**2. Patron:** Marsden

**3. Committee:** Passed both houses.

**4. Title:** License plates, special; repeals issuance of certain plates.

**5. Summary:** This bill repeals the authorizations for issuance of special license plates no longer issued due to low plate sales, expired authorizations, or inability to issue. In addition, the bill directs the revenue shared for previous issuances and renewals and future renewals of Kids Eat Free special license plates to the Division of Community Nutrition at the Virginia Department of Health.

**7. Fiscal Impact Estimates:** Final. See Item #8.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** This bill would repeal or amend certain license plate authorizations from previous legislative cycles due to low plate sales (currently set at 200 active plates) or lack of creation and issuance of special plates. In addition, the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is unable to disburse shared revenue from the VA Kids Eat Free plate authorization in § 1 of Chapter 776 of the Acts of Assembly of 2010 because the named recipient of those funds ceased to exist shortly after DMV first issued the plates. While ending new issuances of the plate, the bill directs those funds to the Virginia Department of Health, Division of Community Nutrition. It also would allow existing plates issued prior to July 1, 2021, to remain in use.

Implementation of this bill will require 216 programming hours, costing \$15,604. The staff hours required to implement this legislation can be accomplished during the normal work schedules for DMV employees, given current workloads. DMV would be able to absorb this cost within its existing resources.
