4	A BILL to amend and reenact § 4.1-206 of the Code of Virginia, relating to alcoholic beverage control;
5	limited distiller's license; allowable gallonage.

10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 4.1-206 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 4.1-206. Alcoholic beverage licenses.
13	A. The Board may grant the following licenses relating to alcoholic beverages generally:
14	1. Distillers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture alcoholic beverages other
15	than wine and beer, and to sell and deliver or ship the same, in accordance with Board regulations, in
16	closed containers, to the Board and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the
17	Commonwealth. When the Board has established a government store on the distiller's licensed premises
18	pursuant to subsection D of § 4.1-119, such license shall also authorize the licensee to make a charge to
19 20	consumers to participate in an organized tasting event conducted in accordance with subsection G of § 4.1-119 and Board regulations.
20 21	2. Limited distiller's licenses, to distilleries that manufacture not more than 36,000 gallons of
22	alcoholic beverages other than wine or beer per calendar year, provided (i) the distillery is are located
23	on a farm in the Commonwealth on land zoned agricultural and owned or leased by such distillery or its
24	owner and (ii) use agricultural products used by such distillery that are grown on the farm in the
25	manufacture of its their alcoholic beverages are grown on the farm. Limited distiller's licensees shall be
26	treated as distillers for all purposes of this title except as otherwise provided in this subdivision. For
27	purposes of this subdivision, "land zoned agricultural" means (a) land zoned as an agricultural district or
28	classification or (b) land otherwise permitted by a locality for limited distillery use. For purposes of this
29 20	subdivision, "land zoned agricultural" does not include land zoned "residential conservation." Except for
30 21	the limitation on land zoned "residential conservation," nothing in this definition shall otherwise limit or
31 32	affect local zoning authority. 3. Fruit distillers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture any alcoholic beverages
33	made from fruit or fruit juices, and to sell and deliver or ship the same, in accordance with Board
34	regulations, in closed containers, to the Board and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale
35	outside the Commonwealth.
36	4. Banquet facility licenses to volunteer fire departments and volunteer emergency medical services
37	agencies, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic
38	beverages on the premises of the licensee by any person, and bona fide members and guests thereof,
39	otherwise eligible for a banquet license. However, lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages shall not be
40 41	purchased or sold by the licensee or sold or charged for in any way by the person permitted to use the premises. Such premises shall be a volunteer fire or volunteer emergency medical services agency
41 42	station or both, regularly occupied as such and recognized by the governing body of the county, city, or
43	town in which it is located. Under conditions as specified by Board regulation, such premises may be
44	other than a volunteer fire or volunteer emergency medical services agency station, provided such other
45	premises are occupied and under the control of the volunteer fire department or volunteer emergency
46	medical services agency while the privileges of its license are being exercised.
47	5. Bed and breakfast licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) serve alcoholic beverages in
48	dining areas, private guest rooms and other designated areas to persons to whom overnight lodging is
49 50	being provided, with or without meals, for on-premises consumption only in such rooms and areas, and
50 51	without regard to the amount of gross receipts from the sale of food prepared and consumed on the premises and (ii) permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages by persons to whom
51 52	premises and (ii) permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages by persons to whom overnight lodging is being provided in (a) bedrooms or private guest rooms or (b) other designated areas
52 53	of the bed and breakfast establishment. For purposes of this subdivision, "other designated areas"
55 54	includes outdoor dining areas, whether or not contiguous to the licensed premises, which may have more
55	than one means of ingress and egress to an adjacent public thoroughfare, provided that such outdoor
56	dining areas are under the control of the licensee and approved by the Board. Such noncontiguous
57	designated areas shall not be approved for any retail license issued pursuant to subdivision A 5 of
58	§ 4.1-201.

6. Tasting licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell or give samples of alcoholic beverages
of the type specified in the license in designated areas at events held by the licensee. A tasting license
shall be issued for the purpose of featuring and educating the consuming public about the alcoholic
beverages being tasted. A separate license shall be required for each day of each tasting event. No
tasting license shall be required for conduct authorized by § 4.1-201.1.

