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11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That §§ 9.1-151, 16.1-228, 16.1-241, and 63.2-100 of the Code of Virginia are amended and
13	reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 16.1-283.3 and
14	by adding in Chapter 9 of Title 63.2 an article numbered 2, consisting of sections numbered
15	63.2-917 through 63.2-923, as follows:
16	§ 9.1-151. Court-Appointed Special Advocate Program; appointment of advisory committee.
17	A. There is established a Court-Appointed Special Advocate Program (the Program) that shall be
18	administered by the Department. The Program shall provide services in accordance with this article to
19	children who are subjects of judicial proceedings (i) involving allegations that the child is abused,
20	neglected, in need of services, or in need of supervision or (ii) for the restoration of parental rights
21	pursuant to § 16.1-283.2 and for whom the juvenile and domestic relations district court judge
22	determines such services are appropriate. Court-Appointed Special Advocate volunteer appointments may
23	continue for youth 18 years of age and older who are in foster care if the court has retained jurisdiction
24	pursuant to subsection Z of § 16.1-241 or § 16.1-242 and the juvenile and domestic relations district
25	court judge determines such services are appropriate. The Department shall adopt regulations necessary
26	and appropriate for the administration of the Program.
27	B. The Board shall appoint an Advisory Committee to the Court-Appointed Special Advocate
28	Program, consisting of 15 members, one of whom shall be a judge of the juvenile and domestic
29	relations district court or circuit court, knowledgeable of court matters, child welfare, and juvenile justice
30	issues and representative of both state and local interests. The duties of the Advisory Committee shall be
31	to advise the Board on all matters relating to the Program and the needs of the clients served by the
32	Program, and to make such recommendations as it may deem desirable.
33	§ 16.1-228. Definitions.
34	When used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
35	"Abused or neglected child" means any child:
36	1. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates or inflicts, threatens to create or
37	inflict, or allows to be created or inflicted upon such child a physical or mental injury by other than
38 39	accidental means, or creates a substantial risk of death, disfigurement or impairment of bodily or mental
40	functions, including, but not limited to, a child who is with his parent or other person responsible for his
40 41	care either (i) during the manufacture or attempted manufacture of a Schedule I or II controlled substance, or (ii) during the unlawful sale of such substance by that child's parents or other person
42	responsible for his care, where such manufacture, or attempted manufacture or unlawful sale would
43	constitute a felony violation of § 18.2-248;
4 4	2. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care neglects or refuses to provide care
45	necessary for his health; however, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual
46	means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or religious
47	denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be an abused or neglected child;
48	3. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care abandons such child;
49	4. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care commits or allows to be committed any
50	sexual act upon a child in violation of the law;
51	5. Who is without parental care or guardianship caused by the unreasonable absence or the mental or
52	physical incapacity of the child's parent, guardian, legal custodian, or other person standing in loco
53	parentis;
54	6. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates a substantial risk of physical or
55	mental injury by knowingly leaving the child alone in the same dwelling, including an apartment as
56	defined in § 55.1-2000, with a person to whom the child is not related by blood or marriage and who
57	the parent or other person responsible for his care knows has been convicted of an offense against a
58	minor for which registration is required as a violent sexual offender pursuant to § 9.1-902; or

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59 7. Who has been identified as a victim of sex trafficking or severe forms of trafficking as defined in the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, 22 U.S.C. § 7102 et seq., and in the Justice for Victims 60 of Trafficking Act of 2015, 42 U.S.C. § 5101 et seq. 61

62 If a civil proceeding under this chapter is based solely on the parent having left the child at a 63 hospital or emergency medical services agency, it shall be an affirmative defense that such parent safely 64 delivered the child to a hospital that provides 24-hour emergency services or to an attended emergency 65 medical services agency that employs emergency medical services personnel, within 14 days of the child's birth. For purposes of terminating parental rights pursuant to § 16.1-283 and placement for 66 adoption, the court may find such a child is a neglected child upon the ground of abandonment. 67

Adoptive home" means the place of residence of any natural person in which a child resides as a 68 member of the household and in which he has been placed for the purposes of adoption or in which he 69 70 has been legally adopted by another member of the household.

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"Adult" means a person 18 years of age or older. "Ancillary crime" or "ancillary charge" means any delinquent act committed by a juvenile as a part 72 of the same act or transaction as, or which constitutes a part of a common scheme or plan with, a 73 74 delinquent act which would be a felony if committed by an adult.

75 "Boot camp" means a short term secure or nonsecure juvenile residential facility with highly 76 structured components including, but not limited to, military style drill and ceremony, physical labor, 77 education and rigid discipline, and no less than six months of intensive aftercare.

"Child," "juvenile," or "minor" means a person who is (i) less than 18 years of age or (ii) [for purposes of the Fostering Futures program set forth in Article 2 (§ 63.2-917 et seq.) of Chapter 9 of 78 79 Title 63.2,] less than 21 years of age and meets the eligibility criteria [for the Fostering Futures program] set forth in § 63.2-919. 80 81

"Child in need of services" means (i) a child whose behavior, conduct or condition presents or results 82 83 in a serious threat to the well-being and physical safety of the child or (ii) a child under the age of 14 whose behavior, conduct or condition presents or results in a serious threat to the well-being and 84 physical safety of another person; however, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by 85 spiritual means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or 86 87 religious denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be a child in need of services, nor 88 shall any child who habitually remains away from or habitually deserts or abandons his family as a 89 result of what the court or the local child protective services unit determines to be incidents of physical, 90 emotional or sexual abuse in the home be considered a child in need of services for that reason alone.

91 However, to find that a child falls within these provisions, (i) the conduct complained of must 92 present a clear and substantial danger to the child's life or health or to the life or health of another 93 person, (ii) the child or his family is in need of treatment, rehabilitation or services not presently being 94 received, and (iii) the intervention of the court is essential to provide the treatment, rehabilitation or 95 services needed by the child or his family.

"Child in need of supervision" means:

1. A child who, while subject to compulsory school attendance, is habitually and without justification 97 98 absent from school, and (i) the child has been offered an adequate opportunity to receive the benefit of 99 any and all educational services and programs that are required to be provided by law and which meet the child's particular educational needs, (ii) the school system from which the child is absent or other 100 101 appropriate agency has made a reasonable effort to effect the child's regular attendance without success, 102 and (iii) the school system has provided documentation that it has complied with the provisions of 103 § 22.1-258; or

104 2. A child who, without reasonable cause and without the consent of his parent, lawful custodian or 105 placement authority, remains away from or deserts or abandons his family or lawful custodian on more than one occasion or escapes or remains away without proper authority from a residential care facility in 106 107 which he has been placed by the court, and (i) such conduct presents a clear and substantial danger to the child's life or health, (ii) the child or his family is in need of treatment, rehabilitation or services not 108 presently being received, and (iii) the intervention of the court is essential to provide the treatment, 109 110 rehabilitation or services needed by the child or his family.

"Child welfare agency" means a child-placing agency, child-caring institution or independent foster 111 home as defined in § 63.2-100. 112

113 "The court" or the "juvenile court" or the "juvenile and domestic relations court" means the juvenile 114 and domestic relations district court of each county or city.

115 "Delinquent act" means (i) an act designated a crime under the law of the Commonwealth, or an ordinance of any city, county, town, or service district, or under federal law, (ii) a violation of 116 117 § 18.2-308.7, or (iii) a violation of a court order as provided for in § 16.1-292, but shall not include an act other than a violation of § 18.2-308.7, which is otherwise lawful, but is designated a crime only if committed by a child. For purposes of §§ 16.1-241 and 16.1-278.9, the term shall include a refusal to 118 119 take a breath test in violation of § 18.2-268.2 or a similar ordinance of any county, city, or town. 120

"Delinquent child" means a child who has committed a delinquent act or an adult who has committed
a delinquent act prior to his 18th birthday, except where the jurisdiction of the juvenile court has been
terminated under the provisions of § 16.1-269.6.

"Department" means the Department of Juvenile Justice and "Director" means the administrative head
 in charge thereof or such of his assistants and subordinates as are designated by him to discharge the
 duties imposed upon him under this law.

