Position established; agencies for which responsible. Secretary. CHAPTER 4.2:3. CHIEF RESILIENCE OFFICER OF THE COMMONWEALTH. § 2.2-435.13. Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth; Office of Commonwealth Resilience. A. The position of Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth is created within the Office of the Officer in the discharge of his duties upon request. associated with adaptation. The Chief Resilience Officer, in his role, shall also: order to increase the resilience of such areas; 2. Provide support to local governments, as that term is defined in § 10.1-603.28, that are seeking to implementation;

50 4. Assist the Department of Conservation and Recreation with the development and implementation 51 of a Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan and a Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan pursuant to 52 § 10.1-602;

53 5. Seek to maximize the coordination, availability, and use of federal, state, and private funding to 54 address resilience challenges, including initiating and assisting with the pursuit of funding opportunities at the state and local levels. In order to maximize federal funding, the Chief Resilience Officer is 55 56 authorized to:

57 a. Serve as a non-federal sponsor, as that term is described in 33 C.F.R. § 203.15, and enter into a legal agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for the purpose of mitigating flooding and 58 59 integrating resilience, at the request of and in coordination with an eligible funding recipient;

The position of Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources (the Secretary) is created. The Secretary 16 17 shall be responsible to the Governor for the following agencies: Department of Conservation and Recreation, Department of Historic Resources, Marine Resources Commission, Department of Wildlife 18 Resources, and the Department of Environmental Quality and for the Chief Resilience Officer pursuant 19 20 to $\frac{1}{2}$ \frac 21 Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources or reassign any agency listed in this section to another 22 23

26 27 Governor and the Chief Resilience Officer shall be appointed by the Governor. The Chief Resilience 28 Officer shall serve as the primary coordinator of resilience and adaptation initiatives in Virginia and as 29 the primary point of contact regarding issues related to resilience, as that term is defined in § 10.1-603.28. The Chief Resilience Officer shall be equally responsible for all urban, suburban, and 30 31 rural areas of the Commonwealth. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall assist the Chief Resilience 32

33 B. The Chief Resilience Officer shall (i) promote communication, coordination, and cooperation between state agencies, the federal government, local governments, other political subdivisions of the 34 35 Commonwealth, and other interested parties regarding resilience; (ii) lead in developing and in 36 providing direction and ensuring accountability for a statewide resilience and adaptation strategy; (iii) 37 seek to ensure that resilience and adaptation strategies prioritize the protection of Virginia's natural 38 resources and maximize the implementation of nature-based design while supporting Virginia's statutory 39 obligations to clean water; and (iv) initiate and assist with economic development opportunities 40

41 1. Identify and monitor those areas of the Commonwealth that are at greatest risk from significant 42 multi-hazard threats and recommend actions that both the private and public sectors should consider in 43

44 45 promote resilience within their communities by providing technical assistance and capacity building support regarding best practices for resilience planning, data collection, and project design and 46 47

48 3. Coordinate with the Department of Emergency Management on all issues related to pre-disaster 49 hazard mitigation and post-disaster recovery;

60 b. Enter into and execute agreements with the federal government, including the U.S. Department of Defense, for support for flood control initiatives to increase resilience related to U.S. Department of 61

62 Defense installations; and

63 c. Make applications on behalf of the Commonwealth for other federal funding as directed by the 64 Governor:

65 6. Coordinate the collection and dissemination of the best available resilience science, legal 66 guidance, planning strategies, best practices, and needs assessments to the public. Such needs 67 assessments shall include any local government needs assessments that have been submitted to the Chief 68 Resilience Officer. Such information shall be made available on a publicly accessible website; and

69 7. Beginning July 1, 2025, and every two years thereafter, report to the Governor and the General 70 Assembly on the status of resilience in the Commonwealth. Such report shall include the status of actions undertaken by the Chief Resilience Officer and state agencies regarding resilience coordination 71 72 and planning and all resilience funding received and distributed by the Commonwealth during the prior two years. In preparing such report, the Chief Resilience Officer shall also coordinate with the Director 73 74 of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and shall be assisted by all relevant Secretariats and agencies.

