4.	Title:	Public schools; firearm safety education program.					

- **5. Summary:** Requires local school boards to provide firearm safety education programs for students in high school. The bill requires the Board of Education to establish curriculum guidelines for the program, in consultation with the Department of State Police, and requires that the program be taught by a school resource officer, other law-enforcement officer, or a United States Armed Forces instructor. The bill prohibits the use of firearms in the program. Current law allows local school boards to provide a firearm safety education program for students in the elementary grades and does not specify who may instruct such program.
- **6. Budget Amendment Necessary**: Yes, Item 137.
- 7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Preliminary. See Item 8.
- **8. Fiscal Implications:** The Department of Education (DOE) used contracted services to develop the elementary firearm safety education program curriculum guidelines and anticipates the need for similar assistance to expand the curriculum guidelines to high school. DOE estimates a total state cost of \$35,000 in FY 2021 to meet the provisions of this bill. This estimate includes \$30,000 for consultant fees and \$5,000 for two stakeholder meetings to ensure proper development and rollout of the curriculum. The Virginia State Police does not anticipate a state cost to consult with the Board of Education to establish curriculum guidelines.
- **9. Specific Agency or Political Subdivisions Affected:** Board of Education, Department of Education, Virginia State Police, local school divisions, local law enforcement agencies, United States Armed Forces

- 11. Other Comments: This bill is similar to SB 129.