"Family abuse" means any act involving violence, force, or threat that results in bodily injury or places one in reasonable apprehension of death, sexual assault, or bodily injury and that is committed by a person against such person's family or household member. Such act includes, but is not limited to, any forceful detention, stalking, criminal sexual assault in violation of Article 7 (§ 18.2-61 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 18.2, or any criminal offense that results in bodily injury or places one in reasonable apprehension of death, sexual assault, or bodily injury or places one in reasonable

133 "Family or household member" means (i) the person's spouse, whether or not he or she resides in the 134 same home with the person, (ii) the person's former spouse, whether or not he or she resides in the same 135 home with the person, (iii) the person's parents, stepparents, children, stepchildren, brothers, sisters, 136 half-brothers, half-sisters, grandparents and grandchildren, regardless of whether such persons reside in 137 the same home with the person, (iv) the person's mother-in-law, father-in-law, sons-in-law, 138 daughters-in-law, brothers-in-law and sisters-in-law who reside in the same home with the person, (v) 139 any individual who has a child in common with the person, whether or not the person and that 140 individual have been married or have resided together at any time, or (vi) any individual who cohabits 141 or who, within the previous 12 months, cohabited with the person, and any children of either of them 142 then residing in the same home with the person.

143 "Fictive kin" means persons who are not related to a child by blood or adoption but have an144 established relationship with the child or his family.

"Foster care services" means the provision of a full range of casework, treatment and community 145 146 services for a planned period of time to a child who is abused or neglected as defined in § 63.2-100 or 147 in need of services as defined in this section and his family when the child (i) has been identified as 148 needing services to prevent or eliminate the need for foster care placement, (ii) has been placed through 149 an agreement between the local board of social services or a public agency designated by the 150 community policy and management team and the parents or guardians where legal custody remains with 151 the parents or guardians, (iii) has been committed or entrusted to a local board of social services or 152 child welfare agency, or (iv) has been placed under the supervisory responsibility of the local board 153 pursuant to § 16.1-293.

154 "Independent living arrangement" means placement of (i) a child at least 16 years of age who is in 155 the custody of a local board or licensed child-placing agency by the local board or licensed child-placing 156 agency or (ii) a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was 157 committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement by the Department of 158 Juvenile Justice, in a living arrangement in which such child or person does not have daily substitute 159 parental supervision.

160 "Independent living services" means services and activities provided to a child in foster care 14 years 161 of age or older and who has been committed or entrusted to a local board of social services, child welfare agency, or private child-placing agency. "Independent living services" may also mean services 162 and activities provided to a person who (i) was in foster care on his 18th birthday and has not yet 163 164 reached the age of 21 years; (ii) is between the ages of 18 and 21 and who, immediately prior to his 165 commitment to the Department of Juvenile Justice, was in the custody of a local board of social services; or (iii) is a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was 166 167 committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement in an independent living arrangement. Such services shall include counseling, education, housing, employment, and money 168 169 management skills development and access to essential documents and other appropriate services to help 170 children or persons prepare for self-sufficiency.

171 "Intake officer" means a juvenile probation officer appointed as such pursuant to the authority of this172 chapter.

173 "Jail" or "other facility designed for the detention of adults" means a local or regional correctional 174 facility as defined in § 53.1-1, except those facilities utilized on a temporary basis as a court holding 175 cell for a child incident to a court hearing or as a temporary lock-up room or ward incident to the 176 transfer of a child to a juvenile facility.

177 "The judge" means the judge or the substitute judge of the juvenile and domestic relations district178 court of each county or city.

179 "This law" or "the law" means the Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court Law embraced in180 this chapter.

181 "Legal custody" means (i) a legal status created by court order which vests in a custodian the right to

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182 have physical custody of the child, to determine and redetermine where and with whom he shall live, 183 the right and duty to protect, train and discipline him and to provide him with food, shelter, education 184 and ordinary medical care, all subject to any residual parental rights and responsibilities or (ii) the legal 185 status created by court order of joint custody as defined in § 20-107.2.

"Permanent foster care placement" means the place of residence in which a child resides and in 186 187 which he has been placed pursuant to the provisions of §§ 63.2-900 and 63.2-908 with the expectation 188 and agreement between the placing agency and the place of permanent foster care that the child shall 189 remain in the placement until he reaches the age of majority unless modified by court order or unless removed pursuant to § 16.1-251 or 63.2-1517. A permanent foster care placement may be a place of 190 191 residence of any natural person or persons deemed appropriate to meet a child's needs on a long-term 192 basis

"Qualified individual" means a trained professional or licensed clinician who is not an employee of 193 194 the local board of social services or licensed child-placing agency that placed the child in a qualified residential treatment program and is not affiliated with any placement setting in which children are 195 placed by such local board of social services or licensed child-placing agency. 196

197 "Qualified residential treatment program" means a program that (i) provides 24-hour residential 198 placement services for children in foster care; (ii) has adopted a trauma-informed treatment model that 199 meets the clinical and other needs of children with serious emotional or behavioral disorders, including 200 any clinical or other needs identified through assessments conducted pursuant to clause (viii) of this 201 definition; (iii) employs registered or licensed nursing and other clinical staff who provide care, on site 202 and within the scope of their practice, and are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; (iv) conducts 203 outreach with the child's family members, including efforts to maintain connections between the child and his siblings and other family; documents and maintains records of such outreach efforts; and 204 205 maintains contact information for any known biological family and fictive kin of the child; (v) whenever 206 appropriate and in the best interest of the child, facilitates participation by family members in the child's 207 treatment program before and after discharge and documents the manner in which such participation is 208 facilitated; (vi) provides discharge planning and family-based aftercare support for at least six months 209 after discharge; (vii) is licensed in accordance with 42 U.S.C. § 671(a)(10) and accredited by an 210 organization approved by the federal Secretary of Health and Human Services; and (viii) requires that 211 any child placed in the program receive an assessment within 30 days of such placement by a qualified 212 individual that (a) assesses the strengths and needs of the child using an age-appropriate, evidence-based, 213 validated, and functional assessment tool approved by the Commissioner of Social Services; (b) 214 identifies whether the needs of the child can be met through placement with a family member or in a foster home or, if not, in a placement setting authorized by 42 U.S.C. § 672(k)(2), including a qualified 215 216 residential treatment program, that would provide the most effective and appropriate level of care for the child in the least restrictive environment and be consistent with the short-term and long-term goals 217 218 established for the child in his foster care or permanency plan; (c) establishes a list of short-term and long-term mental and behavioral health goals for the child; and (d) is documented in a written report to 219 220 be filed with the court prior to any hearing on the child's placement pursuant to § 16.1-281, 16.1-282, 221 16.1-282.1, or 16.1-282.2.

222 "Residual parental rights and responsibilities" means all rights and responsibilities remaining with the 223 parent after the transfer of legal custody or guardianship of the person, including but not limited to the 224 right of visitation, consent to adoption, the right to determine religious affiliation and the responsibility 225 for support.

226 "Secure facility" or "detention home" means a local, regional or state public or private locked 227 residential facility that has construction fixtures designed to prevent escape and to restrict the movement 228 and activities of children held in lawful custody. 229

"Shelter care" means the temporary care of children in physically unrestricting facilities.

'State Board" means the State Board of Juvenile Justice.

231 "Status offender" means a child who commits an act prohibited by law which would not be criminal 232 if committed by an adult.

233 "Status offense" means an act prohibited by law which would not be an offense if committed by an 234 adult.

235 "Violent juvenile felony" means any of the delinquent acts enumerated in subsection B or C of 236 § 16.1-269.1 when committed by a juvenile 14 years of age or older. 237

§ 16.1-241. Jurisdiction; consent for abortion.

238 The judges of the juvenile and domestic relations district court elected or appointed under this law 239 shall be conservators of the peace within the corporate limits of the cities and the boundaries of the 240 counties for which they are respectively chosen and within one mile beyond the limits of such cities and counties. Except as hereinafter provided, each juvenile and domestic relations district court shall have, 241 242 within the limits of the territory for which it is created, exclusive original jurisdiction, and within one 243 mile beyond the limits of said city or county, concurrent jurisdiction with the juvenile court or courts of

244 the adjoining city or county, over all cases, matters and proceedings involving: 245

A. The custody, visitation, support, control or disposition of a child:

246 1. Who is alleged to be abused, neglected, in need of services, in need of supervision, a status 247 offender, or delinquent except where the jurisdiction of the juvenile court has been terminated or 248 divested;

249 2. Who is abandoned by his parent or other custodian or who by reason of the absence or physical 250 or mental incapacity of his parents is without parental care and guardianship;

251 2a. Who is at risk of being abused or neglected by a parent or custodian who has been adjudicated 252 as having abused or neglected another child in the care of the parent or custodian;

253 3. Whose custody, visitation or support is a subject of controversy or requires determination. In such 254 cases jurisdiction shall be concurrent with and not exclusive of courts having equity jurisdiction, except 255 as provided in § 16.1-244;

256 4. Who is the subject of an entrustment agreement entered into pursuant to § 63.2-903 or 63.2-1817 257 or whose parent or parents for good cause desire to be relieved of his care and custody;

258 5. Where the termination of residual parental rights and responsibilities is sought. In such cases 259 jurisdiction shall be concurrent with and not exclusive of courts having equity jurisdiction, as provided 260 in § 16.1-244;

6. Who is charged with a traffic infraction as defined in § 46.2-100; or

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7. Who is alleged to have refused to take a blood test in violation of § 18.2-268.2.