75 C. There is hereby created the Office of Commonwealth Resilience, which shall be led by the Chief Resilience Officer, to support the Chief Resilience Officer in the discharge of his functions and duties 76 pursuant to subsection B and as otherwise provided by law. The Chief Resilience Officer may employ 77 78 additional professionals as the Chief Resilience Officer deems necessary and such professionals shall be 79 subject to the Virginia Personnel Act (§ 2.2-2900 et seq.).

§ 2.2-435.14. Interagency Resilience Working Group. 80

A. The Chief Resilience Officer shall convene an Interagency Resilience Working Group (the Group) 81 to support the coordination of planning and implementation of resilience efforts, and he shall serve as 82 chairman of the Group. The Group shall meet on the call of the chairman but not less than once every 83 three months. The responsibilities of the Group shall include: 84

85 1. Exchanging information and best practices related to resilience, including means of integrating 86 common language and practices for resilience work across agencies;

87 2. Advising the Chief Resilience Officer on strategies for enhancing resilience planning and funding 88 coordination across agencies under a unified statewide approach to resilience; and 89

3. Recommending metrics for measuring the progress of resilience efforts in the Commonwealth.

90 B. Membership of the Group shall include representatives from the Departments of Agriculture and 91 Consumer Services, Conservation and Recreation, Emergency Management, Energy, Environmental Quality, Forestry, General Services, Health, Historic Resources, Housing and Community Development, 92 93 Transportation, and Wildlife Resources; the Marine Resources Commission; the Virginia Resources 94 Authority; the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion; and others as appointed by the Governor. Each 95 agency participating in the Group shall designate a resilience coordinator to represent such agency in 96 the Group. 97

§ 10.1-104.6:1. ConserveVirginia program established.

98 A. The Department shall develop a program for the creation, maintenance, operation, and regular 99 updating of a data-driven Geographical Information Systems model to prioritize potential conservation areas across the Commonwealth that would provide quantifiable benefits to the citizens of Virginia. Such 100 program shall be known as ConserveVirginia. The model shall synthesize multiple mapped data inputs, 101 102 divided into categories, each representing a different overarching conservation value, including (i) agriculture and forestry, (ii) natural habitat and ecosystem diversity, (iii) floodplains and flooding 103 resilience, (iv) cultural and historic preservation, (v) scenic preservation, (vi) protected landscapes 104 resilience, and (vii) water quality improvement. 105

B. The Department shall consult regularly with the Chief Resilience Officer, the Special Assistant for 106 Coastal Adaptation and Protection of the Commonwealth, the Department of Forestry, the Department of 107 108 Agriculture and Consumer Services, the Department of Historic Resources, the Department of Wildlife 109 Resources, the Department of Environmental Quality, the Marine Resources Commission, and any other 110 state or federal agency or private organization deemed appropriate to provide data or information to 111 update methodologies, map layers, and emerging conservation priorities.

112 C. The Department shall review and revise the methodology used to develop and prioritize each conservation value identified in subsection A. The Department shall conduct such review and revision 113 114 process no less than once every two years, and such process shall include public hearings and solicitation of public comment. The Department shall continue to develop ways to incorporate and 115 116 encourage environmental justice, as defined in § 2.2-234, into all existing and future conservation values. The Department shall not utilize any methodology or conservation value to limit a landowner's decision 117 on implementing any aspect of an approved forest management plan or any appropriate best 118 119 management practice to achieve water quality improvements.

D. The Department shall provide access to the ConserveVirginia model to the public and all state 120 and federal agencies that benefit by using ConserveVirginia to determine conservation priorities. 121

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122 E. The Department shall incorporate ConserveVirginia into acquisition or grant decisions when 123 appropriate.

124 F. The Department shall utilize information provided by the Department of Agriculture and 125 Consumer Services and the Department of Forestry when creating the Agriculture and Forestry map 126 layers of ConserveVirginia. Such information shall include, as appropriate, new data sources that better 127 reflect the economic viability of working farms and forests. The Department of Agriculture and 128 Consumer Services and the Department of Forestry shall engage agriculture and forestry stakeholders to 129 improve and refine the ConserveVirginia model to accurately reflect the conservation value of 130 agricultural and forestal land in the Commonwealth. Such information shall inform whether the 131 ConserveVirginia conservation values related to agriculture and forestry have been achieved. 132

§ 10.1-603.25. Virginia Community Flood Preparedness Fund; loan and grant program.

