2. Patron: Reeves
3. Committee: Commerce and Labor
4. Title: Overtime pay requirements; volunteers.
5. Summary: Permits individuals who work as both employees and on a volunteer basis fora public body, church, or nonprofit organization to earn overtime wages for hours worked as an employee only and continues to exclude hours worked on a volunteer basis from overtime wage requirements.
6. Budget Amendment Necessary: No
7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: Preliminary, Indeterminate - See Item 8
8. Fiscal Implications: It is anticipated that the Department of Labor and Industry will be able to absorb any increased workload that may occur as a result of this bill within resources.

Violations of the bill would be enforced under the existing subsection J of § 40.1-29, Code of Virginia, which include the potential for misdemeanor or felony charges. Any increase in jail population will increase costs to the state. The Commonwealth currently pays the localities $\$ 4.00$ a day for each misdemeanant or otherwise local-responsible prisoner held in a jail. It also funds a portion of the jails' operating costs, e.g. correctional officers. The state's share of these costs varies from locality to locality. However, according to the Compensation Board's most recent Jail Cost Report (November 2021), the estimated total state support for local jails averaged $\$ 37.58$ per inmate, per day in FY 2020. The amount of any penalty revenue that may be collected is indeterminate (not to exceed $\$ 1,000$ per violation) and would be deposited to the general fund.