263 In any case in which the juvenile is alleged to have committed a violent juvenile felony enumerated 264 in subsection B of § 16.1-269.1, and for any charges ancillary thereto, the jurisdiction of the juvenile 265 court shall be limited to conducting a preliminary hearing to determine if there is probable cause to 266 believe that the juvenile committed the act alleged and that the juvenile was 14 years of age or older at 267 the time of the commission of the alleged offense, and any matters related thereto. In any case in which 268 the juvenile is alleged to have committed a violent juvenile felony enumerated in subsection C of § 16.1-269.1, and for all charges ancillary thereto, if the attorney for the Commonwealth has given 269 notice as provided in subsection C of § 16.1-269.1, the jurisdiction of the juvenile court shall be limited 270 271 to conducting a preliminary hearing to determine if there is probable cause to believe that the juvenile 272 committed the act alleged and that the juvenile was 14 years of age or older at the time of the 273 commission of the alleged offense, and any matters related thereto. A determination by the juvenile 274 court following a preliminary hearing pursuant to subsection B or C of § 16.1-269.1 to certify a charge 275 to the grand jury shall divest the juvenile court of jurisdiction over the charge and any ancillary charge. 276 In any case in which a transfer hearing is held pursuant to subsection A of § 16.1-269.1, if the juvenile 277 court determines to transfer the case, jurisdiction of the juvenile court over the case shall be divested as 278 provided in § 16.1-269.6.

279 In all other cases involving delinquent acts, and in cases in which an ancillary charge remains after a 280 violent juvenile felony charge has been dismissed or a violent juvenile felony has been reduced to a 281 lesser offense not constituting a violent juvenile felony, the jurisdiction of the juvenile court shall not be 282 divested unless there is a transfer pursuant to subsection A of § 16.1-269.1.

283 The authority of the juvenile court to adjudicate matters involving the custody, visitation, support, 284 control or disposition of a child shall not be limited to the consideration of petitions filed by a mother, 285 father or legal guardian but shall include petitions filed at any time by any party with a legitimate 286 interest therein. A party with a legitimate interest shall be broadly construed and shall include, but not 287 be limited to, grandparents, step-grandparents, stepparents, former stepparents, blood relatives and family 288 members. A party with a legitimate interest shall not include any person (i) whose parental rights have 289 been terminated by court order, either voluntarily or involuntarily, (ii) whose interest in the child derives 290 from or through a person whose parental rights have been terminated by court order, either voluntarily 291 or involuntarily, including, but not limited to, grandparents, stepparents, former stepparents, blood 292 relatives and family members, if the child subsequently has been legally adopted, except where a final 293 order of adoption is entered pursuant to § 63.2-1241, or (iii) who has been convicted of a violation of 294 subsection A of § 18.2-61, § 18.2-63, subsection B of § 18.2-366, or an equivalent offense of another 295 state, the United States, or any foreign jurisdiction, when the child who is the subject of the petition was 296 conceived as a result of such violation. The authority of the juvenile court to consider a petition 297 involving the custody of a child shall not be proscribed or limited where the child has previously been 298 awarded to the custody of a local board of social services.

299 A1. Making specific findings of fact required by state or federal law to enable a child to apply for or 300 receive a state or federal benefit.

301 B. The admission of minors for inpatient treatment in a mental health facility in accordance with the 302 provisions of Article 16 (§ 16.1-335 et seq.) and the involuntary admission of a person with mental 303 illness or judicial certification of eligibility for admission to a training center for persons with intellectual disability in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 8 (§ 37.2-800 et seq.) of Title 37.2. 304

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305 Jurisdiction of the involuntary admission and certification of adults shall be concurrent with the general 306 district court.

307 C. Except as provided in subsections D and H, judicial consent to such activities as may require 308 parental consent may be given for a child who has been separated from his parents, guardian, legal 309 custodian or other person standing in loco parentis and is in the custody of the court when such consent 310 is required by law.

311 D. Judicial consent for emergency surgical or medical treatment for a child who is neither married nor has ever been married, when the consent of his parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person 312 standing in loco parentis is unobtainable because such parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person 313 standing in loco parentis (i) is not a resident of the Commonwealth, (ii) has his whereabouts unknown, 314 315 (iii) cannot be consulted with promptness, reasonable under the circumstances, or (iv) fails to give such consent or provide such treatment when requested by the judge to do so. 316

E. Any person charged with deserting, abandoning or failing to provide support for any person in 317 violation of law. 318 319

F. Any parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis of a child:

1. Who has been abused or neglected;

321 2. Who is the subject of an entrustment agreement entered into pursuant to § 63.2-903 or 63.2-1817 322 or is otherwise before the court pursuant to subdivision A 4; or

323 3. Who has been adjudicated in need of services, in need of supervision, or delinquent, if the court 324 finds that such person has by overt act or omission induced, caused, encouraged or contributed to the 325 conduct of the child complained of in the petition.

G. Petitions filed by or on behalf of a child or such child's parent, guardian, legal custodian or other 326 327 person standing in loco parentis for the purpose of obtaining treatment, rehabilitation or other services that are required by law to be provided for that child or such child's parent, guardian, legal custodian or 328 other person standing in loco parentis. Jurisdiction in such cases shall be concurrent with and not 329 330 exclusive of that of courts having equity jurisdiction as provided in § 16.1-244.

331 H. Judicial consent to apply for a work permit for a child when such child is separated from his 332 parents, legal guardian or other person standing in loco parentis.

333 I. The prosecution and punishment of persons charged with ill-treatment, abuse, abandonment or 334 neglect of children or with any violation of law that causes or tends to cause a child to come within the 335 purview of this law, or with any other offense against the person of a child. In prosecution for felonies 336 over which the court has jurisdiction, jurisdiction shall be limited to determining whether or not there is 337 probable cause.

338 J. All offenses in which one family or household member is charged with an offense in which 339 another family or household member is the victim and all offenses under § 18.2-49.1.

340 In prosecution for felonies over which the court has jurisdiction, jurisdiction shall be limited to 341 determining whether or not there is probable cause. Any objection based on jurisdiction under this 342 subsection shall be made before a jury is impaneled and sworn in a jury trial or, in a nonjury trial, 343 before the earlier of when the court begins to hear or receive evidence or the first witness is sworn, or it 344 shall be conclusively waived for all purposes. Any such objection shall not affect or be grounds for 345 challenging directly or collaterally the jurisdiction of the court in which the case is tried.

K. Petitions filed by a natural parent, whose parental rights to a child have been voluntarily 346 347 relinquished pursuant to a court proceeding, to seek a reversal of the court order terminating such 348 parental rights. No such petition shall be accepted, however, after the child has been placed in the home 349 of adoptive parents.

350 L. Any person who seeks spousal support after having separated from his spouse. A decision under 351 this subdivision shall not be res judicata in any subsequent action for spousal support in a circuit court. 352 A circuit court shall have concurrent original jurisdiction in all causes of action under this subdivision.

353 M. Petitions filed for the purpose of obtaining an order of protection pursuant to § 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, or 16.1-279.1, and all petitions filed for the purpose of obtaining an order of protection 354 pursuant to § 19.2-152.8, 19.2-152.9, or 19.2-152.10 if either the alleged victim or the respondent is a 355 juvenile. 356

357 N. Any person who escapes or remains away without proper authority from a residential care facility 358 in which he had been placed by the court or as a result of his commitment to the Virginia Department 359 of Juvenile Justice. 360

O. Petitions for emancipation of a minor pursuant to Article 15 (§ 16.1-331 et seq.).

361 P. Petitions for enforcement of administrative support orders entered pursuant to Chapter 19 (§ 63.2-1900 et seq.) of Title 63.2, or by another state in the same manner as if the orders were entered 362 363 by a juvenile and domestic relations district court upon the filing of a certified copy of such order in the 364 juvenile and domestic relations district court.

Q. Petitions for a determination of parentage pursuant to Chapter 3.1 (§ 20-49.1 et seq.) of Title 20. 365 366 A circuit court shall have concurrent original jurisdiction to the extent provided for in § 20-49.2.

367 R. [Repealed.]

368 S. Petitions filed by school boards against parents pursuant to §§ 16.1-241.2 and 22.1-279.3.

T. Petitions to enforce any request for information or subpoend that is not complied with or to review any refusal to issue a subpoend in an administrative appeal regarding child abuse and neglect pursuant to § 63.2-1526.

