization that enters into a
 103 contract with a local school board to provide online courses or programs through that school board to
 104 students who reside in Virginia both within and outside the geographical boundaries of that school
 105 division; (ii) a private or nonprofit organization that enters into contracts with multiple local school
 106 boards to provide online courses or programs to students in grades K through 12 through those school
 107 boards; ~~or~~ (iii) a local school board that provides online courses or programs to students who reside in
 108 Virginia but outside the geographical boundaries of that school division; *or (iv) a private or nonprofit*
 109 *organization that enters into a contract with the Board of the Virginia Virtual School, as established in*
 110 *§ 22.1-349.12, to provide full-time virtual school programs through the school to students who reside in*
 111 *Virginia.* However, "multidivision online provider" ~~shall~~ *does* not include (a) a local school board's
 112 online learning program in which fewer than 10 percent of the students enrolled reside outside the
 113 geographical boundaries of that school division; (b) multiple local school boards that establish joint
 114 online courses or programs in which fewer than 10 percent of the students enrolled reside outside the
 115 geographical boundaries of those school divisions; (c) local school boards that provide online learning
 116 courses or programs for their students through an arrangement with a public or private institution of
 117 higher education; or (d) local school boards providing online courses or programs through a private or

118 nonprofit organization that has been approved as a multidivision online provider.

119 "Online course" means a course or grade-level subject instruction that (i) is delivered by a
120 multidivision online provider primarily electronically using the Internet or other computer-based methods
121 and (ii) is taught by a teacher primarily from a remote location, with student access to the teacher given
122 synchronously, asynchronously, or both.

123 "Virtual school program" means a series of online courses with instructional content that (i) is
124 delivered by a multidivision online provider primarily electronically using the Internet or other
125 computer-based methods; (ii) is taught by a teacher primarily from a remote location, with student
126 access to the teacher given synchronously, asynchronously, or both; (iii) is delivered as a part-time or
127 full-time program; and (iv) has an online component with online lessons and tools for student and data
128 management.

129 An online course or virtual school program may be delivered to students at school as part of the
130 regularly scheduled school day.

131 **§ 22.1-253.13:2. Standard 2. Instructional, administrative, and support personnel.**

132 A. The Board shall establish requirements for the licensing of teachers, principals, superintendents,
133 and other professional personnel.

134 B. School boards shall employ licensed instructional personnel qualified in the relevant subject areas.

135 C. Each school board shall assign licensed instructional personnel in a manner that produces
136 divisionwide ratios of students in average daily membership to full-time equivalent teaching positions,
137 excluding special education teachers, principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians, that are
138 not greater than the following ratios: (i) 24 to one in kindergarten with no class being larger than 29
139 students; if the average daily membership in any kindergarten class exceeds 24 pupils, a full-time
140 teacher's aide shall be assigned to the class; (ii) 24 to one in grades one, two, and three with no class
141 being larger than 30 students; (iii) 25 to one in grades four through six with no class being larger than
142 35 students; and (iv) 24 to one in English classes in grades six through 12. After September 30 of any
143 school year, anytime the number of students in a class exceeds the class size limit established by this
144 subsection, the local school division shall notify the parent of each student in such class of such fact no
145 later than 10 days after the date on which the class exceeded the class size limit. Such notification shall
146 state the reason that the class size exceeds the class size limit and describe the measures that the local
147 school division will take to reduce the class size to comply with this subsection.

148 Within its regulations governing special education programs, the Board shall seek to set pupil/teacher
149 ratios for pupils with intellectual disability that do not exceed the pupil/teacher ratios for self-contained
150 classes for pupils with specific learning disabilities.

151 Further, school boards shall assign instructional personnel in a manner that produces schoolwide
152 ratios of students in average daily memberships to full-time equivalent teaching positions of 21 to one in
153 middle schools and high schools. School divisions shall provide all middle and high school teachers with
154 one planning period per day or the equivalent, unencumbered of any teaching or supervisory duties.

155 D. Each local school board shall employ with state and local basic, special education, gifted, and
156 career and technical education funds a minimum number of licensed, full-time equivalent instructional
157 personnel for each 1,000 students in average daily membership (ADM) as set forth in the appropriation
158 act. Calculations of kindergarten positions shall be based on full-day kindergarten programs. Beginning
159 with the March 31 report of average daily membership, those school divisions offering half-day
160 kindergarten with pupil/teacher ratios that exceed 30 to one shall adjust their average daily membership
161 for kindergarten to reflect 85 percent of the total kindergarten average daily memberships, as provided in
162 the appropriation act.

163 E. In addition to the positions supported by basic aid and in support of regular school year programs
164 of prevention, intervention, and remediation, state funding, pursuant to the appropriation act, shall be
165 provided to fund certain full-time equivalent instructional positions for each 1,000 students in grades K
166 through 12 who are identified as needing prevention, intervention, and remediation services. State
167 funding for prevention, intervention, and remediation programs provided pursuant to this subsection and
168 the appropriation act may be used to support programs for educationally at-risk students as identified by
169 the local school boards.

170 To provide algebra readiness intervention services required by § 22.1-253.13:1, school divisions may
171 employ mathematics teacher specialists to provide the required algebra readiness intervention services.
172 School divisions using the Standards of Learning Algebra Readiness Initiative funding in this manner
173 shall only employ instructional personnel licensed by the Board of Education.

174 F. In addition to the positions supported by basic aid and those in support of regular school year
175 programs of prevention, intervention, and remediation, state funding, pursuant to the appropriation act,
176 shall be provided to support 17 full-time equivalent instructional positions for each 1,000 students
177 identified as having limited English proficiency.

178 To provide flexibility in the instruction of English language learners who have limited English

179 proficiency and who are at risk of not meeting state accountability standards, school divisions may use
 180 state and local funds from the Standards of Quality Prevention, Intervention, and Remediation account to
 181 employ additional English language learner teachers to provide instruction to identified limited English
 182 proficiency students. Using these funds in this manner is intended to supplement the instructional
 183 services provided in this section. School divisions using the SOQ Prevention, Intervention, and
 184 Remediation funds in this manner shall employ only instructional personnel licensed by the Board of
 185 Education.

