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1 VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER 2 An Act to amend and reenact §§ 59.1-199 and 59.1-200 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Title 55.1 a chapter numbered 32, consisting of sections numbered 3 4 55.1-3200 through 55.1-3206, relating to consumer protections; creation of Unfair Real Estate 5 Service Agreement Act. [S 576] 6 7 Approved 8 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 9 1. That §§ 59.1-199 and 59.1-200 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that the 10 Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Title 55.1 a chapter numbered 32, consisting of sections 11 numbered 55.1-3200 through 55.1-3206, as follows: 12 CHAPTER 32. UNFAIR REAL ESTATE SERVICE AGREEMENT ACT. 13 14 § 55.1-3200. Definitions. 15 For the purposes of this chapter: "Real estate service agreement" or "service agreement" means an agreement between a service 16 provider and the owner of residential real property or a potential buyer of residential real property to 17 provide services, current or future, in connection with the maintenance of or purchase or sale of 18 residential real property. A "real estate service agreement" includes any memorandum, notice, 19 20 agreement, or similar document that is used by a service provider to cause a service agreement to be 21 recorded. 22 "Recording" means the act of adding any documents or data that affects the real property to state or 23 local government records. 24 "Residential real property" means real property containing from one to four residential dwelling 25 units. 26 "Service provider" means an individual or entity that provides services through a real estate service 27 agreement. A "service provider" includes any person acting as an agent or designee of a service 28 provider. 29 § 55.1-3201. Exemptions. 30 This chapter shall not apply to: 31 1. A home warranty or similar product that covers the cost of maintenance of a major home system, 32 such as plumbing, HVAC, or electrical wiring, for a specific period of time; 33 2. An insurance contract; 34 3. An option or right of refusal to purchase residential real property; 35 4. A declaration created in the formation of a common interest community as defined in § 54.1-2345 36 or any amendment thereto; 37 5. A maintenance or repair agreement entered into by a property owners' association in a common 38 interest community; 39 6. A mortgage loan or commitment to make or receive a mortgage loan; 40 7. An agreement relating to the sale or rental of personal property; 41 8. Water, sewer, electrical, telephone, cable, or other regulated utility service providers; 42 9. A property management agreement by which the owner of the real property contracts with a party 43 to provide management services for the maintenance, ownership, operation, or lease of a residential 44 premises; or 45 10. A mechanic's lien, as established by § 43-1. § 55.1-3202. Prohibited terms. 46 A. No real estate service agreement that is effective and binding for more than one year from the 47 48 effective date shall: 49 1. Purport to run with the land or bind future owners of interests in the residential real property 50 identified in the service agreement; 51 2. Allow the service provider to assign or transfer the right to provide services under the service agreement without notice to and written agreement of all parties to the service agreement; or 52 53 3. Purport to create a lien, encumbrance, or other real property security interest on the residential 54 real property identified in the service agreement. 55 B. Offering a real estate service agreement that violates subsection A to a consumer constitutes a 56 prohibited practice under the provisions of § 59.1-200 and shall be subject to the provisions of the

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57 Virginia Consumer Protection Act (§ 59.1-196 et seq.). Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to 58 prevent an individual from pursuing any other remedy available by law.

59 § 55.1-3203. Void and unenforceable.

A service agreement that violates subsection A of § 55.1-3202 shall be void and unenforceable. No 60 61 service provider has a right to a refund of the consideration paid to the owner, buyer, or tenant in 62 connection with a prohibited service agreement.

§ 55.1-3204. Recording prohibited.

63 A. No service provider shall submit a real estate service agreement that violates subsection A of 64 65 § 55.1-3202 to the circuit court or a state or local agency for recording. Any such submission constitutes a prohibited practice under the provisions of § 59.1-200 and shall be subject to the 66 67 provisions of the Virginia Consumer Protection Act (§ 59.1-196 et seq.).

68 B. A real estate service agreement that violates subsection A of § 55.1-3202, or a notice or memorandum thereof, is void and unenforceable and shall not operate as a lien, encumbrance, or 69 security interest. No owner or buyer shall be required to record any document voiding a real estate 70 service agreement that is in violation of subsection A of § 55.1-3202, or notice or memorandum thereof, 71 72 recorded in violation of this section.

73 C. Notwithstanding subsection A, no recorded real estate service agreement that is in violation of 74 subsection A of § 55.1-3202 may provide actual or constructive notice of a lien arising from the service 75 agreement to any party interested in the residential real property identified in the service agreement. 76

§ 55.1-3205. Assignment prohibited.

77 Assignment or transfer of the right to provide services under a real estate service agreement 78 recorded prior to July 1, 2024, that would otherwise be in violation of subsection A of § 55.1-3202, is 79 prohibited without notice to and written agreement of all parties to the service agreement. 80

§ 55.1-3206. Remedies.

81 A. If a real estate service agreement in violation of subsection A of § 55.1-3202 is recorded, any person with an interest in the residential real property that is subject to a lien arising from the service 82 83 agreement may bring an action against the service provider in the circuit court of the county where the 84 residential real property is located to request a determination that the service agreement is void and 85 unenforceable under this chapter.