U. Petitions filed in connection with parental placement adoption consent hearings pursuant to
§ 63.2-1233. Such proceedings shall be advanced on the docket so as to be heard by the court within 10
days of filing of the petition, or as soon thereafter as practicable so as to provide the earliest possible
disposition.

V. Petitions filed for the purpose of obtaining the court's assistance with the execution of consent to an adoption when the consent to an adoption is executed pursuant to the laws of another state and the laws of that state provide for the execution of consent to an adoption in the court of the 379 Commonwealth.

380 W. Petitions filed by a juvenile seeking judicial authorization for a physician to perform an abortion381 if a minor elects not to seek consent of an authorized person.

After a hearing, a judge shall issue an order authorizing a physician to perform an abortion, without
the consent of any authorized person, if he finds that (i) the minor is mature enough and well enough
informed to make her abortion decision, in consultation with her physician, independent of the wishes of
any authorized person, or (ii) the minor is not mature enough or well enough informed to make such
decision, but the desired abortion would be in her best interest.

387 If the judge authorizes an abortion based on the best interests of the minor, such order shall 388 expressly state that such authorization is subject to the physician or his agent giving notice of intent to 389 perform the abortion; however, no such notice shall be required if the judge finds that such notice would 390 not be in the best interest of the minor. In determining whether notice is in the best interest of the 391 minor, the judge shall consider the totality of the circumstances; however, he shall find that notice is not 392 in the best interest of the minor if he finds that (i) one or more authorized persons with whom the 393 minor regularly and customarily resides is abusive or neglectful, and (ii) every other authorized person, 394 if any, is either abusive or neglectful or has refused to accept responsibility as parent, legal guardian, 395 custodian or person standing in loco parentis.

396 The minor may participate in the court proceedings on her own behalf, and the court may appoint a397 guardian ad litem for the minor. The court shall advise the minor that she has a right to counsel and398 shall, upon her request, appoint counsel for her.

399 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the provisions of this subsection shall govern 400 proceedings relating to consent for a minor's abortion. Court proceedings under this subsection and 401 records of such proceedings shall be confidential. Such proceedings shall be given precedence over other 402 pending matters so that the court may reach a decision promptly and without delay in order to serve the 403 best interests of the minor. Court proceedings under this subsection shall be heard and decided as soon 404 as practicable but in no event later than four days after the petition is filed.

405 An expedited confidential appeal to the circuit court shall be available to any minor for whom the
406 court denies an order authorizing an abortion without consent or without notice. Any such appeal shall
407 be heard and decided no later than five days after the appeal is filed. The time periods required by this
408 subsection shall be subject to subsection B of § 1-210. An order authorizing an abortion without consent
409 or without notice shall not be subject to appeal.

410 No filing fees shall be required of the minor at trial or upon appeal.

411 If either the original court or the circuit court fails to act within the time periods required by this 412 subsection, the court before which the proceeding is pending shall immediately authorize a physician to 413 perform the abortion without consent of or notice to an authorized person.

414 Nothing contained in this subsection shall be construed to authorize a physician to perform an 415 abortion on a minor in circumstances or in a manner that would be unlawful if performed on an adult 416 woman.

417 A physician shall not knowingly perform an abortion upon an unemancipated minor unless consent 418 has been obtained or the minor delivers to the physician a court order entered pursuant to this section 419 and the physician or his agent provides such notice as such order may require. However, neither consent 420 nor judicial authorization nor notice shall be required if the minor declares that she is abused or 421 neglected and the attending physician has reason to suspect that the minor may be an abused or 422 neglected child as defined in § 63.2-100 and reports the suspected abuse or neglect in accordance with 423 § 63.2-1509; or if there is a medical emergency, in which case the attending physician shall certify the 424 facts justifying the exception in the minor's medical record.

425 For purposes of this subsection:

426 "Authorization" means the minor has delivered to the physician a notarized, written statement signed427 by an authorized person that the authorized person knows of the minor's intent to have an abortion and

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428 consents to such abortion being performed on the minor.

"Authorized person" means (i) a parent or duly appointed legal guardian or custodian of the minor or
(ii) a person standing in loco parentis, including, but not limited to, a grandparent or adult sibling with
whom the minor regularly and customarily resides and who has care and control of the minor. Any
person who knows he is not an authorized person and who knowingly and willfully signs an
authorization statement consenting to an abortion for a minor is guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.

"Consent" means that (i) the physician has given notice of intent to perform the abortion and has
received authorization from an authorized person, or (ii) at least one authorized person is present with
the minor seeking the abortion and provides written authorization to the physician, which shall be
witnessed by the physician or an agent thereof. In either case, the written authorization shall be
incorporated into the minor's medical record and maintained as a part thereof.

"Medical emergency" means any condition which, on the basis of the physician's good faith clinical
judgment, so complicates the medical condition of the pregnant minor as to necessitate the immediate
abortion of her pregnancy to avert her death or for which a delay will create a serious risk of substantial
and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function.

443 "Notice of intent to perform the abortion" means that (i) the physician or his agent has given actual 444 notice of his intention to perform such abortion to an authorized person, either in person or by 445 telephone, at least 24 hours previous to the performance of the abortion; or (ii) the physician or his 446 agent, after a reasonable effort to notify an authorized person, has mailed notice to an authorized person 447 by certified mail, addressed to such person at his usual place of abode, with return receipt requested, at 448 least 72 hours prior to the performance of the abortion.

"Perform an abortion" means to interrupt or terminate a pregnancy by any surgical or nonsurgicalprocedure or to induce a miscarriage as provided in § 18.2-72, 18.2-73, or 18.2-74.

"Unemancipated minor" means a minor who has not been emancipated by (i) entry into a valid
marriage, even though the marriage may have been terminated by dissolution; (ii) active duty with any
of the Armed Forces of the United States; (iii) willingly living separate and apart from his or her
parents or guardian, with the consent or acquiescence of the parents or guardian; or (iv) entry of an
order of emancipation pursuant to Article 15 (§ 16.1-331 et seq.).

456 X. Petitions filed pursuant to Article 17 (§ 16.1-349 et seq.) relating to standby guardians for minor children.

458 Y. Petitions involving minors filed pursuant to § 32.1-45.1 relating to obtaining a blood specimen or test results.

460 Z. Petitions filed pursuant to § 16.1-283.3 for review of voluntary agreements for continuation of
461 services and support for persons who meet the eligibility criteria for the Fostering Futures program set
462 forth in § 63.2-919.

463 The ages specified in this law refer to the age of the child at the time of the acts complained of in 464 the petition.

465 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no fees shall be charged by a sheriff for the service of
466 any process in a proceeding pursuant to subdivision A 3, except as provided in subdivision A 6 of
467 § 17.1-272, or subsection B, D, M, or R.

468 Notwithstanding the provisions of § 18.2-71, any physician who performs an abortion in violation of469 subsection W shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.

470 § 16.1-283.3. Review of voluntary continuing services and support agreements for former foster 471 youth.

472 A. Whenever a program participant, as defined in § 63.2-918, enters into a voluntary continuing 473 services and support agreement with a local department of social services pursuant to § 63.2-921, a 474 hearing shall be held to review the agreement and the program participant's case plan. In determining 475 whether to approve the [agreement and] case plan, the court shall determine whether remaining in the 476 care and placement responsibility of the local department of social services is in the program 477 participant's best interests and whether the program participant's case plan is sufficient to achieve the 478 goal of independence. Such hearing shall be held by the juvenile and domestic relations district court 479 that last had jurisdiction over the program participant's foster care proceedings when the program participant was a minor. The petition for review of the voluntary continuing services and support 480 agreement and the program participant's case plan shall be filed by the local department of social 481 482 services no later than 30 days after execution of the voluntary continuing services and support agreement. The petition shall include documentation of the program participant's last foster care 483 484 placement as a minor and the responsible local department of social services, a copy of the signed 485 voluntary continuing services and support agreement, a copy of the program participant's case plan, and 486 any other information the local department of social services or the program participant wishes the 487 court to consider.