133 A. The Virginia Shoreline Resiliency Community Flood Preparedness Fund is hereby continued established as a permanent and perpetual fund to be known as the Virginia Community Flood 134 135 Preparedness Fund. All sums that are designated for deposit in the Fund from revenue generated by the sale of emissions allowances pursuant to subdivision C 1 of § 10.1-1330, all sums that may be 136 137 appropriated to the Fund by the General Assembly, all receipts by the Fund from the repayment of loans 138 made by it to local governments, all income from the investment of moneys held in the Fund, and any 139 other sums designated for deposit to the Fund from any source, public or private, including any federal 140 grants and awards or other forms of assistance received by the Commonwealth that are eligible for 141 deposit in the Fund under federal law, shall be designated for deposit to the Fund. Interest earned on 142 moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys remaining in the Fund, 143 including any appropriated funds and all principal, interest accrued, and payments, at the end of each 144 fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund but shall remain in the Fund. All loans and grants provided under this article shall be deemed to promote the public purposes of enhancing flood 145 146 prevention or protection and coastal resilience.

147 B. Moneys in the Fund shall be used solely for the purposes of enhancing flood prevention or 148 protection and coastal resilience as required by this article. The Authority shall manage the Fund and 149 shall establish interest rates and repayment terms of such loans as provided in this article in accordance 150 with a memorandum of agreement with the Department. The Authority may disburse from the Fund its 151 reasonable costs and expenses incurred in the management of the Fund. The Department shall direct 152 distribution of loans and grants from the Fund in accordance with the provisions of subsection D.

153 C. The Authority is authorized at any time and from time to time to pledge, assign, or transfer from 154 the Fund or any bank or trust company designated by the Authority any or all of the assets of the Fund 155 to be held in trust as security for the payment of principal of, premium, if any, and interest on any and 156 all bonds, as defined in § 62.1-199, issued to finance any flood prevention or protection project 157 undertaken pursuant to the provisions of this article. In addition, the Authority is authorized at any time 158 and from time to time to sell upon such terms and conditions as the Authority deems appropriate any loan or interest thereon made pursuant to this article. The net proceeds of the sale remaining after 159 160 payment of costs and expenses shall be designated for deposit to, and become part of, the Fund.

161 D. 1. The Fund shall be administered by the Department as prescribed in this article. The 162 Department, in consultation with the Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources and the Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation and Protection Chief Resilience Officer of the 163 Commonwealth, shall establish guidelines regarding the distribution and prioritization of loans and 164 grants, including loans and grants that support flood prevention or protection studies of statewide or 165 166 regional significance. The Department shall develop and provide an opportunity for a 30-day public comment period prior to each new grant or loan offering to solicit feedback on proposed revisions to 167 168 the Virginia Community Flood Preparedness Manual. A record of each application for a grant or loan 169 and the action taken thereon shall be available for public inspection at the office of the Department and 170 on a publicly accessible website.

171 2. The Director shall convene an Advisory Review Committee (the Committee) to assist in the distribution of loans and grants from the Fund. The Committee shall review applications to the Fund 172 173 and make recommendations on the disbursement of moneys from the Fund and any other appropriate 174 issues to the Department, the Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources, and the Chief Resilience 175 Officer of the Commonwealth. The Committee shall include representatives from the Department of 176 Emergency Management, the Department of Environmental Quality, the Department of Housing and 177 Community Development, a nonprofit group engaged in resilience efforts, the agriculture industry, the 178 manufacturing industry, and the business community, the Virginia Director of the Chesapeake Bay 179 Commission, and others as the Director deems appropriate. Appointed members of the Committee shall 180 serve without compensation.

181 E. Localities shall use moneys from the Fund primarily for the purpose of implementing flood 182 prevention and protection projects and studies in areas that are subject to recurrent flooding as confirmed 183 by a locality-certified floodplain manager. Moneys in the Fund may be used to mitigate future flood 184 damage and to assist inland and coastal communities across the Commonwealth that are subject to 185 recurrent or repetitive flooding. No less than 25 percent of the moneys disbursed from the Fund each 186 year shall be used for projects in low-income geographic areas. Priority shall be given to projects that 187 implement community-scale hazard mitigation activities that use nature-based solutions to reduce flood 188 risk.

