| 8.                                     | <b>Fiscal Implications:</b> This bill removes the sunset date for Chapter 51.1 (§ 3.2-5146 et seq.) of Title 3.2 on produce safety, which was enacted in 2017 and is set to expire upon the effective date of the repeal of certain federal regulations or on July 1, 2022, whichever occurs sooner. If the "sunset clause" is not removed through passage of this bill, produce farmers in Virginia will come under the direct regulatory authority of the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA). FDA provides grant funds to VDACS to cover all expenses associated with operating the Produce Safety Program, which ensures the safety of raw agricultural produce grown by certain produce wholesalers in Virginia. If this program is disbanded these funds will no longer be available. VDACS receives federal grant funding of \$681,000 annually to support seven positions in the Produce Safety Program. |        |              |  |            |             |           |