488 B. Upon receiving a petition for review of the voluntary continuing services and support agreement **489** and the program participant's case plan, the court shall schedule a hearing [as soon as practicable,

490 but no later than to be held within] 45 days after receipt of the petition. [Unless the program participant waives the appointment of legal counsel for this hearing, the court shall appoint legal 491 492 counsel for the program participant, who may be the guardian ad litem who represented the program 493 participant while in foster care as a minor. Such legal counsel shall be compensated pursuant to **494** $\frac{1}{5}$ 16.1-267 The court may appoint counsel or a guardian ad litem for the program participant pursuant 495 to § 16.1-266]. The court may [, with the consent of the program participant,] reappoint or continue **496** the appointment of the court-appointed special advocate volunteer who served the program participant 497 as a minor or, if the previous volunteer is unavailable, appoint another special advocate volunteer. The 498 court shall provide notice of the hearing and copies of the petition to the program participant, the 499 program participant's legal counsel, the local department of social services, and any other persons who, 500 in the court's discretion, have a legitimate interest in the hearing. The local department of social

501 services shall identify for the court all persons who may have a legitimate interest in the hearing.

502 C. At the conclusion of the hearing, the court shall enter an order that:

503 1. Determines whether remaining under the care and placement responsibility of the local department 504 of social services is in the best interests of the program participant; and

2. Approves or denies the program participant's case plan.

506 In determining whether to approve or deny the program participant's case plan, the court shall 507 consider whether the services and support provided under the case plan are sufficient to support the 508 program participant's goal of achieving independence. If the court makes any revision to the case plan, 509 a copy of such revisions shall be sent by the court to all persons who received a copy of the original 510 case plan.

D. After the initial hearing, the court may close the case or schedule a subsequent hearing to be 511 512 held within six months to review the program participant's case plan. Subsequent review hearings may 513 be held at six-month or shorter intervals in the discretion of the court. The local department of social 514 services shall file a petition for review of the program participant's case plan [at least 45 within 30] days prior to any such scheduled hearing. If a hearing was not previously scheduled, the court shall 515 516 schedule a hearing [to be held] within 30 days of receipt of the petition. The court shall provide 517 notice of the hearing and a copy of the petition in accordance with subsection B. If subsequent review 518 hearings are not held by the court, the local department of social services shall conduct administrative 519 reviews pursuant to § 63.2-923.

520 E. In all hearings held pursuant to this section, the court shall consult with the program participant 521 in an age-appropriate manner regarding his case plan. 522

§ 63.2-100. Definitions.

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- As used in this title, unless the context requires a different meaning:
- "Abused or neglected child" means any child less than 18 years of age:

525 1. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates or inflicts, threatens to create or 526 inflict, or allows to be created or inflicted upon such child a physical or mental injury by other than 527 accidental means, or creates a substantial risk of death, disfigurement, or impairment of bodily or mental 528 functions, including, but not limited to, a child who is with his parent or other person responsible for his 529 care either (i) during the manufacture or attempted manufacture of a Schedule I or II controlled 530 substance, or (ii) during the unlawful sale of such substance by that child's parents or other person 531 responsible for his care, where such manufacture, or attempted manufacture or unlawful sale would 532 constitute a felony violation of § 18.2-248;

533 2. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care neglects or refuses to provide care 534 necessary for his health. However, no child who in good faith is under treatment solely by spiritual 535 means through prayer in accordance with the tenets and practices of a recognized church or religious 536 denomination shall for that reason alone be considered to be an abused or neglected child. Further, a 537 decision by parents who have legal authority for the child or, in the absence of parents with legal 538 authority for the child, any person with legal authority for the child, who refuses a particular medical 539 treatment for a child with a life-threatening condition shall not be deemed a refusal to provide necessary 540 care if (i) such decision is made jointly by the parents or other person with legal authority and the child; 541 (ii) the child has reached 14 years of age and is sufficiently mature to have an informed opinion on the 542 subject of his medical treatment; (iii) the parents or other person with legal authority and the child have 543 considered alternative treatment options; and (iv) the parents or other person with legal authority and the 544 child believe in good faith that such decision is in the child's best interest. Nothing in this subdivision 545 shall be construed to limit the provisions of § 16.1-278.4;

3. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care abandons such child;

4. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care commits or allows to be committed any act 547 548 of sexual exploitation or any sexual act upon a child in violation of the law;

549 5. Who is without parental care or guardianship caused by the unreasonable absence or the mental or physical incapacity of the child's parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco 550

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551 parentis;

6. Whose parents or other person responsible for his care creates a substantial risk of physical or mental injury by knowingly leaving the child alone in the same dwelling, including an apartment as defined in § 55.1-2000, with a person to whom the child is not related by blood or marriage and who the parent or other person responsible for his care knows has been convicted of an offense against a minor for which registration is required as a violent sexual offender pursuant to § 9.1-902; or

7. Who has been identified as a victim of sex trafficking or severe forms of trafficking as defined in
the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000, 22 U.S.C. § 7102 et seq., and in the Justice for Victims
of Trafficking Act of 2015, 42 U.S.C. § 5101 et seq.

560 If a civil proceeding under this title is based solely on the parent having left the child at a hospital 561 or emergency medical services agency, it shall be an affirmative defense that such parent safely 562 delivered the child to a hospital that provides 24-hour emergency services or to an attended emergency 563 medical services agency that employs emergency medical services providers, within 14 days of the 564 child's birth. For purposes of terminating parental rights pursuant to § 16.1-283 and placement for 565 adoption, the court may find such a child is a neglected child upon the ground of abandonment.

566 "Adoptive home" means any family home selected and approved by a parent, local board or a567 licensed child-placing agency for the placement of a child with the intent of adoption.

568 "Adoptive placement" means arranging for the care of a child who is in the custody of a 569 child-placing agency in an approved home for the purpose of adoption.

570 "Adult abuse" means the willful infliction of physical pain, injury or mental anguish or unreasonable571 confinement of an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603.

572 "Adult day care center" means any facility that is either operated for profit or that desires licensure 573 and that provides supplementary care and protection during only a part of the day to four or more aged, 574 infirm or disabled adults who reside elsewhere, except (i) a facility or portion of a facility licensed by 575 the State Board of Health or the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, and (ii) 576 the home or residence of an individual who cares for only persons related to him by blood or marriage. 577 Included in this definition are any two or more places, establishments or institutions owned, operated or 578 controlled by a single entity and providing such supplementary care and protection to a combined total 579 of four or more aged, infirm or disabled adults.

"Adult exploitation" means the illegal, unauthorized, improper, or fraudulent use of an adult as 580 581 defined in § 63.2-1603 or his funds, property, benefits, resources, or other assets for another's profit, 582 benefit, or advantage, including a caregiver or person serving in a fiduciary capacity, or that deprives the 583 adult of his rightful use of or access to such funds, property, benefits, resources, or other assets. "Adult **584** exploitation" includes (i) an intentional breach of a fiduciary obligation to an adult to his detriment or 585 an intentional failure to use the financial resources of an adult in a manner that results in neglect of 586 such adult; (ii) the acquisition, possession, or control of an adult's financial resources or property 587 through the use of undue influence, coercion, or duress; and (iii) forcing or coercing an adult to pay for 588 goods or services or perform services against his will for another's profit, benefit, or advantage if the 589 adult did not agree, or was tricked, misled, or defrauded into agreeing, to pay for such goods or services 590 or to perform such services.

591 "Adult foster care" means room and board, supervision, and special services to an adult who has a
592 physical or mental condition. Adult foster care may be provided by a single provider for up to three
593 adults. "Adult foster care" does not include services or support provided to individuals through the
594 Fostering Futures program set forth in Article 2 (§ 63.2-917 et seq.) of Chapter 9.

595 "Adult neglect" means that an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603 is living under such circumstances that 596 he is not able to provide for himself or is not being provided services necessary to maintain his physical 597 and mental health and that the failure to receive such necessary services impairs or threatens to impair 598 his well-being. However, no adult shall be considered neglected solely on the basis that such adult is 599 receiving religious nonmedical treatment or religious nonmedical nursing care in lieu of medical care, 590 provided that such treatment or care is performed in good faith and in accordance with the religious 591 practices of the adult and there is a written or oral expression of consent by that adult.

602 "Adult protective services" means services provided by the local department that are necessary to
 603 protect an adult as defined in § 63.2-1603 from abuse, neglect or exploitation.

"Assisted living care" means a level of service provided by an assisted living facility for adults who
 may have physical or mental impairments and require at least a moderate level of assistance with
 activities of daily living.