7. Museum licenses, which may be issued to nonprofit museums exempt from taxation under
§ 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the
consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide
member and guests thereof and (ii) serve alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee to any
bona fide member and guests thereof. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in
any way by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the museum,
regularly occupied and utilized as such.

8. Equine sporting event licenses, which may be issued to organizations holding equestrian, hunt and steeplechase events, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by patrons thereof during such event. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be (i) limited to the premises of the licensee, regularly occupied and utilized for equestrian, hunt and steeplechase events and (ii) exercised on no more than four calendar days per year.

9. Day spa licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the consumption of lawfully
acquired wine or beer on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide customer of the day spa and (ii)
serve wine or beer on the premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer; however, the
licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any
such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the wine or beer served
or consumed. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the day spa regularly
occupied and utilized as such.

10. Motor car sporting event facility licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by patrons thereof during such events. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way, directly or indirectly, by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be limited to those areas of the licensee's premises designated by the Board that are regularly occupied and utilized for motor car sporting events.

90 11. Meal-assembly kitchen license, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer on the
91 premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer attending either a private gathering or a special
92 event; however, the licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or two 12-ounce
93 glasses of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the
94 wine or beer served or consumed. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the
95 meal-assembly kitchen regularly occupied and utilized as such.

12. Canal boat operator license, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of 96 97 lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide customer 98 attending either a private gathering or a special event; however, the licensee shall not sell or otherwise 99 charge a fee to such customer for the alcoholic beverages so consumed. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the licensee, including the canal, the canal boats while in operation, 100 101 and any pathways adjacent thereto. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and 102 consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations 103 covered by the license.

104 13. Annual arts venue event licenses, to persons operating an arts venue, which shall authorize the 105 licensee participating in a community art walk that is open to the public to serve lawfully acquired wine 106 or beer on the premises of the licensee to adult patrons thereof during such events. However, alcoholic 107 beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way, directly or indirectly, by the licensee, and the 108 licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any 109 one adult patron. The privileges of this license shall be (i) limited to the premises of the arts venue 110 regularly occupied and used as such and (ii) exercised on no more than 12 calendar days per year.

111 14. Art instruction studio licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer on the 112 premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer; however, the licensee shall not give more than 113 two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or 114 otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the wine or beer served or consumed. The privileges of this 115 license shall be limited to the premises of the art instruction studio regularly occupied and utilized as 116 such.

117 15. Commercial lifestyle center license, which may be issued only to a commercial owners' association governing a commercial lifestyle center, which shall authorize any retail on-premises restaurant licensee that is a tenant of the commercial lifestyle center to sell alcoholic beverages to any bona fide customer to whom alcoholic beverages may be lawfully sold for consumption on that portion

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121 of the licensed premises of the commercial lifestyle center designated by the Board, including (i) plazas, 122 seating areas, concourses, walkways, or such other similar areas and (ii) the premises of any tenant 123 location of the commercial lifestyle center that is not a retail licensee of the Board, upon approval of 124 such tenant, but excluding any parking areas. Only alcoholic beverages purchased from such retail 125 on-premises restaurant licensees may be consumed on the licensed premises of the commercial lifestyle 126 center, and such alcoholic beverages shall be contained in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers 127 with the name or logo of the restaurant licensee that sold the alcoholic beverage clearly displayed. 128 Alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way by the commercial lifestyle center 129 licensee. The licensee shall post appropriate signage clearly demarcating for the public the boundaries of the licensed premises; however, no physical barriers shall be required for this purpose. The licensee shall 130 131 provide adequate security for the licensed premises to ensure compliance with the applicable provisions 132 of this title and Board regulations.