189 F. Any locality is authorized to secure a loan made pursuant to this section by placing a lien up to 190 the value of the loan against any property that benefits from the loan. Such a lien shall be subordinate 191 to each prior lien on such property, except prior liens for which the prior lienholder executes a written 192 subordination agreement, in a form and substance acceptable to the prior lienholder in its sole and 193 exclusive discretion, that is recorded in the land records where the property is located.

G. Any locality using moneys in the Fund to provide a loan for a project in a low-income 194 195 geographic area is authorized to forgive the principal of such loan. If a locality forgives the principal of any such loan, any obligation of the locality to repay that principal to the Commonwealth shall not be 196 197 forgiven and such obligation shall remain in full force and effect. The total amount of loans forgiven by 198 all localities in a fiscal year shall not exceed 30 percent of the amount appropriated in such fiscal year 199 to the Fund by the General Assembly. 200

§ 10.1-603.29. Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund.

201 There shall be set apart A. The Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund is established as a permanent and 202 perpetual fund, to be known as the "Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund,". All sums appropriated to the 203 Fund by the General Assembly, all sums allocated to the Commonwealth for resilience purposes through 204 the federal government, all receipts by the Fund from loans made by it to local governments, all income from the investment of moneys held in the Fund, and any other sums designated for deposit to the Fund 205 206 from any source public or private shall be designated for deposit to the Fund. The Fund shall be 207 administered and managed by the Authority as prescribed in this article, subject to the right of the 208 Department, following consultation with the Authority, the Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources, 209 and the Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth, to direct the distribution of loans or grants from 210 the Fund to particular local governments and to establish the interest rates and repayment terms of such 211 loans as provided in this article. A portion of the Fund shall be reserved to hold money that is allocated only for the hazard mitigation of buildings and that shall not be available for other uses. In order to 212 213 carry out the administration and management of the Fund, the Authority is granted the power to employ 214 officers, employees, agents, advisers, and consultants, including, without limitation, attorneys, financial 215 advisers, engineers, and other technical advisers and public accountants and, the provisions of any other 216 law to the contrary notwithstanding, to determine their duties and compensation without the approval of 217 any other agency or instrumentality. The Authority may disburse from the Fund its reasonable costs and 218 expenses incurred in the administration and management of the Fund and a reasonable fee to be 219 approved by the Department for its management services. The Authority may provide a portion of that 220 fee to the Department to cover the Department's costs and expenses in administering the Fund.

221 B. 1. The Department shall develop and provide an opportunity for a 30-day public comment period 222 prior to each new loan or grant offering to solicit feedback on proposed revisions to the Resilient 223 Virginia Revolving Fund Manual. A record of each application for a grant or loan from the Fund and 224 the action taken thereon shall be available for public inspection at the office of the Department and on 225 a publicly accessible website.

226 2. The Director shall convene an Advisory Review Committee (the Committee) to assist in the distribution of loans and grants from the Fund. The Committee shall review applications to the Fund 227 228 and make recommendations on the disbursement of moneys from the Fund and any other appropriate 229 issues to the Department, the Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources, and the Chief Resilience 230 Officer of the Commonwealth. The Committee shall include representatives from the Department of 231 Emergency Management, the Department of Environmental Quality, the Department of Housing and Community Development, a nonprofit group engaged in resilience efforts, the agriculture industry, the 232 233 manufacturing industry, and the business community, the Virginia Director of the Chesapeake Bay 234 Commission, and others as the Director deems appropriate. Appointed members of the Committee shall 235 serve without compensation. 236

§ 10.1-659. Flood protection programs; coordination.

237 A. The provisions of this chapter shall be coordinated with the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master 238 Plan, the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan, and federal, state, and local flood prevention and water 239 quality programs to minimize loss of life, property damage, and negative impacts on the environment. 240 This program coordination shall include but not be limited to the following: flood prevention, flood plain management, small watershed protection, dam safety, shoreline erosion and public beach 241 preservation, and soil conservation programs of the Department of Conservation and Recreation; the 242 243 construction activities of the Department of Transportation, including projects that result in hydrologic 244 modification of rivers, streams, and flood plains; the nontidal wetlands, water quality, Chesapeake Bay