607 "Assisted living facility" means any congregate residential setting that provides or coordinates
608 personal and health care services, 24-hour supervision, and assistance (scheduled and unscheduled) for
609 the maintenance or care of four or more adults who are aged, infirm or disabled and who are cared for
610 in a primarily residential setting, except (i) a facility or portion of a facility licensed by the State Board
611 of Health or the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, but including any
612 portion of such facility not so licensed; (ii) the home or residence of an individual who cares for or

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maintains only persons related to him by blood or marriage; (iii) a facility or portion of a facility 613 serving infirm or disabled persons between the ages of 18 and 21, or 22 if enrolled in an educational 614 615 program for the handicapped pursuant to § 22.1-214, when such facility is licensed by the Department as a children's residential facility under Chapter 17 (§ 63.2-1700 et seq.), but including any portion of the 616 617 facility not so licensed; and (iv) any housing project for persons 62 years of age or older or the disabled 618 that provides no more than basic coordination of care services and is funded by the U.S. Department of 619 Housing and Urban Development, by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, or by the Virginia Housing **620** Development Authority. Included in this definition are any two or more places, establishments or 621 institutions owned or operated by a single entity and providing maintenance or care to a combined total 622 of four or more aged, infirm or disabled adults. Maintenance or care means the protection, general 623 supervision and oversight of the physical and mental well-being of an aged, infirm or disabled 624 individual.

625 "Auxiliary grants" means cash payments made to certain aged, blind or disabled individuals who
626 receive benefits under Title XVI of the Social Security Act, as amended, or would be eligible to receive
627 these benefits except for excess income.

628 "Birth family" or "birth sibling" means the child's biological family or biological sibling.

629 "Birth parent" means the child's biological parent and, for purposes of adoptive placement, means630 parent(s) by previous adoption.

631 "Board" means the State Board of Social Services.

632 "Child" means any natural person who is (i) under 18 years of age or (ii) [for purposes of the
633 Fostering Futures program set forth in Article 2 (§ 63.2-917 et seq.) of Chapter 9,] under 21 years of
634 age and meets the eligibility criteria [for the Fostering Futures program] set forth in § 63.2-919.

635 "Child day center" means a child day program offered to (i) two or more children under the age of
636 13 in a facility that is not the residence of the provider or of any of the children in care or (ii) 13 or
637 more children at any location.

638 "Child day program" means a regularly operating service arrangement for children where, during the
639 absence of a parent or guardian, a person or organization has agreed to assume responsibility for the
640 supervision, protection, and well-being of a child under the age of 13 for less than a 24-hour period.

641 "Child-placing agency" means (i) any person who places children in foster homes, adoptive homes or independent living arrangements pursuant to § 63.2-1819, (ii) a local board that places children in foster 642 homes or adoptive homes pursuant to §§ 63.2-900, 63.2-903, and 63.2-1221, or (iii) an entity that assists 643 644 parents with the process of delegating parental and legal custodial powers of their children pursuant to 645 Chapter 10 (§ 20-166 et seq.) of Title 20. "Child-placing agency" does not include the persons to whom 646 such parental or legal custodial powers are delegated pursuant to Chapter 10 (§ 20-166 et seq.) of Title 647 20. Officers, employees, or agents of the Commonwealth, or any locality acting within the scope of their 648 authority as such, who serve as or maintain a child-placing agency, shall not be required to be licensed.

649 "Child-protective services" means the identification, receipt and immediate response to complaints 650 and reports of alleged child abuse or neglect for children under 18 years of age. It also includes 651 assessment, and arranging for and providing necessary protective and rehabilitative services for a child 652 and his family when the child has been found to have been abused or neglected or is at risk of being 653 abused or neglected.

"Child support services" means any civil, criminal or administrative action taken by the Division of
Child Support Enforcement to locate parents; establish paternity; and establish, modify, enforce, or
collect child support, or child and spousal support.

657 "Child-welfare agency" means a child day center, child-placing agency, children's residential facility,658 family day home, family day system, or independent foster home.

⁶⁵⁹ "Children's residential facility" means any facility, child-caring institution, or group home that is
⁶⁶⁰ maintained for the purpose of receiving children separated from their parents or guardians for full-time
⁶⁶¹ care, maintenance, protection and guidance, or for the purpose of providing independent living services
⁶⁶² to persons between 18 and 21 years of age who are in the process of transitioning out of foster care.
⁶⁶³ Children's residential facility shall not include:

664 1. A licensed or accredited educational institution whose pupils, in the ordinary course of events,
 665 return annually to the homes of their parents or guardians for not less than two months of summer
 666 vacation;

667 2. An establishment required to be licensed as a summer camp by § 35.1-18; and

668 3. A licensed or accredited hospital legally maintained as such.

669 "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department, his designee or authorized 670 representative.

671 "Department" means the State Department of Social Services.

672 "Department of Health and Human Services" means the Department of Health and Human Services673 of the United States government or any department or agency thereof that may hereafter be designated

674 as the agency to administer the Social Security Act, as amended.

675 "Disposable income" means that part of the income due and payable of any individual remaining676 after the deduction of any amount required by law to be withheld.

677 "Energy assistance" means benefits to assist low-income households with their home heating and
678 cooling needs, including, but not limited to, purchase of materials or substances used for home heating,
679 repair or replacement of heating equipment, emergency intervention in no-heat situations, purchase or
680 repair of cooling equipment, and payment of electric bills to operate cooling equipment, in accordance
681 with § 63.2-805, or provided under the Virginia Energy Assistance Program established pursuant to the
682 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Act of 1981 (Title XXVI of Public Law 97-35), as amended.

683 "Family and permanency team" means the group of individuals assembled by the local department to 684 assist with determining planning and placement options for a child, which shall include, as appropriate, all biological relatives and fictive kin of the child, as well as any professionals who have served as a 686 resource to the child or his family, such as teachers, medical or mental health providers, and clergy 687 members. In the case of a child who is 14 years of age or older, the family and permanency team shall also include any members of the child's case planning team that were selected by the child in accordance with subsection A of § 16.1-281.

690 "Family day home" means a child day program offered in the residence of the provider or the home of any of the children in care for one through 12 children under the age of 13, exclusive of the **691** 692 provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, when at least one child receives care 693 for compensation. The provider of a licensed or registered family day home shall disclose to the parents 694 or guardians of children in their care the percentage of time per week that persons other than the 695 provider will care for the children. Family day homes serving five through 12 children, exclusive of the provider's own children and any children who reside in the home, shall be licensed. However, no family 696 day home shall care for more than four children under the age of two, including the provider's own **697** 698 children and any children who reside in the home, unless the family day home is licensed or voluntarily 699 registered. However, a family day home where the children in care are all related to the provider by 700 blood or marriage shall not be required to be licensed.

701 "Family day system" means any person who approves family day homes as members of its system; 702 who refers children to available family day homes in that system; and who, through contractual 703 arrangement, may provide central administrative functions including, but not limited to, training of 704 operators of member homes; technical assistance and consultation to operators of member homes; 705 inspection, supervision, monitoring, and evaluation of member homes; and referral of children to 706 available health and social services.

707 "Fictive kin" means persons who are not related to a child by blood or adoption but have an established relationship with the child or his family.

"Foster care placement" means placement of a child through (i) an agreement between the parents or guardians and the local board where legal custody remains with the parents or guardians or (ii) an entrustment or commitment of the child to the local board or licensed child-placing agency. "Foster care placement" does not include placement of a child in accordance with a power of attorney pursuant to Chapter 10 (§ 20-166 et seq.) of Title 20.

714 "Foster home" means a residence licensed by a child-placing agency or local board in which any 715 child, other than a child by birth or adoption of such person or a child who is the subject of a power of 716 attorney to delegate parental or legal custodial powers by his parents or legal custodian to the natural 717 person who has been designated the child's legal guardian pursuant to Chapter 10 (§ 20-166 et seq.) of 718 Title 20 and who exercises legal authority over the child on a continuous basis for at least 24 hours 719 without compensation, resides as a member of the household.

"General relief" means money payments and other forms of relief made to those persons mentioned
in § 63.2-802 in accordance with the regulations of the Board and reimbursable in accordance with
§ 63.2-401.

723 'Independent foster home" means a private family home in which any child, other than a child by 724 birth or adoption of such person, resides as a member of the household and has been placed therein 725 independently of a child-placing agency except (i) a home in which are received only children related by 726 birth or adoption of the person who maintains such home and children of personal friends of such 727 person; (ii) a home in which is received a child or children committed under the provisions of 728 subdivision A 4 of § 16.1-278.2, subdivision 6 of § 16.1-278.4, or subdivision A 13 of § 16.1-278.8; and 729 (iii) a home in which are received only children who are the subject of a properly executed power of 730 attorney pursuant to Chapter 10 (§ 20-166 et seq.) of Title 20.

731 "Independent living" means a planned program of services designed to assist a child age 16 and over 732 and persons who are former foster care children or were formerly committed to the Department of 733 Juvenile Justice and are between the ages of 18 and 21 in transitioning to self-sufficiency.

