4. Title: Virginia Sexual Assault Forensic Examiner Coordination Program

5. Summary: The proposed legislation establishes the Virginia sexual assault forensic examiner coordination program within the Department of Criminal Justice Services. The bill provides that the program shall create and coordinate an annual statewide sexual assault forensic nurse examiner training program; coordinate the development and enhancement of sexual assault forensic examiner programs across the Commonwealth; coordinate the development of hospital protocols and guidelines for treatment of survivors of sexual assault; coordinate and strengthen communications among sexual assault nurse examiner medical directors, sexual assault response teams, and hospitals for existing and developing sexual assault nurse examiner programs; provide technical assistance for existing and developing sexual assault forensic examiner programs; establish best practices for billing and reimbursement for medical services provided to survivors of sexual assault; create and maintain a statewide list, updated biannually, that includes pertinent information regarding sexual assault forensic examiners and nurse examiners; create sexual assault nurse examiner recruitment materials for universities and colleges with nursing programs; and support and coordinate community education and public outreach, when appropriate, relating to sexual assault nurse examiner issues for the Commonwealth.

8. Fiscal Implications: The proposed legislation establishes a sexual assault forensic examiner coordination program within the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), and a new position to coordinate the program. The bill also delineates 11 responsibilities of the new program coordinator, and it establishes the coordinator's authority and subsequent reporting requirements. DCJS reports that this new position established under the proposed legislation will cost the Department \$131,174, which consists of \$80,000 in salary costs and associated benefits. Additionally, DCJS states that it cannot determine at this time whether or not the duties and responsibilities specified in the proposed legislation can be fulfilled by one position, and therefore, DCJS reports that additional staffing may be necessary in the future once the workload is fully assessed. Furthermore, DCJS reports that, based on past experience, it will cost the agency approximately \$18,000 annually to conduct the annual statewide sexual assault forensic nursing training as required in the proposed legislation.

The other agencies named in the proposed legislation (the Attorney General, Department of Health, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Department of Social Services, the Department of Education, school divisions, and the State Council of Higher Education) do not anticipate a fiscal impact.