186 G. In addition to the full-time equivalent positions required elsewhere in this section, each local
 187 school board shall employ the following reading specialists in elementary schools, one full-time in each
 188 elementary school at the discretion of the local school board.

189 To provide reading intervention services required by § 22.1-253.13:1, school divisions may employ
 190 reading specialists to provide the required reading intervention services. School divisions using the Early
 191 Reading Intervention Initiative funds in this manner shall employ only instructional personnel licensed
 192 by the Board of Education.

193 H. Each local school board shall employ, at a minimum, the following full-time equivalent positions
 194 for any school that reports fall membership, according to the type of school and student enrollment:

195 1. Principals in elementary schools, one half-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students;
 196 principals in middle schools, one full-time, to be employed on a 12-month basis; principals in high
 197 schools, one full-time, to be employed on a 12-month basis;

198 2. Assistant principals in elementary schools, one half-time at 600 students, one full-time at 900
 199 students; assistant principals in middle schools, one full-time for each 600 students; assistant principals
 200 in high schools, one full-time for each 600 students; and school divisions that employ a sufficient
 201 number of assistant principals to meet this staffing requirement may assign assistant principals to schools
 202 within the division according to the area of greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are
 203 elementary, middle, or secondary;

204 3. Librarians in elementary schools, one part-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students;
 205 librarians in middle schools, one-half time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students, two full-time
 206 at 1,000 students; librarians in high schools, one half-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students,
 207 two full-time at 1,000 students. Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of librarians to
 208 meet this staffing requirement may assign librarians to schools within the division according to the area
 209 of greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle, or secondary; and

210 4. Guidance counselors in elementary schools, one hour per day per 100 students, one full-time at
 211 500 students, one hour per day additional time per 100 students or major fraction thereof; guidance
 212 counselors in middle schools, one period per 80 students, one full-time at 400 students, one additional
 213 period per 80 students or major fraction thereof; guidance counselors in high schools, one period per 70
 214 students, one full-time at 350 students, one additional period per 70 students or major fraction thereof.
 215 Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of guidance counselors to meet this staffing
 216 requirement may assign guidance counselors to schools within the division according to the area of
 217 greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are elementary, middle, or secondary.

218 I. Local school boards shall employ five full-time equivalent positions per 1,000 students in grades
 219 kindergarten through five to serve as elementary resource teachers in art, music, and physical education.

220 J. Local school boards shall employ two full-time equivalent positions per 1,000 students in grades
 221 kindergarten through 12, one to provide technology support and one to serve as an instructional
 222 technology resource teacher.

223 To provide flexibility, school divisions may use the state and local funds for instructional technology
 224 resource teachers to employ a data coordinator position, an instructional technology resource teacher
 225 position, or a data coordinator/instructional resource teacher blended position. The data coordinator
 226 position is intended to serve as a resource to principals and classroom teachers in the area of data
 227 analysis and interpretation for instructional and school improvement purposes, as well as for overall data
 228 management and administration of state assessments. School divisions using these funds in this manner
 229 shall employ only instructional personnel licensed by the Board of Education.

230 K. Local school boards may employ additional positions that exceed these minimal staffing
 231 requirements. These additional positions may include, but are not limited to, those funded through the
 232 state's incentive and categorical programs as set forth in the appropriation act.

233 L. A combined school, such as kindergarten through 12, shall meet at all grade levels the staffing
 234 requirements for the highest grade level in that school; this requirement shall apply to all staff, except
 235 for guidance counselors, and shall be based on the school's total enrollment; guidance counselor staff
 236 requirements shall, however, be based on the enrollment at the various school organization levels, i.e.,
 237 elementary, middle, or high school. The Board of Education may grant waivers from these staffing
 238 levels upon request from local school boards seeking to implement experimental or innovative programs
 239 that are not consistent with these staffing levels.

240 M. School boards shall, however, annually, on or before January 1, report to the public the actual
 241 pupil/teacher ratios in elementary school classrooms by school for the current school year. Such actual
 242 ratios shall include only the teachers who teach the grade and class on a full-time basis and shall
 243 exclude resource personnel. School boards shall report pupil/teacher ratios that include resource teachers
 244 in the same annual report. Any classes funded through the voluntary kindergarten through third grade
 245 class size reduction program shall be identified as such classes. Any classes having waivers to exceed
 246 the requirements of this subsection shall also be identified. Schools shall be identified; however, the data
 247 shall be compiled in a manner to ensure the confidentiality of all teacher and pupil identities.

248 N. Students enrolled in a public school on a less than full-time basis shall be counted in ADM in the
 249 relevant school division. Students who are either (i) enrolled in a nonpublic school or (ii) receiving
 250 home instruction pursuant to § 22.1-254.1, and who are enrolled in public school on a less than full-time
 251 basis in any mathematics, science, English, history, social science, career and technical education, fine
 252 arts, foreign language, or health education or physical education course shall be counted in the ADM in
 253 the relevant school division on a pro rata basis as provided in the appropriation act. Each such course
 254 enrollment by such students shall be counted as 0.25 in the ADM; however, no such nonpublic or home
 255 school student shall be counted as more than one-half a student for purposes of such pro rata
 256 calculation. Such calculation shall not include enrollments of such students in any other public school
 257 courses.

258 O. Each local school board shall provide those support services that are necessary for the efficient
 259 and cost-effective operation and maintenance of its public schools.