"Independent living arrangement" means placement of (i) a child at least 16 years of age who is inthe custody of a local board or licensed child-placing agency by the local board or licensed child-placing

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736 agency or (ii) a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was 737 committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement by the Department of 738 Juvenile Justice, in a living arrangement in which such child or person does not have daily substitute 739 parental supervision.

740 "Independent living services" means services and activities provided to a child in foster care 14 years 741 of age or older who was committed or entrusted to a local board of social services, child welfare 742 agency, or private child-placing agency. "Independent living services" may also mean services and 743 activities provided to a person who (i) was in foster care on his 18th birthday and has not yet reached 744 the age of 21 years; (ii) is between the ages of 18 and 21 and who, immediately prior to his 745 commitment to the Department of Juvenile Justice, was in the custody of a local board of social 746 services; or (iii) is a child at least 16 years of age or a person between the ages of 18 and 21 who was 747 committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice immediately prior to placement in an independent 748 living arrangement. Such services shall include counseling, education, housing, employment, and money 749 management skills development, access to essential documents, and other appropriate services to help 750 children or persons prepare for self-sufficiency.

751 "Independent physician" means a physician who is chosen by the resident of the assisted living 752 facility and who has no financial interest in the assisted living facility, directly or indirectly, as an 753 owner, officer, or employee or as an independent contractor with the residence.

754 "Intercountry placement" means the arrangement for the care of a child in an adoptive home or foster 755 care placement into or out of the Commonwealth by a licensed child-placing agency, court, or other 756 entity authorized to make such placements in accordance with the laws of the foreign country under 757 which it operates.

758 "Interstate placement" means the arrangement for the care of a child in an adoptive home, foster care 759 placement or in the home of the child's parent or with a relative or nonagency guardian, into or out of the Commonwealth, by a child-placing agency or court when the full legal right of the child's parent or 760 nonagency guardian to plan for the child has been voluntarily terminated or limited or severed by the 761 762 action of any court. 763

"Kinship care" means the full-time care, nurturing, and protection of children by relatives.

764 "Kinship guardian" means the adult relative of a child in a kinship guardianship established in 765 accordance with § 63.2-1305 who has been awarded custody of the child by the court after acting as the 766 child's foster parent.

"Kinship guardianship" means a relationship established in accordance with § 63.2-1305 between a 767 768 child and an adult relative of the child who has formerly acted as the child's foster parent that is 769 intended to be permanent and self-sustaining as evidenced by the transfer by the court to the adult 770 relative of the child of the authority necessary to ensure the protection, education, care and control, and 771 custody of the child and the authority for decision making for the child.

"Kinship Guardianship Assistance program" means a program consistent with 42 U.S.C. § 673 that 772 provides, subject to a kinship guardianship assistance agreement developed in accordance with 773 774 § 63.2-1305, payments to eligible individuals who have received custody of a relative child of whom 775 they had been the foster parents.

776 "Local board" means the local board of social services representing one or more counties or cities.

777 "Local department" means the local department of social services of any county or city in this 778 Commonwealth.

779 "Local director" means the director or his designated representative of the local department of the 780 city or county.

781 "Merit system plan" means those regulations adopted by the Board in the development and operation 782 of a system of personnel administration meeting requirements of the federal Office of Personnel 783 Management.

784 "Parental placement" means locating or effecting the placement of a child or the placing of a child in 785 a family home by the child's parent or legal guardian for the purpose of foster care or adoption.

786 "Public assistance" means Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF); auxiliary grants to the 787 aged, blind and disabled; medical assistance; energy assistance; food stamps; employment services; child 788 care; and general relief.

789 "Qualified assessor" means an entity contracting with the Department of Medical Assistance Services **790** to perform nursing facility pre-admission screening or to complete the uniform assessment instrument for 791 a home and community-based waiver program, including an independent physician contracting with the 792 Department of Medical Assistance Services to complete the uniform assessment instrument for residents 793 of assisted living facilities, or any hospital that has contracted with the Department of Medical 794 Assistance Services to perform nursing facility pre-admission screenings.

795 "Qualified individual" means a trained professional or licensed clinician who is not an employee of 796 the local board of social services or licensed child-placing agency that placed the child in a qualified

797 residential treatment program and is not affiliated with any placement setting in which children are 798 placed by such local board of social services or licensed child-placing agency.

799 "Qualified residential treatment program" means a program that (i) provides 24-hour residential 800 placement services for children in foster care; (ii) has adopted a trauma-informed treatment model that 801 meets the clinical and other needs of children with serious emotional or behavioral disorders, including 802 any clinical or other needs identified through assessments conducted pursuant to clause (viii) of this 803 definition; (iii) employs registered or licensed nursing and other clinical staff who provide care, on site 804 and within the scope of their practice, and are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; (iv) conducts outreach with the child's family members, including efforts to maintain connections between the child 805 and his siblings and other family; documents and maintains records of such outreach efforts; and 806 807 maintains contact information for any known biological family and fictive kin of the child; (v) whenever appropriate and in the best interest of the child, facilitates participation by family members in the child's 808 809 treatment program before and after discharge and documents the manner in which such participation is 810 facilitated; (vi) provides discharge planning and family-based aftercare support for at least six months after discharge; (vii) is licensed in accordance with 42 U.S.C. § 671(a)(10) and accredited by an 811 812 organization approved by the federal Secretary of Health and Human Services; and (viii) requires that 813 any child placed in the program receive an assessment within 30 days of such placement by a qualified individual that (a) assesses the strengths and needs of the child using an age-appropriate, evidence-based, 814 815 validated, and functional assessment tool approved by the Commissioner of Social Services; (b) identifies whether the needs of the child can be met through placement with a family member or in a 816 foster home or, if not, in a placement setting authorized by 42 U.S.C. § 672(k)(2), including a qualified 817 residential treatment program, that would provide the most effective and appropriate level of care for the 818 819 child in the least restrictive environment and be consistent with the short-term and long-term goals established for the child in his foster care or permanency plan; (c) establishes a list of short-term and long-term mental and behavioral health goals for the child; and (d) is documented in a written report to 820 821 822 be filed with the court prior to any hearing on the child's placement pursuant to § 16.1-281, 16.1-282, 823 16.1-282.1, or 16.1-282.2.

824 "Registered family day home" means any family day home that has met the standards for voluntary 825 registration for such homes pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board and that has obtained a 826 certificate of registration from the Commissioner.

827 "Residential living care" means a level of service provided by an assisted living facility for adults 828 who may have physical or mental impairments and require only minimal assistance with the activities of daily living. The definition of "residential living care" includes the services provided by independent 829 830 living facilities that voluntarily become licensed.

"Sibling" means each of two or more children having one or more parents in common.

832 "Social services" means foster care, adoption, adoption assistance, child-protective services, domestic 833 violence services, or any other services program implemented in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board. Social services also includes adult services pursuant to Article 4 (§ 51.5-144 et seq.) of 834 835 Chapter 14 of Title 51.5 and adult protective services pursuant to Article 5 (§ 51.5-148) of Chapter 14 836 of Title 51.5 provided by local departments of social services in accordance with regulations and under 837 the supervision of the Commissioner for Aging and Rehabilitative Services.

838 "Special order" means an order imposing an administrative sanction issued to any party licensed 839 pursuant to this title by the Commissioner that has a stated duration of not more than 12 months. A 840 special order shall be considered a case decision as defined in § 2.2-4001.

841 "Supervised independent living setting" means the residence of a person 18 years of age or older 842 who is participating in the Fostering Futures program set forth in Article 2 (§ 63.2-917 et seq.) of Chapter 9 where supervision includes a monthly visit [or video conference] with a service worker or, 843 when appropriate, contracted supervision. "Supervised independent living setting" does not include 844 845 residential facilities or group homes.

"Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" or "TANF" means the program administered by the 846 847 Department through which a relative can receive monthly cash assistance for the support of his eligible 848 children.

849 "Temporary Assistance for Needy Families-Unemployed Parent" or "TANF-UP" means the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program for families in which both natural or adoptive 850 parents of a child reside in the home and neither parent is exempt from Virginia Initiative for Education 851 852 and Work (VIEW) participation under § 63.2-609.

853 "Title IV-E Foster Care" means a federal program authorized under §§ 472 and 473 of the Social 854 Security Act, as amended, and administered by the Department through which foster care is provided on 855 behalf of qualifying children.

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Article 2. Fostering Futures. 858 § 63.2-917. Fostering Futures program; established.

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859 The Fostering Futures program is established to provide services and support to individuals 18 years 860 of age or older but less than 21 years of age who were in foster care upon turning 18 years of age. Such services and support shall be designed to assist the program participant in transitioning to 861 adulthood, becoming self-sufficient, and creating permanent, positive relationships. The program is 862 863 voluntary and shall at all times recognize and respect the autonomy of the participant. The Fostering 864 Futures program shall not be construed to abrogate any other rights that a person 18 years of age or 865 older may have as an adult under state law.