133 16. Confectionery license, which shall authorize the licensee to prepare and sell on the licensed
134 premises for off-premises consumption confectionery that contains five percent or less alcohol by
135 volume. Any alcohol contained in such confectionery shall not be in liquid form at the time such
136 confectionery is sold.

137 17. Local special events license, which may be issued only to a locality, business improvement 138 district, or nonprofit organization and which shall authorize (i) the licensee to permit the consumption of 139 alcoholic beverages within the area designated by the Board for the special event and (ii) any permanent 140 retail on-premises licensee that is located within the area designated by the Board for the special event 141 to sell alcoholic beverages within the permanent retail location for consumption in the area designated 142 for the special event, including sidewalks and the premises of businesses not licensed to sell alcoholic 143 beverages at retail, upon approval of such businesses. In determining the designated area for the special 144 event, the Board shall consult with the locality. Local special events licensees shall be limited to 12 145 special events per year. Only alcoholic beverages purchased from permanent retail on-premises licensees located within the designated area may be consumed at the special event, and such alcoholic beverages 146 147 shall be contained in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers that clearly display the name or logo 148 of the retail on-premises licensee from which the alcoholic beverage was purchased. Alcoholic beverages 149 shall not be sold or charged for in any way by the local special events licensee. The local special events 150 licensee shall post appropriate signage clearly demarcating for the public the boundaries of the special 151 event; however, no physical barriers shall be required for this purpose. The local special events licensee 152 shall provide adequate security for the special event to ensure compliance with the applicable provisions 153 of this title and Board regulations.

154 18. Coworking establishment license, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the consumption 155 of lawfully acquired wine or beer between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on the premises of the licensee by 156 any member and up to two guests of each member, provided that such member and guests are persons 157 who may lawfully consume alcohol and an employee of the coworking establishment is present, and (ii) 158 serve wine and beer on the premises of the licensee between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. to any member 159 and up to two guests of each member, provided that such member and guests are persons to whom 160 alcoholic beverages may be lawfully served. However, the licensee shall not give more than two 161 five-ounce glasses of wine or two 12-ounce glasses of beer to any person, nor shall it sell or otherwise 162 charge a fee for the wine or beer served or consumed. For purposes of this subdivision, the payment of 163 membership dues by a member to the coworking establishment shall not constitute a sale or charge for 164 alcohol, provided that the availability of alcohol is not a privilege for which the amount of membership 165 dues increases. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the coworking establishment, regularly occupied and utilized as such. 166

167 19. Bespoke clothier establishment license, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer 168 for on-premises consumption upon the licensed premises approved by the Board to any member; 169 however, the licensee shall not give more than (i) two five-ounce glasses of wine or (ii) two 12-ounce 170 glasses of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the 171 wine or beer served or consumed. For purposes of this subdivision, the payment of membership dues by 172 a member to the bespoke clothier establishment shall not constitute a sale or charge for alcohol, 173 provided that the availability of alcohol is not a privilege for which the amount of membership dues 174 increases. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the bespoke clothier 175 establishment, regularly occupied and utilized as such.

B. Any limited distillery that, prior to July 1, 2016, (i) holds a valid license granted by the Board in accordance with this title and (ii) is in compliance with the local zoning ordinance as an agricultural district or classification or as otherwise permitted by a locality for limited distillery use shall be allowed to continue such use as provided in § 15.2-2307, notwithstanding (a) the provisions of this section or (b) a subsequent change in ownership of the limited distillery on or after July 1, 2016, whether by transfer, acquisition, inheritance, or other means. Any such limited distillery located on land zoned

182 residential conservation prior to July 1, 2016, may expand any existing building or structure and the 183 uses thereof so long as specifically approved by the locality by special exception. Any such limited 184 distillery located on land zoned residential conservation prior to July 1, 2016, may construct a new 185 building or structure so long as specifically approved by the locality by special exception. All such 186 licensees shall comply with the requirements of this title and Board regulations for renewal of such 187 license or the issuance of a new license in the event of a change in ownership of the limited distillery 188 on or after July 1, 2016.