260 For the purposes of this title, unless the context otherwise requires, "support services positions" shall
 261 include the following:

262 1. Executive policy and leadership positions, including school board members, superintendents and
 263 assistant superintendents;

264 2. Fiscal and human resources positions, including fiscal and audit operations;

265 3. Student support positions, including (i) social workers and social work administrative positions; (ii)
 266 guidance administrative positions not included in subdivision H 4; (iii) homebound administrative
 267 positions supporting instruction; (iv) attendance support positions related to truancy and dropout
 268 prevention; and (v) health and behavioral positions, including school nurses and school psychologists;

269 4. Instructional personnel support, including professional development positions and library and
 270 media positions not included in subdivision H 3;

271 5. Technology professional positions not included in subsection J;

272 6. Operation and maintenance positions, including facilities; pupil transportation positions; operation
 273 and maintenance professional and service positions; and security service, trade, and laborer positions;

274 7. Technical and clerical positions for fiscal and human resources, student support, instructional
 275 personnel support, operation and maintenance, administration, and technology; and

276 8. School-based clerical personnel in elementary schools; part-time to 299 students, one full-time at
 277 300 students; clerical personnel in middle schools; one full-time and one additional full-time for each
 278 600 students beyond 200 students and one full-time for the library at 750 students; clerical personnel in
 279 high schools; one full-time and one additional full-time for each 600 students beyond 200 students and
 280 one full-time for the library at 750 students. Local school divisions that employ a sufficient number of
 281 school-based clerical personnel to meet this staffing requirement may assign the clerical personnel to
 282 schools within the division according to the area of greatest need, regardless of whether such schools are
 283 elementary, middle, or secondary.

284 Pursuant to the appropriation act, support services shall be funded from basic school aid.

285 School divisions may use the state and local funds for support services to provide additional
 286 instructional services.

287 P. Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, when determining the assignment of instructional
 288 and other licensed personnel in subsections C through J, *a neither the Virginia Virtual School nor any*
 289 *local school board shall not be required to include full-time students of approved virtual school*
 290 *programs.*

291 CHAPTER 19.2.

292 VIRGINIA VIRTUAL SCHOOL.

293 § 22.1-349.12. Board of the Virginia Virtual School established.

294 A. *There is hereby established the Board of the Virginia Virtual School, referred to in this chapter as*
 295 *"the Board," as a policy agency in the executive branch of government under the name of the "Board of*
 296 *the Virginia Virtual School," for the purpose of governing the full-time online educational programs and*
 297 *services provided to students enrolled in the Virginia Virtual School, referred to in this chapter as "the*
 298 *School." The members of the Board of the School shall be appointed by August 1, 2018. The Board*
 299 *shall be charged with the operational control of the School. In exercising this operational control, the*
 300 *Board may make budget recommendations to the Governor for state funding for the School. The Board*

301 and the School shall be designated as a local educational agency (LEA), but the School shall not
302 constitute a school division.

303 B. The Board shall have a total membership of 14 members that shall consist of seven legislative
304 members, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and six nonlegislative citizen members. Members
305 shall be appointed as follows: four members of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker
306 of the House of Delegates in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in
307 the Rules of the House of Delegates; three members of the Senate, to be appointed by the Senate
308 Committee on Rules; the Superintendent of Public Instruction; and six nonlegislative citizen members,
309 one of whom shall be the parent of a student enrolled in a full-time online virtual school program, one
310 of whom shall be a current member of the Board of Education, one of whom shall be an expert in
311 distance or online learning, and all of whom shall be appointed by the Governor, subject to
312 confirmation by the General Assembly. Nonlegislative citizen members of the Board shall be citizens of
313 the Commonwealth. Legislative members of the Board and the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall
314 serve terms coincident with their terms of office. After the initial staggering of terms, all other
315 nonlegislative citizen members shall serve four-year terms. Appointments to fill vacancies, other than by
316 expiration of a term, shall be for the unexpired terms. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as
317 the original appointments. All members may be reappointed. However, no House member shall serve
318 more than four consecutive two-year terms, no Senate member shall serve more than two consecutive
319 four-year terms, and no nonlegislative citizen member appointed by the Governor shall serve more than
320 two consecutive four-year terms. The remainder of any term to which a member is appointed to fill a
321 vacancy shall not constitute a term in determining the member's eligibility for reappointment. The Board
322 shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership. The Board shall elect a
323 secretary, who shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Board and of the executive
324 committee, if one is created by the Board, and such other officers as the Board deems appropriate. The
325 meetings of the Board shall be held at the call of the chairman or whenever the majority of the
326 members so request. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

327 C. Legislative members of the Board shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12, and
328 nonlegislative citizen members shall receive such compensation for the performance of their duties as
329 provided in § 2.2-2813. All members shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses
330 incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. Funding for the
331 costs of expenses of the members shall be provided from such funds as may be appropriated to the
332 Board in accordance with the appropriation act.

333 D. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall designate a member of the staff of the Department
334 of Education to serve as a consultant to the Board on matters pertaining to instruction, federal and
335 state special education requirements, and school accreditation and to provide technical assistance to the
336 Board in meeting specific instructional and school accreditation needs.

337 E. The Board shall have the following powers and duties:

338 1. Establish rules, policies, and regulations for the governance of the School subject to such criteria
339 and conditions as the General Assembly may prescribe;

340 2. Establish rules, policies, and regulations for all multidivision online providers that offer full-time
341 virtual school programs to students through the School, in consultation with the Department of
342 Education, that shall be subject to the requirements of the Standards of Quality, including the Standards
343 of Learning and the Standards of Accreditation, and shall include a process for evaluating and
344 suspending, as necessary, contracts with failing multidivision online providers;

345 3. Receive and disburse funds from any source for the purposes of providing education at the
346 School;

347 4. Establish a policy for enrollment procedures, including a procedure for the implementation of the
348 enrollment limitation set forth in subsection D of § 22.1-349.13; and

349 5. Prepare and submit to the Governor and General Assembly, beginning December 1, 2019, an
350 annual report detailing the curricula and other educational programs and services of the School,
351 including receipts and disbursements pertaining to the operation of the School for each fiscal year
352 ending on June 30.

353 F. With such funds as may be appropriated for such purpose, the Board may hire staff for the
354 School, including at least one staff person to coordinate appropriate special education for students with
355 disabilities as set forth in § 22.1-349.14.

