5 6	(Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Durant) A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 54.1-3500 and 54.1-3505 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the
7	Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 35 of Title 54.1 an article numbered 4, consisting of sections
8	numbered 54.1-3518 through 54.1-3521, relating to behavioral health technicians; behavioral health
9	technician assistants; qualified mental health professionals; qualified mental health
10	professional-trainees; scope of practice, supervision, and qualifications.
11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That §§ 54.1-3500 and 54.1-3505 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that
13	the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 35 of Title 54.1 an article numbered 4, consisting of applications numbered 54.1.2518 through 54.1.2521, as follows:
14 15	consisting of sections numbered 54.1-3518 through 54.1-3521, as follows: § 54.1-3500. Definitions.
16	As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:
17	"Appraisal activities" means the exercise of professional judgment based on observations and
18	objective assessments of a client's behavior to evaluate current functioning, diagnose, and select
19	appropriate treatment required to remediate identified problems or to make appropriate referrals.
20	"Art therapist" means a person who has (i) completed a master's or doctoral degree program in art
21 22	therapy, or an equivalent course of study, from an accredited educational institution; (ii) satisfied the requirements for licensure set forth in regulations adopted by the Board; and (iii) been issued a license
$\frac{22}{23}$	for the independent practice of art therapy by the Board.
24	"Art therapy" means the integrated use of psychotherapeutic principles, visual art media, and the
25	creative process in the assessment, treatment, and remediation of psychosocial, emotional, cognitive,
26	physical, and developmental disorders in children, adolescents, adults, families, or groups.
27	"Art therapy associate" means a person who has (i) completed a master's or doctoral degree program
28 29	in art therapy, or an equivalent course of study from an accredited educational institution; (ii) satisfied the requirements for licensure set forth in regulations adopted by the Board; and (iii) been issued a
3 0	license to practice art therapy under an approved clinical supervisor in accordance with regulations of
31	the Board.
32	"Behavioral health technician" means a person who has completed, at a minimum, an associate
33	degree and registered with the Board to practice in accordance with the provisions of § 54.1-3518 and
34 35	regulations of the Board and provides collaborative behavioral health services. A "behavioral health technician" shall provide such services as an employee or independent contractor of the Department of
35 36	Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, the Department of Corrections, or the Department of
37	Education or a provider licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.
38	"Behavioral health technician assistant" means a person who has completed a high school diploma
39	or equivalent, at a minimum, and registered with the Board to practice in accordance with the
40	regulations of the Board and the provisions of § 54.1-3519 to provide collaborative behavioral health
41 42	services. A "behavioral health technician assistant" shall provide such services as an employee or independent contractor of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, the
43	Department of Corrections, or the Department of Education or a provider licensed by the Department of
44	Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.
45	"Board" means the Board of Counseling.
46	"Certified substance abuse counseling assistant" means a person certified by the Board to practice in
47 48	accordance with the provisions of § 54.1-3507.2. "Certified substance abuse counselor" means a person certified by the Board to practice in
4 9	accordance with the provisions of § 54.1-3507.1.
50	"Collaborative behavioral health services" means those supportive services that are provided by a
51	registered behavioral health technician, registered behavioral health technician assistant, registered
52	qualified mental health professional, or registered qualified mental health professional-trainee under the
53 54	direction of and in collaboration with either a mental health professional licensed in the Commonwealth
54 55	or a person under supervision as a prerequisite for licensure who has been approved by the Board of Counseling, Board of Psychology, or Board of Social Work.
56	"Counseling" means the application of principles, standards, and methods of the counseling
57	profession in (i) conducting assessments and diagnoses for the purpose of establishing treatment goals
58	and objectives and (ii) planning, implementing, and evaluating treatment plans using treatment
59	interventions to facilitate human development and to identify and remediate mental, emotional, or

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60 behavioral disorders and associated distresses that interfere with mental health.

61 "Licensed substance abuse treatment practitioner" means a person who: (i) is trained in and engages 62 in the practice of substance abuse treatment with individuals or groups of individuals suffering from the 63 effects of substance abuse or dependence, and in the prevention of substance abuse or dependence; and 64 (ii) is licensed to provide advanced substance abuse treatment and independent, direct, and unsupervised 65 treatment to such individuals or groups of individuals, and to plan, evaluate, supervise, and direct 66 substance abuse treatment provided by others.

67 "Marriage and family therapist" means a person trained in the appraisal and treatment of cognitive,
68 affective, or behavioral mental and emotional disorders within the context of marriage and family
69 systems through the application of therapeutic and family systems theories and techniques.

