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11 12	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That §§ 54.1-3600 and 54.1-3606 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that
12 13	the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 54.1-3606.3 as follows:
13 14	§ 54.1-3600. Definitions.
15	As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:
16	"Applied psychologist" means an individual licensed to practice applied psychology.
17	"Board" means the Board of Psychology.
18	"Certified sex offender treatment provider" means a person who is certified to provide treatment to
19	sex offenders and who provides such services in accordance with the provisions of §§ 54.1-3005,
20	54.1-3505, 54.1-3611, and 54.1-3705 and the regulations promulgated pursuant to these provisions.
21	"Clinical psychologist" means an individual licensed to practice clinical psychology.
22	"Practice of applied psychology" means application of the principles and methods of psychology to
23	improvement of organizational function, personnel selection and evaluation, program planning and
24	implementation, individual motivation, development and behavioral adjustment, as well as consultation
25 26	on teaching and research.
20 27	"Practice of clinical psychology" includes, but is not limited to: 1. "Testing and measuring" which <i>that</i> consists of the psychological evaluation or assessment of
28	personal characteristics such as intelligence, abilities, interests, aptitudes, achievements, motives,
2 9	personal enancements such as mengence, admites, meress, aptitudes, admites, meress, aptitudes, admites, meress, personality dynamics, psychoeducational processes, neuropsychological functioning, or other
30	psychological attributes of individuals or groups.
31	2. "Diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders" which that consists of the appropriate
32	diagnosis of mental disorders according to standards of the profession and the ordering or providing of
33	treatments according to need. Treatment includes providing counseling, psychotherapy, marital/family
34	therapy, group therapy, behavior therapy, psychoanalysis, hypnosis, biofeedback, and other psychological
35	interventions with the objective of modification of perception, adjustment, attitudes, feelings, values,
36 37	self-concept, personality, or personal goals, the treatment of alcoholism and substance abuse, <i>the</i>
37 38	<i>treatment of</i> disorders of habit or conduct, as well as of the psychological aspects of physical illness, pain, injury, or disability.
39	3. "Psychological consulting" which <i>that</i> consists of interpreting or reporting on scientific theory or
40	research in psychology, rendering expert psychological or clinical psychological opinion, or evaluation,
41	or engaging in applied psychological research, program or organizational development, or administration,
42	supervision, or evaluation of psychological services.
43	"Practice of psychology" means the practice of applied psychology, clinical psychology, or school
44	psychology.
45	The "practice of school psychology" means:
46	1. "Testing and measuring" which that consists of psychological assessment, evaluation, and
47 48	diagnosis relative to the assessment of intellectual ability, aptitudes, achievement, adjustment, motivation, personality, or any other psychological attribute of persons as individuals or in groups that directly
4 9	relates to learning or behavioral problems that impact education.
50	2. "Counseling" which <i>that</i> consists of professional advisement and interpretive services with children
51	or adults for amelioration or prevention of problems that impact education. Counseling services relative
52	to the practice of school psychology include but are not limited to the procedures of verbal interaction,
53	interviewing, behavior modification, environmental manipulation, and group processes.
54	3. "Consultation" which that consists of educational or vocational consultation or direct educational
55	services to schools, agencies, organizations, or individuals. Psychological consulting as herein defined
56 57	relative to the practice of school psychology is directly related to learning problems and related
57 58	adjustments.
30	4. Development of programs such as designing more efficient and psychologically sound classroom

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59 situations and acting as a catalyst for teacher involvement in adaptations and innovations.

60 "Psychological practitioner" means a person licensed pursuant to § 54.1-3606.3 to diagnose and 61 treat mental and emotional disorders by providing counseling, psychotherapy, marital therapy, family therapy, group therapy, or behavioral therapy and to provide an assessment and evaluation of an 62 63 individual's intellectual or cognitive ability, emotional adjustment, or personality, as related to the

64 treatment of mental or emotional disorders.

65 "Psychologist" means a person licensed to practice school, applied, or clinical psychology.

"School psychologist" means a person licensed by the Board of Psychology to practice school 66 67 psychology.

§ 54.1-3606. License required.

A. In order to engage in the practice of applied psychology, school psychology, or clinical 69 70 psychology, or to engage in practice as a psychological practitioner, it shall be necessary to hold a 71 license.

B. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision 4 of § 54.1-3601 or any Board regulation, the 72 Board of Psychology shall license, as school psychologists-limited, persons licensed by the Board of 73 74 Education with an endorsement in psychology and a master's degree in psychology. The Board of 75 Psychology shall issue licenses to such persons without examination, upon review of credentials and 76 payment of an application fee in accordance with regulations of the Board for school 77 psychologists-limited.

78 Persons holding such licenses as school psychologists-limited shall practice solely in public school 79 divisions; holding a license as a school psychologist-limited pursuant to this subsection shall not 80 authorize such persons to practice outside the school setting or in any setting other than the public schools of the Commonwealth, unless such individuals are licensed by the Board of Psychology to offer 81 to the public the services defined in § 54.1-3600. 82

83 The Board shall issue persons, holding licenses from the Board of Education with an endorsement in 84 psychology and a license as a school psychologist-limited from the Board of Psychology, a license which notes the limitations on practice set forth in this section. 85

Persons who hold licenses as psychologists issued by the Board of Psychology without these 86 87 limitations shall be exempt from the requirements of this section. 88

§ 54.1-3606.3. Licensure of psychological practitioners; independent practice.

89 A. It is unlawful for any person to practice or hold himself out as a psychological practitioner in the 90 Commonwealth or use the title of psychological practitioner unless he holds a license issued by the 91 Board.

92 B. The Board shall establish criteria for licensure as a psychological practitioner, which shall 93 include the following:

1. Documentation that the applicant received a master's degree in psychology or counseling 94 95 psychology from a program accredited by the American Psychological Association, from a program 96 equivalent to those accredited by the American Psychological Association as determined by the Board, 97 or from a program accredited by another national accrediting body approved by the Board; and

98 2. Documentation that the applicant successfully completed the academic portion of a national exam 99 recognized by the Board.

100 \tilde{C} . Every psychological practitioner who meets the requirements of subsection B shall practice under 101 the supervision of a clinical psychologist unless the requirements of subsection D are met. The Board 102 shall determine the requirements and procedures for such supervision. 103

D. A psychological practitioner may practice without supervision upon:

1. Successful completion of the clinical portion of a national exam recognized by the Board; and

105 2. Completion of one year of full-time experience, as determined by the Board, of practice under the supervision of a clinical psychologist. 106

107 Upon receipt of documentation of such examination and experience requirements and a fee as 108 established by the Board, the Board shall issue to the psychological practitioner a new license that 109 includes a designation indicating that the psychological practitioner is authorized to practice 110 independently. 111

E. The Board shall determine appropriate standards of practice for psychological practitioners.

F. The Board shall promulgate such regulations as may be necessary to implement the provisions of 112 113 this section.

2. That the Board of Psychology shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this 114 115 act to be effective within 280 days of its enactment.