356 **§ 22.1-349.13. Persons eligible; educational programs to be provided; procedures for enrollment.**

357 A. Any school-age person in the Commonwealth, as determined pursuant to subsection A of
358 § 22.1-254, shall be eligible to enroll full-time in the School. Participants in the full-time virtual school
359 program of the School shall meet all attendance requirements pursuant to § 22.1-254.

360 B. A student may enroll in the School if his parent (i) determines that access to the educational
361 services at the School is in the best interest of such student and (ii) completes the enrollment procedure

362 through an approved multidivision online provider that provides full-time virtual school programs
 363 through the School. A student who attends the School shall only enroll with one multidivision online
 364 provider at a time.

365 C. Except in the case of any student whose parent is on active duty in any of the Armed Forces of
 366 the United States, students shall enroll no later than the June 15 immediately preceding the upcoming
 367 school year.

368 D. The number of persons of school age for whom public schools are free pursuant to § 22.1-3 and
 369 who reside in any one local school division and enroll in the School shall not exceed two percent of the
 370 number of students enrolled in such local school division. The total aggregate number of students who
 371 enroll in the School statewide shall not exceed 5,000.

372 E. At the start of each school year, the School shall report to each relevant local school division the
 373 number of students who reside in such local school division and are enrolled in the School. If any such
 374 student leaves the School during such school year, the School shall report such information to the local
 375 school division in which the student resides.

376 F. The School shall provide an educational program meeting the constitutionally required Standards
 377 of Quality for children in grades kindergarten through 12. The Board may approve such additional
 378 programs as it may deem appropriate. All educational programs shall be provided through an approved
 379 multidivision online provider as defined in § 22.1-212.23.

380 G. The School shall be eligible for accreditation as prescribed by the Board of Education pursuant
 381 to § 22.1-253.13:3.

382 H. Each student enrolled in the School shall take each applicable Standards of Learning assessment.

383 I. The School shall not charge tuition.

384 **§ 22.1-349.14. Special education for students in the Virginia Virtual School.**

385 The School shall provide appropriate special education for students with disabilities enrolled in the
 386 School. The local school division of residence, as defined in § 22.1-349.16, shall be released from the
 387 obligations under § 22.1-215 for the special education of students with disabilities. The Board shall
 388 modify special education program regulations in accordance with this section. Multidivision online
 389 providers for the School may contract for the provision of special education services of a special
 390 education student enrolled in the School in accordance with such student's Individualized Education
 391 Program (IEP).

392 **§ 22.1-349.15. Multidivision online providers for the Virginia Virtual School.**

393 A. Multidivision online providers for the School shall meet the criteria pursuant to subsections A and
 394 B of § 22.1-212.24 to provide full-time virtual school programs.

395 B. The School may enter into contracts, consistent with the criteria approved by the Board of
 396 Education pursuant to subsections A and B of § 22.1-212.24, with any approved multidivision online
 397 provider. Such contracts shall be exempt from the Virginia Public Procurement Act (§ 2.2-4300 et seq.).
 398 The Board of Education shall not limit the ability of an approved multidivision online provider to
 399 contract with the School.

400 C. Any multidivision online provider approved to provide full-time virtual school programs may
 401 provide full-time virtual school programs through the School. Any student may enroll with any one
 402 approved multidivision online provider, and the selection of an approved multidivision online provider
 403 shall be at the discretion of the student's parent. The Board, the Department of Education, and the
 404 Board of Education shall make information regarding the School's online course offerings and capacity
 405 for students of each multidivision online provider publicly available to parents and shall promote all
 406 approved multidivision online providers that contract with the School equally to students seeking
 407 enrollment in the School.

408 **§ 22.1-349.16. Funding.**

409 A. For the purposes of this section, "local school division of residence" means that school division in
 410 which a student enrolled full-time in the School resides.

411 B. Effective starting with the 2019-2020 school year, any student who enrolls full-time in the School
 412 shall have the average state share of Standards of Quality per pupil funding transferred to the School.
 413 The total per pupil funding transferred shall consist of the average per pupil amounts on the basis of
 414 March 31 average daily membership and the per pupil share of state sales tax funding in basic aid. The
 415 Department of Education shall pay the average state share of the Standards of Quality per pupil funding
 416 directly to the School semimonthly. Such state share of per pupil funding shall be based on the
 417 Standards of Quality per pupil funding and per pupil share of state sales tax funding enacted in the
 418 current appropriation act.

419 The Department of Education shall transfer to the School all federal funds described in § 22.1-88
 420 directly associated with any pupil served by the School, including funds for the Individualized Education
 421 Program (IEP) of any special education student in the School.

422 C. Students who enroll on a full-time basis in the School shall be counted in the student enrollment

423 *rate of the School and shall not be counted in the March 31 average daily membership of their local*
 424 *school division of residence. Such students shall not be counted in the calculation of the required local*
 425 *effort of the local school division of residence.*

426 *D. The School shall be responsible for all federal and state accountability requirements applicable to*
 427 *any student who enrolls full time in the School.*

428 *E. Any costs or fees associated with the administration of the School and approved by the Board*
 429 *shall be borne proportionally by each of the School's approved multidivision online providers.*

430 *F. The School shall submit to periodic audits of its accounts by the Auditor of Public Accounts*
 431 *pursuant to subsection A of § 30-133.*

432 **§ 23.1-1100. Definitions.**

433 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

434 "Board" means the members of the board of visitors, board of trustees, or other governing board of
 435 an institution.

436 "Bond" means any bond, note, or other evidence of indebtedness or obligation of an institution issued
 437 by an institution pursuant to this chapter.

438 "Erect" includes building, constructing, reconstructing, erecting, demolishing, extending, bettering,
 439 equipping, installing, modifying, and improving.

440 "Institution" means each public institution of higher education, as that term is defined in § 23.1-100;
 441 Eastern Virginia Medical School; the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research; the New College
 442 Institute; the Roanoke Higher Education Authority; the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center; the
 443 Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center; the Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind; *the*
 444 *Virginia Virtual School*; and the Wilson Workforce and Rehabilitation Center.