70 "Marriage and family therapy" means the appraisal and treatment of cognitive, affective, or 71 behavioral mental and emotional disorders within the context of marriage and family systems through 72 the application of therapeutic and family systems theories and techniques and delivery of services to 73 individuals, couples, and families, singularly or in groups, for the purpose of treating such disorders.

"Practice of counseling" means rendering or offering to render to individuals, groups, organizations,
or the general public any service involving the application of principles, standards, and methods of the
counseling profession, which shall include appraisal, counseling, and referral activities.

"Practice of marriage and family therapy" means the appraisal and treatment of cognitive, affective,
or behavioral mental and emotional disorders within the context of marriage and family systems through
the application of therapeutic and family systems theories and techniques, which shall include
assessment, treatment, and referral activities.

81 "Practice of substance abuse treatment" means rendering or offering to render substance abuse
82 treatment to individuals, groups, organizations, or the general public.

"Professional counselor" means a person trained in the application of principles, standards, and
 methods of the counseling profession, including counseling interventions designed to facilitate an
 individual's achievement of human development goals and remediating mental, emotional, or behavioral
 disorders and associated distresses that interfere with mental health and development.

87 "Qualified mental health professional" includes qualified mental health professionals-adult and
88 qualified mental health professionals-child means a person who by education and experience is
89 professionally qualified and registered by the Board to provide collaborative mental health services. A
90 "qualified mental health professional" shall provide such services as an employee or independent
91 contractor of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, the Department of
92 Corrections, or the Department of Education or a provider licensed by the Department of Behavioral
93 Health and Developmental Services.

⁹⁴ "Qualified mental health professional-adult" means a qualified mental health professional who
⁹⁵ provides collaborative mental health services for adults. A qualified mental health professional-adult
⁹⁶ shall provide such services as an employee or independent contractor of the Department of Behavioral
⁹⁷ Health and Developmental Services or the Department of Corrections, or as a provider licensed by the
⁹⁸ Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.

99 "Qualified mental health professional-child" means a person who by education and experience is 100 professionally qualified and registered by the Board to provide collaborative mental health services for 101 children and adolescents up to 22 years of age. A qualified mental health professional-child shall 102 provide such services as an employee or independent contractor of the Department of Behavioral Health 103 and Developmental Services or the Department of Corrections, or as a provider licensed by the 104 Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.

105 "Qualified mental health professional-trainee" means a person who is receiving supervised training to
106 qualify as a qualified mental health professional *in accordance with the provisions of § 54.1-3521* and is
107 registered with the Board. A "qualified mental health professional-trainee" shall provide such services as
108 an employee or independent contractor of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental
109 Services, the Department of Corrections, or the Department of Education or a provider licensed by the
110 Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.

111 "Referral activities" means the evaluation of data to identify problems and to determine advisability 112 of referral to other specialists.

113 "Registered peer recovery specialist" means a person who by education and experience is 114 professionally qualified and registered by the Board to provide collaborative services to assist individuals 115 in achieving sustained recovery from the effects of addiction or mental illness, or both. A registered peer 116 recovery specialist shall provide such services as an employee or independent contractor of the 117 Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, a provider licensed by the Department of 118 Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, a practitioner licensed by or holding a permit issued 119 from the Department of Health Professions, or a facility licensed by the Department of Health.

120 "Residency" means a post-internship supervised clinical experience registered with the Board.

121 "Resident" means an individual who has submitted a supervisory contract to the Board and has

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122 received Board approval to provide clinical services in professional counseling under supervision.

123 "Substance abuse" and "substance dependence" mean a maladaptive pattern of substance use leading 124 to clinically significant impairment or distress.

125 "Substance abuse treatment" means (i) the application of specific knowledge, skills, substance abuse 126 treatment theory, and substance abuse treatment techniques to define goals and develop a treatment plan 127 of action regarding substance abuse or dependence prevention, education, or treatment in the substance 128 abuse or dependence recovery process and (ii) referrals to medical, social services, psychological, 129 psychiatric, or legal resources when such referrals are indicated.

130 "Supervision" means the ongoing process, performed by a supervisor, of monitoring the performance 131 of the person supervised and providing regular, documented individual or group consultation, guidance, 132 and instruction with respect to the clinical skills and competencies of the person supervised. Supervisors 133 may only supervise activities within their scope and area of Board-defined competency. Supervision provided by nonlicensed supervisors shall not be a replacement for the direction of services and 134 135 collaboration with the licensed mental health professional or licensed eligible mental health professional 136 required to perform collaborative behavioral health services. 137

§ 54.1-3505. Specific powers and duties of the Board.

138 In addition to the powers granted in § 54.1-2400, the Board shall have the following specific powers 139 and duties:

140 1. To cooperate with and maintain a close liaison with other professional boards and the community 141 to ensure that regulatory systems stay abreast of community and professional needs.

