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## VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

2 An Act to amend and reenact § 40.1-6 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by 3 adding a section numbered 2.2-4321.3, relating to prevailing wage requirement for public works 4 contracts; penalty.

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## Approved

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7 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

8 1. That § 40.1-6 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia 9 is amended by adding a section numbered 2.2-4321.3 as follows:

10 § 2.2-4321.3. Payment of prevailing wage for work performed on public works contracts; penalty. 11 A. As used in this section: 12

"Locality" means any county, city, or town, school division, or other political subdivision.

13 "Prevailing wage rate" means the rate, amount, or level of wages, salaries, benefits, and other remuneration prevailing for the corresponding classes of mechanics, laborers, or workers employed for 14 15 the same work in the same trade or occupation (i) in the case of state agencies, in the planning district established pursuant to Chapter 42 (§ 15.2-4200 et seq.) of Title 15.2 in which the public facility or 16 17 immovable property that is the subject of the public works is located or (ii) in the case of a locality, in the locality in which the public facility or immovable property that is the subject of public works is 18 19 located, as determined by the Commissioner of Labor and Industry on the basis of applicable prevailing 20 wage rate determinations made by the U.S. Secretary of Labor under the provisions of the Davis-Bacon 21 Act, 40 U.S.C. § 276 et seq., as amended.

22 "Public works" means the operation, erection, construction, alteration, improvement, maintenance, or 23 repair of any public facility or immovable property owned, used, or leased by a state agency or locality. 24 "State agency" has the same meaning ascribed to such term in subsection A of § 2.2-4321.2.

25 B. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, each state agency, when procuring services 26 or letting contracts for public works paid for in whole or in part by state funds, or when overseeing or 27 administering such contracts for public works, shall ensure that its bid specifications or other public 28 contracts applicable to the public works require bidders, offerors, contractors, and subcontractors to 29 pay wages, salaries, benefits, and other remuneration to any mechanic, laborer, or worker employed, 30 retained, or otherwise hired to perform services in connection with the public contract for public works 31 at the prevailing wage rate. Each public contract for public works by a state agency shall contain a 32 provision requiring that the remuneration to any individual performing the work of any mechanic, 33 laborer, or worker on the work contracted to be done under the public contract shall be at a rate equal 34 to the prevailing wage rate.

35 C. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, any locality may adopt an ordinance 36 requiring that, when letting contracts for public works paid for in whole or in part by funds of the 37 locality, or when overseeing or administering a public contract, its bid specifications, project 38 agreements, or other public contracts applicable to the public works, bidders, offerors, contractors, and 39 subcontractors shall pay wages, salaries, benefits, and other remuneration to any mechanic, laborer, or 40 worker employed, retained, or otherwise hired to perform services in connection with the public contract 41 at the prevailing wage rate. Each public contract of a locality that has adopted an ordinance described 42 in this section shall contain a provision requiring that the remuneration to any individual performing 43 the work of any mechanic, laborer, or worker on the work contracted to be done under the public contract shall be at a rate equal to the prevailing wage rate. 44

45 D. Any contractor or subcontractor who employs any mechanic, laborer, or worker to perform work contracted to be done under the public contract for public works for or on behalf of a state agency or 46 47 for or on behalf of a locality that has adopted an ordinance described in subsection C or at a rate that 48 is less than the prevailing wage rate (i) shall be liable to such individuals for the payment of all wages 49 due, plus interest at an annual rate of eight percent accruing from the date the wages were due; and 50 (ii) shall be disqualified from bidding on public contracts with any public body until the contractor or subcontractor has made full restitution of the amount described in clause (i) owed to such individuals. A 51 52 contractor or subcontractor who willfully violates this section is guilty of a Class I misdemeanor.

53 E. Any interested party, which shall include a bidder, offeror, contractor, subcontractor, or operator, 54 shall have standing to challenge any bid specification, project agreement, or other public contract for 55 public works that violates the provisions of this section. Such interested party shall be entitled to 56 injunctive relief to prevent any violation of this section. Any interested party bringing a successful action SB8ER

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57 under this section shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney fees and costs from the responsible 58 party.

59 F. A representative of a state agency or a representative of a locality that has adopted an ordinance 60 described in subsection C may contact the Commissioner of Labor and Industry, at least 10 but not 61 more than 20 days prior to the date bids for such a public contract for public works will be advertised 62 or solicited, to ascertain the proper prevailing wage rate for work to be performed under the public 63 contract.

64 G. Upon the award of any public contract subject to the provisions of this section, the contractor to 65 whom such contract is awarded shall certify, under oath, to the Commissioner of Labor and Industry the 66 pay scale for each craft or trade employed on the project to be used by such contractor and any of the 67 contractor's subcontractors for work to be performed under such public contract. This certification shall, for each craft or trade employed on the project, specify the total hourly amount to be paid to employees, including wages any applicable fringe benefits, provide an itemization of the amount paid in 68 69 wages and each applicable benefit and list the names and addresses of any third party fund, plan or 70 71 program to which benefit payments will be made on behalf of employees.