445 "Project" means (i) any (a) building, facility, addition, extension, or improvement of a capital nature
 446 that is necessary or convenient to carry out the purposes of an institution, including administration and
 447 teaching facilities, lecture and exhibition halls, libraries, dormitories, student apartments, faculty
 448 dwellings, dining halls, cafeterias, snack bars, laundries, hospitals, laboratories, research centers,
 449 infirmaries, field houses, gymnasiums, auditoriums, student unions, recreation centers, stadiums, athletics
 450 facilities, garages, parking facilities, warehouses and storage buildings, and book and student supplies
 451 centers, or (b) building, land, appurtenance, furnishing, or equipment necessary or desirable in
 452 connection with or incidental to a project or (ii) any personal property at an institution.

453 **§ 58.1-638. Disposition of state sales and use tax revenue.**

454 A. The Comptroller shall designate a specific revenue code number for all the state sales and use tax
 455 revenue collected under the preceding sections of this chapter.

456 1. The sales and use tax revenue generated by the one-half percent sales and use tax increase enacted
 457 by the 1986 Special Session of the General Assembly shall be paid, in the manner hereinafter provided
 458 in this section, to the Transportation Trust Fund as defined in § 33.2-1524. Of the funds paid to the
 459 Transportation Trust Fund, an aggregate of 4.2 percent shall be set aside as the Commonwealth Port
 460 Fund as provided in this section; an aggregate of 2.4 percent shall be set aside as the Commonwealth
 461 Airport Fund as provided in this section; and an aggregate of 14.7 percent shall be set aside as the
 462 Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund as provided in this section. The Fund's share of such net revenue
 463 shall be computed as an estimate of the net revenue to be received into the state treasury each month,
 464 and such estimated payment shall be adjusted for the actual net revenue received in the preceding
 465 month. All payments shall be made to the Fund on the last day of each month.

466 2. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall
 467 be a part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Port Fund.

468 a. The Commonwealth Port Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and the funds
 469 remaining in such Fund at the end of a biennium shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in
 470 the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Funds may be
 471 paid to any authority, locality or commission for the purposes hereinafter specified.

472 b. The amounts allocated pursuant to this section shall be allocated by the Commonwealth
 473 Transportation Board to the Board of Commissioners of the Virginia Port Authority to be used to
 474 support port capital needs and the preservation of existing capital needs of all ocean, river, or tributary
 475 ports within the Commonwealth. Expenditures for such capital needs are restricted to those capital
 476 projects specified in subsection B of § 62.1-132.1.

477 c. Commonwealth Port Fund revenue shall be allocated by the Board of Commissioners to the
 478 Virginia Port Authority in order to foster and stimulate the flow of maritime commerce through the
 479 ports of Virginia, including but not limited to the ports of Richmond, Hopewell, and Alexandria.

480 3. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall
 481 be part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Airport Fund.
 482 The Commonwealth Airport Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and any funds
 483 remaining in such Fund at the end of a biennium shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in

484 the Fund. Interest earned on the funds shall be credited to the Fund. The funds so allocated shall be
 485 allocated by the Commonwealth Transportation Board to the Virginia Aviation Board. The funds shall
 486 be allocated by the Virginia Aviation Board to any Virginia airport which is owned by the
 487 Commonwealth, a governmental subdivision thereof, or a private entity to which the public has access
 488 for the purposes enumerated in § 5.1-2.16, or is owned or leased by the Metropolitan Washington
 489 Airports Authority (MWAA), as follows:

490 Any new funds in excess of \$12.1 million which are available for allocation by the Virginia Aviation
 491 Board from the Commonwealth Transportation Fund, shall be allocated as follows: 60 percent to
 492 MWAA, up to a maximum annual amount of \$2 million, and 40 percent to air carrier airports as
 493 provided in subdivision A 3 a. Except for adjustments due to changes in enplaned passengers, no air
 494 carrier airport sponsor, excluding MWAA, shall receive less funds identified under subdivision A 3 a
 495 than it received in fiscal year 1994-1995.

496 Of the remaining amount:

497 a. Forty percent of the funds shall be allocated to air carrier airports, except airports owned or leased
 498 by MWAA, based upon the percentage of enplanements for each airport to total enplanements at all air
 499 carrier airports, except airports owned or leased by MWAA. No air carrier airport sponsor, however,
 500 shall receive less than \$50,000 nor more than \$2 million per year from this provision.

501 b. Forty percent of the funds shall be allocated by the Aviation Board for air carrier and reliever
 502 airports on a discretionary basis, except airports owned or leased by MWAA.

503 c. Twenty percent of the funds shall be allocated by the Aviation Board for general aviation airports
 504 on a discretionary basis.

505 3a. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund that shall
 506 be a part of the Transportation Trust Fund and that shall be known as the Commonwealth Space Flight
 507 Fund. The Commonwealth Space Flight Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and
 508 the funds remaining in such Fund at the end of a biennium shall not revert to the general fund but shall
 509 remain in the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it.

510 a. The amounts allocated to the Commonwealth Space Flight Fund pursuant to § 33.2-1526 shall be
 511 allocated by the Commonwealth Transportation Board to the Board of Directors of the Virginia
 512 Commercial Space Flight Authority to be used to support the capital needs, maintenance, and operating
 513 costs of any and all facilities owned and operated by the Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority.

514 b. Commonwealth Space Flight Fund revenue shall be allocated by the Board of Directors to the
 515 Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority in order to foster and stimulate the growth of the
 516 commercial space flight industry in Virginia.

517 4. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund which shall
 518 be a part of the Transportation Trust Fund and which shall be known as the Commonwealth Mass
 519 Transit Fund.

520 a. The Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller and
 521 any funds remaining in such Fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the general fund but
 522 shall remain in the Fund. Interest earned on such funds shall be credited to the Fund. If funds in
 523 subdivision 4 b (1)(c) or 4 b (2)(d) are allocated to the construction of a new fixed rail project, such
 524 project shall be evaluated according to the process established pursuant to subsection B of § 33.2-214.1.
 525 Funds may be paid to any local governing body, transportation district commission, or public service
 526 corporation for the purposes hereinafter specified.