142 2. To conduct inspections to ensure that licensees conduct their practices in a competent manner and 143 in conformance with the relevant regulations. 144

3. To designate specialties within the profession.

145 4. To administer the certification of rehabilitation providers pursuant to Article 2 (§ 54.1-3510 et 146 seq.) of this chapter, including prescribing fees for application processing, examinations, certification and 147 certification renewal.

5. [Expired.]

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149 6. To promulgate regulations for the qualifications, education, and experience for licensure of 150 marriage and family therapists. The requirements for clinical membership in the American Association 151 for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT), and the professional examination service's national 152 marriage and family therapy examination may be considered by the Board in the promulgation of these 153 regulations. The educational credit hour, clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour 154 requirements for marriage and family therapists shall not be less than the educational credit hour, 155 clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for professional counselors.

156 7. To promulgate, subject to the requirements of Article 1.1 (§ 54.1-3507 et seq.) of this chapter, 157 regulations for the qualifications, education, and experience for licensure of licensed substance abuse 158 treatment practitioners and certification of certified substance abuse counselors and certified substance 159 abuse counseling assistants. The requirements for membership in NAADAC: the Association for Addiction Professionals and its national examination may be considered by the Board in the 160 promulgation of these regulations. The Board also may provide for the consideration and use of the 161 162 accreditation and examination services offered by the Substance Abuse Certification Alliance of Virginia. The educational credit hour, clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for 163 164 licensed substance abuse treatment practitioners shall not be less than the educational credit hour, 165 clinical experience hour, and clinical supervision hour requirements for licensed professional counselors. 166 Such regulations also shall establish standards and protocols for the clinical supervision of certified substance abuse counselors and the supervision or direction of certified substance abuse counseling 167 168 assistants, and reasonable access to the persons providing that supervision or direction in settings other 169 than a licensed facility.

170 8. To maintain a registry of persons who meet the requirements for supervision of residents. The 171 Board shall make the registry of approved supervisors available to persons seeking residence status.

172 9. To promulgate, subject to the requirements of Article 4 (§ 54.1-3518 et seq.), regulations for the 173 registration of qualified mental health professionals, including qualifications, education, and experience 174 necessary for such registration, and for the registration of persons receiving supervised training in order 175 to qualify as a qualified mental health professional qualifications, training, supervision, and experience 176 for the registration of behavioral health technicians, behavioral health technician assistants, qualified 177 mental health professionals, and qualified mental health professional-trainees.

178 10. To promulgate regulations for the registration of peer recovery specialists who meet the 179 qualifications, education, and experience requirements established by regulations of the Board of 180 Behavioral Health and Developmental Services pursuant to § 37.2-203.

181 11. To promulgate regulations for the issuance of temporary licenses to individuals engaged in a 182 counseling residency so that they may acquire the supervised, postgraduate experience required for

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183 licensure.

Article 4.

Behavioral Health Technicians and Qualified Mental Health Professionals.

186 § 54.1-3518. Scope of practice, supervision, and qualifications of registered behavioral health 187 technicians.

188 A. A registered behavioral health technician shall be (i) qualified to perform, under Board-approved 189 supervision, collaborative behavioral health services, training on prevention of mental health and 190 substance use disorders, and mental health literacy and the supportive functions of screening, intake, 191 orientation, care coordination, client education, and recordkeeping and (ii) after three years of 192 practicing as a behavioral health technician in good standing and completion of the required behavioral health technician supervisor training set forth by the Board, qualified to supervise, as part of a 193 collaborative team, behavioral health technicians and behavioral health technician assistants. A 194 195 registered behavioral health technician shall not engage in independent or autonomous practice and 196 shall only perform collaborative behavioral health services.

B. Such registered behavioral health technician shall be supervised by a mental health professional licensed by the Department of Health Professions, a person under supervision that has been approved by the Board of Counseling, Board of Psychology, or Board of Social Work as a prerequisite for licensure who has completed the required supervisor training, or a registered qualified mental health professional who has practiced for three years and completed the required supervisor training.

C. Pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board, an applicant for registration as a behavioral
health technician shall submit evidence satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has (i) completed a
specified number of hours of didactic education in a program or programs recognized or approved by
the Board and (ii) received, at a minimum, an associate degree from an institution of higher education
accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the Board. A bachelor's degree shall not be a
requirement for registration as a behavioral health technician.

208 § 54.1-3519. Scope of practice, supervision, and qualifications of registered behavioral health 209 technician assistants.