72 H. Each employer subject to the provisions of this section shall keep, maintain, and preserve (i) 73 records relating to the wages paid to and hours worked by each individual performing the work of any 74 mechanic, laborer, or worker and (ii) a schedule of the occupation or work classification at which each 75 individual performing the work of any mechanic, laborer, or worker on the public works project is 76 employed during each work day and week. The employer shall preserve these records for a minimum of 77 six years and make such records available to the Department of Labor and Industry within ten days of a 78 request and shall certify that records reflect the actual hours worked and the amount paid to its workers 79 for whatever time period they request.

80 I. Contractors and subcontractors performing public works for a state agency or for a locality that has adopted an ordinance described in subsection C shall post the general prevailing wage rate for 81 each craft and classification involved, as determined by the Commissioner of Labor and Industry, 82 83 including the effective date of any changes thereof, in prominent and easily accessible places at the site 84 of the work or at any such places as are used by the contractor or subcontractors to pay workers their 85 wages. Within 10 days of such posting, a contractor or subcontractor shall certify to the Commissioner 86 of Labor and Industry its compliance with this subsection.

87 J. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any public contract for public works of \$250,00 88 or less. 89

### § 40.1-6. Powers and duties of Commissioner.

90 The Commissioner shall: 91

(1) 1. Have general supervision and control of the Department.;

92 (2) 2. Enforce the provisions of this title and shall cause to be prosecuted all violations of law 93 relating to employers or business establishments before any court of competent jurisdiction-;

94 (3) 3. Make such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the enforcement of this title and 95 procedural rules as are required to comply with the Federal federal Occupational Safety and Health Act 96 of 1970 (P.L. 91-596). All such rules and regulations shall be subject to Chapter 40 (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) 97 of Title 2.2-;

98 (4) 4. In the discharge of his duties, have power to take and preserve testimony, examine witnesses, 99 and administer oaths and to file a written or printed list of relevant interrogatories and require full and 100 complete answers to the same to be returned under oath within thirty 30 days of the receipt of such list 101 of questions.

102 (5) 5. Have power to appoint such representatives as may be necessary to aid him the Commissioner in his work; their, with the duties shall be of such representatives to be prescribed by the 103 104 Commissioner.;

105 (6) [Repealed.] 6. Determine the prevailing wage required to be paid under a public contract for public works as provided in § 2.2-4321.3 and perform all other duties imposed on the Commissioner 106 107 under such section. Any determination of the prevailing wage rate made by the Commissioner shall be 108 based on applicable prevailing wage rate determinations made by the U.S. Secretary of Labor under the 109 provisions of the Davis-Bacon Act, 40 U.S.C. § 276 et seq., as amended.

110 (7) 7. Have power to require that accident, injury, and occupational illness records and reports be 111 kept at any place of employment and that such records and reports be made available to the 112 Commissioner or his duly authorized representatives upon request. Further, he may, and to require 113 employers to develop, maintain, and make available such other records and information as are deemed 114 necessary for the proper enforcement of this title.;

115 (8) 8. Have power, upon presenting appropriate credentials to the owner, operator, or agent in charge: 116 (a) a. To enter without delay and at reasonable times any business establishment, construction site, or 117 other area, workplace, or environment where work is performed by an employee of any employer in this 118 Commonwealth; and

119 (b) b. To inspect and investigate, during regular working hours and at other reasonable times, and 120 within reasonable limits and in a reasonable manner, without prior notice, unless such notice is 121 authorized by the Commissioner or his representative, any such business establishment or place of 122 employment and all pertinent conditions, structures, machines, apparatus, devices, equipment, and 123 materials therein, and to question privately any such employer, officer, owner, operator, agent, or 124 employee. If such entry or inspection is refused, prohibited, or otherwise interfered with, the 125 Commissioner shall have power to seek from a court having equity jurisdiction an order compelling 126 such entry or inspection.;

(9) 9. Make rules and regulations governing the granting of temporary or permanent variances from all standards promulgated by the Board under this title. Any interested or affected party may appeal to the Board, the Commissioner's determination to grant or deny such a variance. The Board may, as it sees fit, adopt, modify, or reject the determination of the Commissioner-;

131 (10) All 10. Have authority to issue orders to protect the confidentiality of all information reported to or otherwise obtained by the Commissioner, the Board, or the agents or employees of either which 132 133 that contains or might reveal a trade secret. Such information shall be confidential and shall be limited 134 to those persons who need such information for purposes of enforcement of this title. The Commissioner 135 shall have authority to issue orders to protect the confidentiality of such information. Violations of such 136 orders shall be punishable as civil contempt upon application to the Circuit Court of the City of 137 Richmond. It shall be the duty of each employer to notify the Commissioner, or his representatives, of 138 the existence of trade secrets where he desires the protection provided herein.

(11) 11. Serve as executive officer of the Virginia Safety and Health Codes Board and of the
Apprenticeship Council and see that the rules, regulations, and policies that they promulgate are carried
out.