527 b. The amounts allocated pursuant to this section shall be used to support the operating, capital, and
 528 administrative costs of public transportation at a state share determined by the Commonwealth
 529 Transportation Board, and these amounts may be used to support the capital project costs of public
 530 transportation and ridesharing equipment, facilities, and associated costs at a state share determined by
 531 the Commonwealth Transportation Board. Capital costs may include debt service payments on local or
 532 agency transit bonds. In making these determinations, the Commonwealth Transportation Board shall
 533 confer with the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation. In development of the
 534 Director's recommendation and subsequent allocation of funds by the Commonwealth Transportation
 535 Board, the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation and the Commonwealth
 536 Transportation Board shall adhere to the following:

537 (1) For the distribution of revenues from the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund, of those revenues
 538 generated in 2014 and thereafter, the first \$160 million in revenues or the maximum available revenues
 539 if less than \$160 million shall be distributed by the Commonwealth Transportation Board as follows:

540 (a) Funds for special programs, which shall include ridesharing, transportation demand management
 541 programs, experimental transit, public transportation promotion, operation studies, and technical
 542 assistance, shall not exceed 3 percent of the funds pursuant to this section and may be allocated to any
 543 local governing body, planning district commission, transportation district commission, or public transit
 544 corporation, or may be used directly by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the

545 following purposes and aid of public transportation services:

546 (i) To finance a program administered by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation designed
547 to promote the use of public transportation and ridesharing throughout Virginia.

548 (ii) To finance up to 80 percent of the cost of the development and implementation of projects where
549 the purpose of such project is to enhance the provision and use of public transportation services.

550 (b) At least 72 percent of the funds shall be distributed to each transit property in the same
551 proportion as its operating expenses bear to the total statewide operating expenses and shall be spent for
552 the purposes specified in subdivision 4 b.

553 (c) Twenty-five percent of the funds shall be allocated and distributed utilizing a tiered approach
554 evaluated by the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee along with the Director of the
555 Department of Rail and Public Transportation and established by the Commonwealth Transportation
556 Board for capital purposes based on asset need and anticipated state participation level and revenues.
557 The tier distribution measures may be evaluated by the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee
558 along with the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation every three years and, if
559 redefined by the Board, shall be published at least one year in advance of being applied. Funds allocated
560 for debt service payments will be included in the tier that applies to the capital asset that is leveraged.

561 (d) Transfer of funds from funding categories in subdivisions 4 b (1)(a) and 4 b (1)(c) to 4 b (1)(b)
562 shall be considered by the Commonwealth Transportation Board in times of statewide economic distress
563 or statewide special need.

564 (2) The Commonwealth Transportation Board shall allocate the remaining revenues after the
565 application of the provisions set forth in subdivision 4 b (1) generated for the Commonwealth Mass
566 Transit Fund for 2014 and succeeding years as follows:

567 (a) Funds pursuant to this section shall be distributed among operating, capital, and special projects
568 in order to respond to the needs of the transit community.

569 (b) Of the funds pursuant to this section, at least 72 percent shall be allocated to support operating
570 costs of transit providers and distributed by the Commonwealth Transportation Board based on service
571 delivery factors, based on effectiveness and efficiency, as established by the Commonwealth
572 Transportation Board. These measures and their relative weight shall be evaluated every three years and,
573 if redefined by the Commonwealth Transportation Board, shall be published and made available for
574 public comment at least one year in advance of being applied. In developing the service delivery factors,
575 the Commonwealth Transportation Board shall create for the Department of Rail and Public
576 Transportation a Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee, consisting of two members appointed by
577 the Virginia Transit Association, one member appointed by the Community Transportation Association
578 of Virginia, one member appointed by the Virginia Municipal League, one member appointed by the
579 Virginia Association of Counties, and three members appointed by the Director of the Department of
580 Rail and Public Transportation, to advise the Department of Rail and Public Transportation in the
581 development of a distribution process for the funds allocated pursuant to this subdivision 4 b (2)(b) and
582 how transit systems can incorporate these metrics in their transit development plans. The Transit Service
583 Delivery Advisory Committee shall elect a Chair. The Department of Rail and Public Transportation
584 shall provide administrative support to the committee. Effective July 1, 2013, the Transit Service
585 Delivery Advisory Committee shall meet at least annually and consult with interested stakeholders and
586 hold at least one public hearing and report its findings to the Director of the Department of Rail and
587 Public Transportation. Prior to the Commonwealth Transportation Board approving the service delivery
588 factors, the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation along with the Chair of the
589 Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee shall brief the Senate Committee on Finance, the House
590 Appropriations Committee, and the Senate and House Committees on Transportation on the findings of
591 the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee and the Department's recommendation. Before
592 redefining any component of the service delivery factors, the Commonwealth Transportation Board shall
593 consult with the Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transportation, Transit Service Delivery
594 Advisory Committee, and interested stakeholders and provide for a 45-day public comment period. Prior
595 to approval of any amendment to the service delivery measures, the Board shall notify the
596 aforementioned committees of the pending amendment to the service delivery factors and its content.

597 (c) Funds for special programs, which shall include ridesharing, transportation demand management
598 programs, experimental transit, public transportation promotion, operation studies, and technical
599 assistance, shall not exceed 3 percent of the funds pursuant to this section and may be allocated to any
600 local governing body, planning district commission, transportation district commission, or public transit
601 corporation, or may be used directly by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the
602 following purposes and aid of public transportation services:

603 (i) To finance a program administered by the Department of Rail and Public Transportation designed
604 to promote the use of public transportation and ridesharing throughout Virginia.

605 (ii) To finance up to 80 percent of the cost of the development and implementation of projects where

606 the purpose of such project is to enhance the provision and use of public transportation services.