866 § 63.2-918. Definitions.

867 For purposes of this article:

868 "Case plan" means the plan developed by the local department for a program participant in 869 accordance with 42 U.S.C. § 675(1).

870 "Child" means an individual who is (i) less than 18 years of age or (ii) [for purposes of the Fostering Futures program set forth in Article 2 (§ 63.2-917 et seq.) of Chapter 9,] less than 21 years 871 872 of age and meets the eligibility criteria [for the Fostering Futures program] set forth in § 63.2-919.

"Fostering Futures" means the services and support available to individuals between 18 and 21 873 874 years of age who are participating in the Fostering Futures program.

875 "Local department" means the local department of social services under the local board having care 876 and custody of the program participant when he reached 18 years of age.

877 "Program participant" means an individual who meets the eligibility criteria set forth in § 63.2-919. 878 "Voluntary continuing services and support agreement" means a binding written agreement entered

879 into by the local department and program participant in accordance with \S 63.2-921.

880 § 63.2-919. Fostering Futures program; eligibility.

881 The Fostering Futures program is available, on a voluntary basis, to an individual between 18 and 882 21 years of age who:

883 1. Was (i) in the custody of a local department immediately prior to reaching 18 years of age, 884 remained in foster care upon turning 18 years of age, and entered foster care pursuant to a court 885 order; or (ii) in the custody of a local department immediately prior to commitment to the Department 886 of Juvenile Justice and is transitioning from such commitment to self-sufficiency; and

887 2. Is (i) completing secondary education or an equivalent credential; (ii) enrolled in an institution 888 that provides postsecondary or vocational education; (iii) employed for at least 80 hours per month; (iv) 889 participating in a program or activity designed to promote employment or remove barriers to 890 employment; or (v) incapable of doing any of the activities described in clauses (i) through (iv) due to a 891 medical condition, which incapability is supported by regularly updated information in the program 892 participant's case plan.

893 § 63.2-920. Continuing services and support.

894 Continuing services and support provided under the Fostering Futures program shall include the 895 following, where necessary: 896

1. Medical care under the state plan for medical assistance;

2. Housing, placement, and support in the form of continued foster care maintenance payments in an 897 898 amount not less than the rate set immediately prior to the program participant's exit from foster care. 899 Policies and decisions regarding housing options shall take into consideration the program participant's 900 autonomy and developmental maturity, and safety assessments of such living arrangements shall be 901 age-appropriate and consistent with federal guidance on supervised settings in which program 902 participants live independently. For program participants residing in an independent living setting, the 903 local department may send all or part of the foster care maintenance payments directly to the program 904 participant, as agreed upon by the local department and the program participant. For program 905 participants residing in a foster family home, foster care maintenance payments shall be paid to the 906 foster parents; and

907 3. Case management services, including a case plan that describes (i) the program participant's 908 housing or living arrangement; (ii) the resources available to the program participant in the transition 909 from the Fostering Futures program to independent adulthood; and (iii) the services and support to be 910 provided to meet the program participant's individual goals, provided such services and support are 911 appropriate for and consented to by the program participant. All case plans shall be developed in 912 consultation with the program participant and, at the participant's option, with up to two members of 913 the case planning team who are chosen by the program participant and are not a foster parent of or 914 caseworker for such program participant. An individual selected by a program participant to be a 915 member of the case planning team may be removed from the team at any time if there is good cause to 916 believe that the individual would not act in the best interests of the program participant.

917 § 63.2-921. Voluntary continuing services and support agreement; services provided; service 918 worker; duties.

919 A. In order to participate in the Fostering Futures program, the eligible program participant shall 920 enter into a written voluntary continuing services and support agreement with the local department. 921 Such agreement shall include, at a minimum, the following:

922 1. A requirement that the program participant maintain eligibility to participate in the Fostering 923 Futures program in accordance with the provisions of § 63.2-919 for the duration of the voluntary 924 continuing services and support agreement;

925 2. A disclosure to the program participant that participation in the Fostering Futures program is 926 voluntary and that the program participant may terminate the voluntary continuing services and support 927 agreement at any time;

928 3. The specific conditions that may result in the termination of the voluntary continuing services and 929 support agreement and the program participant's early discharge from the Fostering Futures program; 930 and

931 4. The program participant's right to appeal the denial or delay of a service required in the case 932 plan.

933 B. The services and support to be provided to the program participant pursuant to the voluntary 934 continuing services and support agreement shall begin no later than 30 days after both the program 935 participant and the local department sign the voluntary continuing services and support agreement in 936 accordance with § 63.2-921.

937 C. The local department shall assign a service worker for each participant in the Fostering Futures 938 program to provide case management services. Every service worker shall have specialized training in 939 providing transition services and support for program participants and knowledge of resources available 940 in the community.

941 D. The local department shall make continuing efforts to achieve permanency and create permanent 942 connections for all program participants.

E. The local department shall fulfill all case plan obligations consistent with the applicable 943 944 provisions of 42 U.S.C. § 675(1) for all program participants.

945 F. Upon the signing of the voluntary continuing services and support agreement by the program 946 participant and the local department, the local department shall conduct a redetermination of income 947 eligibility for purposes of Title IV-E of the federal Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 672. 948

§ 63.2-922. Termination of voluntary continuing services and support agreement; notice; appeal.

949 A. A program participant may terminate the voluntary continuing services and support agreement at 950 any time. Upon such termination, the local department shall provide the program participant with a 951 written notice informing the program participant of the potential negative effects resulting from 952 termination, the option to reenter the Fostering Futures program at any time before reaching 21 years 953 of age, and the procedures for reentering if the participant meets the eligibility criteria of § 63.2-919.

B. If the local department determines that the program participant is no longer eligible to participate 954 955 in the Fostering Futures program under § 63.2-919, the local department shall terminate the voluntary 956 continuing services and support agreement and cease the provision of all services and support to the program participant. The local department shall give written notice to the program participant 30 days 957 958 prior to termination that the voluntary continuing services and support agreement will be terminated 959 and provide (i) an explanation of the basis for termination, (ii) information about the process for 960 appealing the termination, (iii) information about the option to enter into another voluntary continuing 961 services and support agreement once the program participant reestablishes eligibility under § 63.2-919, 962 and (iv) information about and contact information for community resources that may benefit the 963 program participant, including state programs established pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 677. Academic breaks 964 in postsecondary education attendance, such as semester and seasonal breaks, and other transitions 965 between eligibility requirements under § 63.2-919, including education and employment transitions not 966 longer than 30 days, shall not be a basis for termination.

967 C. Appeals of terminations of voluntary continuing services and support agreements or denials or 968 delays of the provision of services specified in the agreement shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of § 63.2-915 and Board regulations. 969 970

§ 63.2-923. Court proceedings; administrative reviews.

971 A local department that enters into a voluntary continuing services and support agreement with a 972 program participant shall file a petition for review of the agreement and the program participant's case plan in accordance with § 16.1-283.3. If no subsequent hearings are held by the court to review the 973 974 agreement and case plan after the initial review hearing held pursuant to § 16.1-283.3, the local 975 department shall conduct administrative reviews of the case for the remaining term of the voluntary 976 continuing services and support agreement no less than every six months.

977 2. That the Department of Social Services shall, regarding the Fostering Futures program, (i) 978 establish criteria for identifying appropriate services for program participants; (ii) establish 979 requirements for program participants to be included in the voluntary continuing services and 980 support agreement, including regular contact with the program participant's service worker, 981 timely payment of rental fees, and other requirements deemed necessary based on the unique

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982 circumstances and needs of the program participant; (iii) allow local departments of social services 983 to disenroll participants from the Fostering Futures program for substantial violations of the 984 voluntary continuing services and support agreement; and (iv) develop budget or payment forms 985 to monitor the manner in which program participants are using maintenance payment funds and 986 allow increased oversight of such use when necessary.

987 [3. That the Board of Social Services (the Board) shall promulgate regulations to implement the 988 provisions of this act. The Board's initial adoption of regulations necessary to implement the 989 provisions of this act shall be exempt from the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq. of 990 the Code of Virginia), except that the Board shall provide an opportunity for public comment on 991 the regulations prior to adoption.

- 992 4. That the Department of Social Services shall analyze the feasibility of and opportunities for
- 993 allowing local departments of social services to use video conferencing for monthly visits with
- 994 participants in the Fostering Futures program in a manner that complies with federal laws and
- 995 regulations.]