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245 Preservation Area criteria, stormwater management, erosion and sediment control, and other water management programs of the State Water Control Board; the Virginia Coastal Zone Management 246 247 Program at the Department of Environmental Quality; forested watershed management programs of the 248 Department of Forestry; the agricultural stewardship, farmland preservation, and disaster assistance 249 programs of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services; the statewide building code and 250 other land use control programs of the Department of Housing and Community Development; the habitat 251 management programs of the Virginia Marine Resources Commission; the hazard mitigation planning 252 and disaster response programs of the Department of Emergency Management; the fish and wildlife 253 habitat protection programs of the Department of Wildlife Resources; the mineral extraction regulatory 254 program of the Department of Energy; the flood plain restrictions of the Virginia Waste Management 255 Board; flooding-related research programs of the state universities; local government assistance programs 256 of the Virginia Soil and Water Conservation Board; the Virginia Antiquities Act program of the Department of Historic Resources; the public health and preparedness programs of the Virginia 257 258 Department of Health; the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia; the State Corporation 259 Commission; and any other state agency programs deemed necessary by the Director, and the Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth, and the Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal 260 261 Adaptation and Protection. The Department shall also coordinate with soil and water conservation 262 districts, Virginia Cooperative Extension agents, and planning district commissions, and shall coordinate 263 and cooperate with localities in rendering assistance to such localities in their efforts to comply with the 264 planning, subdivision of land, and zoning provisions of Chapter 22 (§ 15.2-2200 et seq.) of Title 15.2.

265 B. The Director, in coordination with the Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation 266 and Protection and the Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth, shall hold meetings of 267 representatives of the programs, entities, and localities described in subsection A at least annually in 268 order to determine, coordinate, and prioritize the Commonwealth's efforts and expenditures to increase 269 flooding resilience and flood preparedness and to implement the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan 270 and the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan. The Department shall review any revisions to the 271 Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan and provide an update on the progress of the implementation of 272 the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan at any such meetings. The Department shall cooperate with 273 other public and private agencies having flood plain management programs and shall coordinate its 274 responsibilities under this article and any other law. These activities shall constitute the Commonwealth's 275 flood resilience, preparedness, prevention, and protection program.

C. 1. The Director, in coordination with the Chief Resilience Officer, in coordination with the
Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation and Protection and the Director of the *Commonwealth*, shall establish the Virginia Coastal Resilience Technical Advisory Committee (the
Committee) to assist with developing, updating, and implementing the Virginia Coastal Resilience
Master Plan.

281 2. The Committee shall be comprised composed of representatives of state agencies, coastal planning 282 district commissions, regional commissions, academic advisors, and any other representatives as needed. 283 Members shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor and shall include the following individuals or their 284 designees: the executive directors of coastal planning district commissions and regional commissions; the Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation and Protection; the Director; the Chief 285 286 Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth; the Director of the Virginia Department of Emergency 287 Management; the Director of the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development; the 288 Executive Director of the Virginia Resources Authority; the Director of the Department of 289 Environmental Quality; the Commissioner of the Virginia Department of Transportation; the Director of 290 the Virginia Transportation Research Council; the Commissioner of the Virginia Marine Resources 291 Commission; the Director of the Institute for Coastal Adaptation and Resilience; the Associate Dean for 292 Research and Advisory Services at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science; the Director of the William 293 and Mary School of Law Coastal Policy Center Virginia Coastal Resilience Collaborative at the College 294 of William and Mary in Virginia; the Director of the Virginia Tech Center for Coastal Studies; the 295 Director of the Environmental Resilience Institute at the University of Virginia; the Director of Virginia 296 Sea Grant; the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion; and the Chief Data Officer of the 297 Commonwealth. The Chief Resilience Officer Director shall serve as chairman of the Committee and 298 the Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth shall serve as vice-chairman of the Committee.

30 3. The Chief Resilience Officer Director shall invite participation by the Commander of the U.S.
300 Army Corps of Engineers, Norfolk District; the Commander of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers,
301 Baltimore District; the Commander of the Navy Region Mid-Atlantic; and representatives of the seven
302 federally recognized Tribal Nations indigenous to the Commonwealth of Virginia.

- **303** 4. Appointed members shall serve in an advisory role without compensation.
- **304** 5. The Committee shall meet at least quarterly.

305 6. The Department, the Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation and Protection

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306 Office of Commonwealth Resilience, and the Coastal Zone Management Program shall provide staff 307 support to the Committee.