607 (d) Of the funds pursuant to this section, 25 percent shall be allocated and distributed utilizing a
608 tiered approach evaluated by the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee along with the Director
609 of Rail and Public Transportation and established by the Commonwealth Transportation Board for
610 capital purposes based on asset need and anticipated state participation level and revenues. The tier
611 distribution measures may be evaluated by the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee along with
612 the Director of Rail and Public Transportation every three years and, if redefined by the Board, shall be
613 published at least one year in advance of being applied. Funds allocated for debt service payments shall
614 be included in the tier that applies to the capital asset that is leveraged.

615 (e) Transfer of funds from funding categories in subdivisions 4 b (2)(c) and 4 b (2)(d) to 4 b (2)(b)
616 shall be considered by the Commonwealth Transportation Board in times of statewide economic distress
617 or statewide special need.

618 (f) The Department of Rail and Public Transportation may reserve a balance of up to five percent of
619 the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund revenues under this subsection in order to assure better stability
620 in providing operating and capital funding to transit entities from year to year.

621 (3) The Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund shall not be allocated without requiring a local match
622 from the recipient.

623 c. There is hereby created in the Department of the Treasury a special nonreverting fund known as
624 the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. The Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall be part of the
625 Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund. The Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund subaccount shall be
626 established on the books of the Comptroller and consist of such moneys as are appropriated to it by the
627 General Assembly and of all donations, gifts, bequests, grants, endowments, and other moneys given,
628 bequeathed, granted, or otherwise made available to the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. Any funds
629 remaining in the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the
630 general fund, but shall remain in the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund. Interest earned on funds
631 within the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall remain in and be credited to the Commonwealth
632 Transit Capital Fund. Proceeds of the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund may be paid to any political
633 subdivision, another public entity created by an act of the General Assembly, or a private entity as
634 defined in § 33.2-1800 and for purposes as enumerated in subdivision 7 of § 33.2-1701 or expended by
635 the Department of Rail and Public Transportation for the purposes specified in this subdivision.
636 Revenues of the Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall be used to support capital expenditures
637 involving the establishment, improvement, or expansion of public transportation services through specific
638 projects approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board. If revenues of the Commonwealth
639 Transit Capital Fund are allocated to the construction of a new fixed rail project, such project shall be
640 evaluated according to the process established pursuant to subsection B of § 33.2-214.1. The
641 Commonwealth Transit Capital Fund shall not be allocated without requiring a local match from the
642 recipient.

643 d. The Commonwealth Transportation Board may allocate up to three and one-half percent of the
644 funds set aside for the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund to support costs of project development,
645 project administration, and project compliance incurred by the Department of Rail and Public
646 Transportation in implementing rail, public transportation, and congestion management grants and
647 programs.

648 5. Funds for Metro shall be paid by the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) to the
649 Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) and be a credit to the Counties of
650 Arlington and Fairfax and the Cities of Alexandria, Falls Church, and Fairfax in the following manner:

651 a. Local obligations for debt service for WMATA rail transit bonds apportioned to each locality
652 using WMATA's capital formula shall be paid first by NVTC. NVTC shall use 95 percent state aid for
653 these payments.

654 b. The remaining funds shall be apportioned to reflect WMATA's allocation formulas by using the
655 related WMATA-allocated subsidies and relative shares of local transit subsidies. Capital costs shall
656 include 20 percent of annual local bus capital expenses. Hold harmless protections and obligations for
657 NVTC's jurisdictions agreed to by NVTC on November 5, 1998, shall remain in effect.

658 Appropriations from the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund are intended to provide a stable and
659 reliable source of revenue as defined by Public Law 96-184.

660 6. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, funds allocated to Metro may be disbursed by the
661 Department of Rail and Public Transportation directly to Metro or to any other transportation entity that
662 has an agreement to provide funding to Metro.

663 B. The sales and use tax revenue generated by a one percent sales and use tax shall be distributed
664 among the counties and cities of the Commonwealth in the manner provided in subsections C and D.

665 C. The localities' share of the net revenue distributable under this section among the counties and
666 cities shall be apportioned by the Comptroller and distributed among them by warrants of the

667 Comptroller drawn on the Treasurer of Virginia as soon as practicable after the close of each month
668 during which the net revenue was received into the state treasury. The distribution of the localities' share
669 of such net revenue shall be computed with respect to the net revenue received into the state treasury
670 during each month, and such distribution shall be made as soon as practicable after the close of each
671 such month.

672 D. The net revenue so distributable among the counties and cities shall be apportioned and
673 distributed upon the basis of the latest yearly estimate of the population of cities and counties ages five
674 to 19, provided by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the University of Virginia. Such
675 population estimate produced by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the University of
676 Virginia shall account for persons who are domiciled in orphanages or charitable institutions or who are
677 dependents living on any federal military or naval reservation or other federal property within the school
678 division in which the institutions or federal military or naval reservation or other federal property is
679 located. Such population estimate produced by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the
680 University of Virginia shall account for members of the military services who are under 20 years of age
681 within the school division in which the parents or guardians of such persons legally reside. Such
682 population estimate produced by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the University of
683 Virginia shall account for individuals receiving services in state hospitals, state training centers, or
684 mental health facilities, persons who are confined in state or federal correctional institutions, or persons
685 who attend the Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind *or the Virginia Virtual School* within the
686 school division in which the parents or guardians of such persons legally reside. Such population
687 estimate produced by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service of the University of Virginia shall
688 account for persons who attend institutions of higher education within the school division in which the
689 student's parents or guardians legally reside. To such estimate, the Department of Education shall add
690 the population of students with disabilities, ages two through four and 20 through 21, as provided to the
691 Department of Education by school divisions. The revenue so apportionable and distributable is hereby
692 appropriated to the several counties and cities for maintenance, operation, capital outlays, debt and
693 interest payments, or other expenses incurred in the operation of the public schools, which shall be
694 considered as funds raised from local resources. In any county, however, wherein is situated any
695 incorporated town constituting a school division, the county treasurer shall pay into the town treasury for
696 maintenance, operation, capital outlays, debt and interest payments, or other expenses incurred in the
697 operation of the public schools, the proper proportionate amount received by him in the ratio that the
698 school population of such town bears to the school population of the entire county. If the school
699 population of any city or of any town constituting a school division is increased by the annexation of
700 territory since the last estimate of school population provided by the Weldon Cooper Center for Public
701 Service, such increase shall, for the purposes of this section, be added to the school population of such
702 city or town as shown by the last such estimate and a proper reduction made in the school population of
703 the county or counties from which the annexed territory was acquired.

