**4. Title:** Financial exploitation of adults

**5. Summary:** The amended bill removes the requirement that financial losses resulting from suspected financial exploitation of an adult are suspected to be greater than \$50,000 in order for the case to be referred to a local law-enforcement agency. In addition, local law-enforcement agencies must provide local departments and the adult protective services hotline with a preferred point of contact for referrals.

Fiscal Implications:** The removal of the \$50,000 threshold for reporting suspected financial exploitation of an adult is not expected to have any significant impact on state agencies, including the Departments of Social Services and Aging and Rehabilitative Services.
