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## VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Title 30 a chapter numbered 60, consisting of 3 sections numbered 30-376 through 30-383, relating to Commission on Wellness and Opportunity; 4 report.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

8 1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 30 a chapter numbered 60, consisting 9 of sections numbered 30-376 through 30-383, as follows: 10

CHAPTER 60.

#### COMMISSION ON WELLNESS AND OPPORTUNITY.

12 § 30-376. Commission on Wellness and Opportunity; purpose; membership; terms; compensation 13 and expenses; chairman; meetings; quorum; staffing; recommendations.

The Commission on Wellness and Opportunity (the Commission) is established in the legislative 14 15 branch of state government. The purpose of the Commission is to (i) establish a vision for health and wellness standards in Virginia by (a) examining various dimensions of health and wellness, including 16 17 but not limited to physical, intellectual, emotional, spiritual, environmental, and social wellness, and (b) utilizing the comprehensive theoretical framework "the social determinants of health"; (ii) identify and 18 19 define measurable opportunities and outcomes that build community competence around well-being; and 20 (iii) make policy recommendations for improving the quality of life of the citizens of the Commonwealth. 21

§ 30-377. Membership; terms; vacancies; chairman and vice-chairman.

22 A. The Commission shall consist of 23 members that include eight legislative members, five 23 nonlegislative citizen members, and 10 ex officio members. Members shall be appointed as follows: five 24 members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates in 25 accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the Rules of the House of 26 Delegates; three members of the Senate to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; three 27 nonlegislative citizen members, at least one of whom shall have a background in community competence 28 building and one of whom shall have a significant background in health and wellness within the private 29 sector equivalent to that of ex officio members of the Commission, to be appointed by the Speaker of the 30 House of Delegates; two nonlegislative citizen members, one of whom shall have a background in 31 community competence building and one of whom shall have a significant background in health and 32 wellness within the private sector equivalent to that of ex officio members of the Commission, to be 33 appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; and the Secretaries of Health and Human Resources, 34 Commerce and Trade, Agriculture and Forestry, Education, Public Safety and Homeland Security, 35 Natural Resources, and Transportation, the Chief Workforce Development Advisor to the Governor, the 36 Commissioner of Health, and the Executive Director of the Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth, or 37 their designees, to serve ex officio with nonvoting privileges. Nonlegislative citizen members of the Commission shall be citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Unless otherwise approved in writing by 38 39 the chairman of the Commission and the respective Clerk, nonlegislative citizen members shall only be 40 reimbursed for travel originating and ending within the Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of 41 attending meetings.

42 B. Legislative members and ex officio members of the Commission shall serve terms coincident with 43 their terms of office. Nonlegislative citizen members shall be appointed for a term of two years. Appointments to fill vacancies, other than by expiration of a term, shall be for the unexpired terms. 44 45 Legislative members and nonlegislative citizen members may be reappointed. However, no nonlegislative citizen member shall serve more than four consecutive two-year terms. The remainder of any term to 46 47 which a member is appointed to fill a vacancy shall not constitute a term in determining the member's 48 eligibility for reappointment. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments.

49 The Commission shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its membership, who shall be 50 members of the General Assembly.

## § 30-378. Quorum; meetings; voting on recommendations.

52 The Commission shall meet at least quarterly. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum. 53 The meetings of the Commission shall be held at the call of the chairman or whenever the majority of 54 the members so request.

55 No recommendation of the Commission shall be adopted if a majority of the House members or a 56 majority of the Senate members appointed to the Commission (i) vote against the recommendation and HB1056ER

57 (ii) vote for the recommendation to fail notwithstanding the majority vote of the Commission. 58

§ 30-379. Compensation; expenses.

59 Legislative members of the Commission shall receive such compensation as provided in § 30-19.12, 60 and nonlegislative citizen members shall receive such compensation for the performance of their duties 61 as provided in § 2.2-2813. All members shall be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses 62 incurred in the performance of their duties as provided in §§ 2.2-2813 and 2.2-2825. Compensation to members of the General Assembly for attendance at official meetings of the Commission shall be paid 63 by the offices of the Clerk of the House of Delegates or Clerk of the Senate, as applicable. All other 64 65 compensation and expenses shall be paid from existing appropriations to the Commission or, if unfunded, shall be approved by the Joint Rules Committee. 66

#### 67 § 30-380. Powers and duties of the Commission.

The Commission shall have the following powers and duties: 68

1. Develop a comprehensive framework for defining what wellness means for Virginia that is based 69 on the structural and social dimensions of wellness and the interrelationship of all aspects of the 70 environment to individual and public wellness; 71 72

2. Identify priorities and actions necessary to realize the comprehensive framework for wellness;

73 3. Identify opportunities to address wellness deficiencies and inequities in the Commonwealth and 74 develop policy recommendations to improve in a comprehensive manner the well-being of the citizens of 75 the Commonwealth; and

76 4. Submit an annual report pursuant to § 30-382.

§ 30-381. Staffing.

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Administrative staff support shall be provided by the Office of the Clerk of the House of Delegates or 78 79 the Office of the Clerk of the Senate as may be appropriate for the house in which the chairman of the Commission serves. The Division of Legislative Services shall provide legal, research, policy analysis, 80 81 and other services as requested by the Commission.

# § 30-382. Chairman's executive summary of activity and work of the Commission.

82 The chairman shall submit to the General Assembly and the Governor an annual executive summary 83 84 of the interim activity and work of the Commission no later than the first day of each regular session of 85 the General Assembly. The executive summary shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the 86 Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and 87 shall be posted on the General Assembly's website.

88 § 30-383. Sunset.

89 This chapter shall expire on July 1, 2025.

90 2. That if the Commission on Wellness and Opportunity (the Commission), as created by this act,

91 is not funded by a separate appropriation in the appropriation act for its first year of existence,

the Commission may be funded from the operating budgets of the Clerk of the House of Delegates 92

93 and the Clerk of the Senate upon the approval of the Joint Rules Committee. If the Commission is 94 not funded by a separate appropriation in the appropriation act for any year thereafter, this act

95 shall expire on July 1 of the fiscal year in which the Commission fails to receive such funding.