704 E. Beginning July 1, 2000, of the remaining sales and use tax revenue, the revenue generated by a
705 two percent sales and use tax, up to an annual amount of \$13 million, collected from the sales of
706 hunting equipment, auxiliary hunting equipment, fishing equipment, auxiliary fishing equipment,
707 wildlife-watching equipment, and auxiliary wildlife-watching equipment in Virginia, as estimated by the
708 most recent U.S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service and U.S. Department of
709 Commerce, Bureau of the Census National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated
710 Recreation, shall be paid into the Game Protection Fund established under § 29.1-101 and shall be used,
711 in part, to defray the cost of law enforcement. Not later than 30 days after the close of each quarter, the
712 Comptroller shall transfer to the Game Protection Fund the appropriate amount of collections to be
713 dedicated to such Fund. At any time that the balance in the Capital Improvement Fund, established
714 under § 29.1-101.01, is equal to or in excess of \$35 million, any portion of sales and use tax revenues
715 that would have been transferred to the Game Protection Fund, established under § 29.1-101, in excess
716 of the net operating expenses of the Board, after deduction of other amounts which accrue to the Board
717 and are set aside for the Game Protection Fund, shall remain in the general fund until such time as the
718 balance in the Capital Improvement Fund is less than \$35 million.

719 F.1. Of the net revenue generated from the one-half percent increase in the rate of the state sales and
720 use tax effective August 1, 2004, pursuant to enactments of the 2004 Special Session I of the General
721 Assembly, the Comptroller shall transfer from the general fund of the state treasury to the Public
722 Education Standards of Quality/Local Real Estate Property Tax Relief Fund established under
723 § 58.1-638.1 an amount equivalent to one-half of the net revenue generated from such one-half percent
724 increase as provided in this subdivision. The transfers to the Public Education Standards of
725 Quality/Local Real Estate Property Tax Relief Fund under this subdivision shall be for one-half of the
726 net revenue generated (and collected in the succeeding month) from such one-half percent increase for
727 the month of August 2004 and for each month thereafter.

728 2. Beginning July 1, 2013, of the remaining sales and use tax revenue, an amount equal to the
729 revenue generated by a 0.125 percent sales and use tax shall be distributed to the Public Education
730 Standards of Quality/Local Real Estate Property Tax Relief Fund established under § 58.1-638.1, and be
731 used for the state's share of Standards of Quality basic aid payments.

732 3. For the purposes of the Comptroller making the required transfers under subdivision 1 and 2, the
733 Tax Commissioner shall make a written certification to the Comptroller no later than the twenty-fifth of
734 each month certifying the sales and use tax revenues generated in the preceding month. Within three
735 calendar days of receiving such certification, the Comptroller shall make the required transfers to the
736 Public Education Standards of Quality/Local Real Estate Property Tax Relief Fund.

737 G. (Contingent expiration date — see note) Beginning July 1, 2013, of the remaining sales and use
738 tax revenue, an amount equal to the following percentages of the revenue generated by a one-half
739 percent sales and use tax, such as that paid to the Transportation Trust Fund as provided in subdivision
740 A 1, shall be paid to the Highway Maintenance and Operating Fund established pursuant to § 33.2-1530:

- 741 1. For fiscal year 2014, an amount equal to 10 percent;
- 742 2. For fiscal year 2015, an amount equal to 20 percent;
- 743 3. For fiscal year 2016, an amount equal to 30 percent; and
- 744 4. For fiscal year 2017 and thereafter, an amount equal to 35 percent.

745 The Highway Maintenance and Operating Fund's share of the net revenue distributable under this
746 subsection shall be computed as an estimate of the net revenue to be received into the state treasury
747 each month, and such estimated payment shall be adjusted for the actual net revenue received in the
748 preceding month. All payments shall be made to the Fund on the last day of each month.

749 H. (Contingent expiration date — see note) 1. The additional revenue generated by increases in the
750 state sales and use tax from Planning District 8 pursuant to §§ 58.1-603.1, 58.1-604.01, 58.1-604.1, and
751 58.1-614 shall be deposited by the Comptroller in the fund established under § 33.2-2509.

752 2. The additional revenue generated by increases in the state sales and use tax from Planning District
753 23 pursuant to §§ 58.1-603.1, 58.1-604.01, 58.1-604.1, and 58.1-614 shall be deposited by the
754 Comptroller in the fund established under § 33.2-2600.

755 3. The additional revenue generated by increases in the state sales and use tax in any other Planning
756 District pursuant to §§ 58.1-603.1, 58.1-604.01, 58.1-604.1, and 58.1-614 shall be deposited into special
757 funds that shall be established by appropriate legislation.

758 4. The net revenues distributable under this subsection shall be computed as an estimate of the net
759 revenue to be received by the state treasury each month, and such estimated payment shall be adjusted
760 for the actual net revenue received in the preceding month. All payments shall be made to the
761 appropriate funds on the last day of each month.

762 I. If errors are made in any distribution, or adjustments are otherwise necessary, the errors shall be
763 corrected and adjustments made in the distribution for the next quarter or for subsequent quarters.

764 J. The term "net revenue, " as used in this section, means the gross revenue received into the general
765 fund or the Transportation Trust Fund of the state treasury under the preceding sections of this chapter,
766 less refunds to taxpayers.

767 **2. That the initial appointments of nonlegislative citizen members of the Board of the Virginia**
768 **Virtual School shall be staggered as follows: three nonlegislative citizen members for terms of four**
769 **years, two nonlegislative citizen members for terms of three years, and one nonlegislative citizen**
770 **member for a term of two years, to be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the**
771 **General Assembly. Thereafter, appointments shall be for terms of four years.**