A. A registered behavioral health technician assistant shall be qualified to perform, under
Board-approved supervision, collaborative behavioral health services, training on prevention of mental
health and substance use disorders, and mental health literacy and the supportive functions of screening,
intake, orientation, care coordination, client education, and recordkeeping. A registered behavioral
health technician assistant shall not engage in independent or autonomous practice and shall only
provide collaborative behavioral health services.

B. Such registered behavioral health technician assistants shall be supervised by either a mental health professional licensed by the Department of Health Professions who has completed the required supervisor training, a person under supervision that has been approved by the Board of Counseling, Board of Psychology, or Board of Social Work as a prerequisite for licensure who has completed the required supervisor training, a registered qualified mental health professional who has practiced for three years and completed the required supervisor training.

C. Pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board, an applicant for registration as a behavioral health technician assistant shall submit evidence satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has (i) received, at a minimum, a high school diploma or its equivalent and (ii) completed a specified number of hours of didactic education in a program recognized or approved by the Board.

227 § 54.1-3520. Scope of practice, supervision, and qualifications of qualified mental health 228 professionals.

229 A. A qualified mental health professional shall be qualified to perform, under Board-approved 230 supervision, collaborative behavioral health services, including the supportive functions of (i) screening; 231 (ii) intake; (iii) orientation; (iv) care coordination; (v) client education; (vi) referral activities; (vii) 232 initiating crisis de-escalation; (viii) gathering histories of mental and physical health conditions, alcohol 233 and drug use, past mental health treatment, and interactions with the criminal justice system; (ix) 234 providing psychosocial skills development; (x) implementing interventions as assigned on individual 235 plans of care and documenting the interventions for the purposes of recordkeeping; and (xi) prevention 236 of mental health and substance use disorders. A registered qualified mental health professional shall not 237 engage in independent or autonomous practice and shall only perform collaborative behavioral health 238 services.

B. Such registered qualified mental health professionals shall be supervised by either a mental health professional licensed by the Department of Health Professions who has completed the required supervisor training, a person under supervision that has been approved by the Board of Counseling, Board of Psychology, or Board of Social Work as a prerequisite for licensure who has completed the required supervisor training, or a registered qualified mental health professional who has practiced for three years and completed the required supervisor training. Registered qualified mental health

245 professionals who have met the supervisor requirements may supervise activities within their scope. This
246 supervision must occur under the broader required direction of and in collaboration with the licensed or
247 licensed eligible mental health professional.

C. Pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board, an applicant for registration as a qualified mental health professional shall submit evidence satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has (i) completed a specified number of hours of didactic education in a program or programs recognized or approved by the Board; (ii) received, at a minimum, a bachelor's degree from an institution of higher education accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the Board; and (iii) accumulated a specified number of hours of Board-approved supervised experience.

254 § 54.1-3521. Scope of practice, supervision, and qualifications of qualified mental health 255 professional-trainees.

256 A. A qualified mental health professional-trainee shall be qualified to perform, under 257 Board-approved supervision, collaborative behavioral health services, including the supportive functions 258 of (i) screening; (ii) intake; (iii) orientation; (iv) care coordination; (v) client education; (vi) referral 259 activities; (vii) initiating crisis de-escalation; (viii) gathering histories of mental and physical health conditions, alcohol and drug use, past mental health treatment, and interactions with the criminal justice 260 261 system; (ix) providing psychosocial skills development; (x) implementing interventions as assigned on 262 individual plans of care and documenting the interventions for the purposes of recordkeeping; and (xi)263 prevention of mental health and substance use disorders. A registered qualified mental health 264 professional-trainee shall not engage in independent or autonomous practice and shall only perform 265 collaborative behavioral health services.

B. Such registered qualified mental health professional-trainees shall be supervised by a mental health professional licensed by the Department of Health Professions who has completed the required supervisor training, a person under supervision that has been approved by the Board of Counseling, Board of Psychology, or Board of Social Work as a prerequisite for licensure and who has completed the required supervisor training, or a registered qualified mental health professional who has practiced for three years and completed the required supervisor training.

C. Pursuant to regulations adopted by the Board, an applicant for registration as a qualified mental health professional-trainee shall submit evidence satisfactory to the Board that the applicant has (i) completed a specified number of hours of didactic education in a program or programs recognized or approved by the Board and (ii) received, at a minimum, a bachelor's degree from an institution of higher education accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the Board or is actively enrolled and in good standing in a bachelor's degree program from an institution of higher education accredited by the Board.

279 2. That the Board of Counseling's initial adoption of regulations necessary to implement the
280 provisions of this act shall be exempt from the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq. of
281 the Code of Virginia), except that the Board of Counseling shall provide an opportunity for public
282 comment on the regulations prior to adoption of such regulations.

283 3. That the Board of Counseling shall promulgate regulations in accordance with this act by 284 November 1, 2024.