308 $\overline{7}$. The Committee shall ensure that (i) risk evaluations and project prioritization protocols are 309 regularly updated and are informed by the best applicable scientific and technical data; (ii) statewide and 310 regional needs are addressed using the best applicable science and long-term resilience approaches; and 311 (iii) the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Planning Framework is adhered to in the development and 312 updating of the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan. The Committee shall also review updates to the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan and receive updates about the progress of the Virginia Flood 313 314 Protection Master Plan at each meeting. Additionally, the Committee may be called upon to assist the Department with the development and updating of the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan. 315

D. 1. The Director, in coordination with the Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth, shall 316 establish the Virginia Flood Resilience Advisory Committee (the Committee) to assist with developing, 317 318 updating, and implementing the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan pursuant to § 10.1-602 and implementing the Commonwealth's flood resilience, preparedness, prevention, and protection programs. 319

320 2. The Committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor and be composed of the following 321 individuals representing state agencies, or their designees: the Director, the Chief Resilience Officer of 322 the Commonwealth, the Director of the Department of Emergency Management, the Director of the 323 Department of Housing and Community Development, the Executive Director of the Virginia Resources 324 Authority, the Director of the Department of Environmental Quality, the Commissioner of the 325 Department of Transportation, the Director of the Office of Intermodal Planning and Investment, the Commissioner of Marine Resources, the Director of the Department of General Services, the Virginia Director of the Chesapeake Bay Commission, and the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. 326 327 Committee membership shall also include one representative from each of the following: the Virginia Association of Planning District Commissions, the Virginia Municipal League, and the Virginia Association of Counties. The Director may invite participation by other representatives as deemed 328 329 330 appropriate. The Director shall serve as chairman of the Committee. The Chief Resilience Officer of the 331 332 Commonwealth shall serve as vice-chairman of the Committee. 333

3. Members appointed to the Committee shall serve in an advisory role without compensation.

4. The Committee shall meet at least two times per calendar year.

335 5. The Department and the Office of Commonwealth Resilience shall provide staff support to the 336 Committee.

337 6. The Committee shall receive updates to the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan, the Coastal 338 Resilience Master Plan, and other regional flood resilience plans. The Committee shall advise the Department on (i) assessing the impacts of flooding on people, the economy, and the environment; (ii) 339 340 establishing and measuring flood resilience goals and metrics for the Commonwealth; (iii) prioritizing 341 state policies, programs, funding, and other strategies to mitigate the impacts of severe and repetitive 342 flooding; (iv) enhancing intergovernmental and interagency coordination for flood resilience planning 343 and strategy implementation; (v) conducting stakeholder outreach and engagement in support of flood 344 resilience planning and implementation; (vi) assisting local governments to minimize loss of life, 345 property damage, and negative impacts on the environment resulting from flooding; and (vii) issues relating to the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan in accordance with the requirements established 346 347 in § 10.1-602.

348 7. The Director may establish subcommittees or other bodies to advise on the development and 349 implementation of the Coastal Resilience Master Plan and other regional flood resilience plans.

350 8. The Department shall engage with the following entities in the development of the Virginia Flood 351 Protection Master Plan: the federally recognized Tribal Nations indigenous to the Commonwealth, the flooding-related research programs of institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth, the 352 353 agricultural community, the economic development community, environmental nonprofit organizations, 354 local governments, planning district commissions, regional commissions, the Commander of the U.S. 355 Army Corps of Engineers for each District that includes a portion of the Commonwealth, the 356 Commander of the U.S. Navy Region Mid-Atlantic, and other federal facilities located within the 357 Commonwealth.

358 2. That §§ 2.2-220.5 and 2.2-435.11 of the Code of Virginia are repealed.

3. That the provisions of subsection C of § 10.1-659 of the Code of Virginia, as amended by this 359 360 act, shall expire on February 1, 2025.

4. That the provisions of subsection D of § 10.1-659 of the Code of Virginia, as amended by this 361 362 act, shall become effective on February 1, 2025.

5. The Chief Resilience Officer of the Commonwealth shall submit a report on the funding and 363 364 staffing needs of the Office of Commonwealth Resilience, as created by this act, to the Chairmen of the House Committee on Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources, the House Committee 365

on Appropriations, the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources, 366

367 and the Senate Committee on Finance and Appropriations no later than December 31, 2025.
