As passed by the Senate, the bill also specifies that a pet shop shall sell or offer for adoption a dog procured by a person who has not received citations for a total of three violations and who has not obtained the dog from a person with such citations. |              |             |            |             |           |  |

- 8. Fiscal Implications: It is anticipated that this bill will not have a state fiscal impact. However, the bill adds companion animal dealers to the prohibition provisions which are punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor. As such, the proposal could result in an increase in the jail population since Class 1 misdemeanors are subject to a sentence of up to 12 months in jail. There is not enough information available to reliably estimate how many additional inmates in jail could result from this proposal. Ultimately, the presiding judge will decide if there is to be any time served in jail; however, any increase in jail population will increase costs to the state. The Commonwealth presently pays the localities \$4.00 a day for each misdemeanant or otherwise local responsible prisoner held in a jail.