86 B. If a real estate service agreement that violates subsection A of § 55.1-3202 is recorded in the 87 Commonwealth, any party with an interest in the residential real property identified in the service 88 agreement may recover damages, costs, and reasonable attorney fees that may be proved against the 89 service provider. No actual damages, costs, or reasonable attorney fees that are proved against the 90 service provider shall be offset by the consideration paid by the service provider to the owner, buyer, or 91 tenant in connection with the real estate service agreement.

92 C. Nothing in this chapter shall prevent an individual from pursuing any other remedy provided by 93 law. 94

§ 59.1-199. Exclusions.

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Nothing in this chapter shall apply to:

96 1. Any aspect of a consumer transaction which aspect is authorized under laws or regulations of the 97 Commonwealth or the United States, or the formal advisory opinions of any regulatory body or official 98 of the Commonwealth or the United States.

99 2. Acts done by the publisher, owner, agent, or employee of a newspaper, periodical, or radio or 100 television station, or other advertising media such as outdoor advertising and advertising agencies, in the publication or dissemination of an advertisement in violation of § 59.1-200, unless it be proved that such 101 102 person knew that the advertisement was of a character prohibited by § 59.1-200.

103 3. Those aspects of a consumer transaction that are regulated by the Federal Consumer Credit 104 Protection Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1601 et seq.

105 4. Banks, savings institutions, credit unions, small loan companies, public service corporations, mortgage lenders as defined in § 6.2-1600, broker-dealers as defined in § 13.1-501, gas suppliers as defined in subsection E of § 56-235.8, and insurance companies regulated and supervised by the State 106 107 108 Corporation Commission or a comparable federal regulating body.

109 5. Any aspect of a consumer transaction that is subject to the Virginia Residential Landlord and Tenant Act (§ 55.1-1200 et seq.) or Chapter 14 (§ 55.1-1400 et seq.) of Title 55.1, unless the act or 110 practice of a landlord constitutes a misrepresentation or fraudulent act or practice under § 59.1-200. 111

112 6. Real estate licensees who are licensed under Chapter 21 (§ 54.1-2100 et seq.) of Title 54.1, unless 113 the act or practice of the licensee constitutes a violation of law under the Unfair Real Estate Service 114 Agreement Act (§ 55.1-3200 et seq.).

115 7. Residential home sales between natural persons involving the seller's private residence.

116 § 59.1-200. Prohibited practices.

117 A. The following fraudulent acts or practices committed by a supplier in connection with a consumer

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118 transaction are hereby declared unlawful:

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119 1. Misrepresenting goods or services as those of another; 120

2. Misrepresenting the source, sponsorship, approval, or certification of goods or services;

121 3. Misrepresenting the affiliation, connection, or association of the supplier, or of the goods or 122 services, with another; 123

4. Misrepresenting geographic origin in connection with goods or services;

124 5. Misrepresenting that goods or services have certain quantities, characteristics, ingredients, uses, or 125 benefits;

6. Misrepresenting that goods or services are of a particular standard, quality, grade, style, or model;

127 7. Advertising or offering for sale goods that are used, second-hand, repossessed, defective, blemished, deteriorated, or reconditioned, or that are "seconds," irregulars, imperfects, or "not first 128 129 class," without clearly and unequivocally indicating in the advertisement or offer for sale that the goods are used, secondhand, repossessed, defective, blemished, deteriorated, reconditioned, or are "seconds," 130 irregulars, imperfects, or "not first class"; 131

132 8. Advertising goods or services with intent not to sell them as advertised, or with intent not to sell 133 at the price or upon the terms advertised.

In any action brought under this subdivision, the refusal by any person, or any employee, agent, or 134 135 servant thereof, to sell any goods or services advertised or offered for sale at the price or upon the terms 136 advertised or offered, shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this subdivision. This paragraph 137 shall not apply when it is clearly and conspicuously stated in the advertisement or offer by which such 138 goods or services are advertised or offered for sale, that the supplier or offeror has a limited quantity or 139 amount of such goods or services for sale, and the supplier or offeror at the time of such advertisement 140 or offer did in fact have or reasonably expected to have at least such quantity or amount for sale;

9. Making false or misleading statements of fact concerning the reasons for, existence of, or amounts 141 142 of price reductions;

143 10. Misrepresenting that repairs, alterations, modifications, or services have been performed or parts 144 installed;

145 11. Misrepresenting by the use of any written or documentary material that appears to be an invoice 146 or bill for merchandise or services previously ordered;

147 12. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, using in any manner the words "wholesale," "wholesaler," "factory," or "manufacturer" in the supplier's name, or to describe the nature of the 148 149 supplier's business, unless the supplier is actually engaged primarily in selling at wholesale or in 150 manufacturing the goods or services advertised or offered for sale;

151 13. Using in any contract or lease any liquidated damage clause, penalty clause, or waiver of 152 defense, or attempting to collect any liquidated damages or penalties under any clause, waiver, damages, 153 or penalties that are void or unenforceable under any otherwise applicable laws of the Commonwealth, 154 or under federal statutes or regulations;

155 13a. Failing to provide to a consumer, or failing to use or include in any written document or 156 material provided to or executed by a consumer, in connection with a consumer transaction any 157 statement, disclosure, notice, or other information however characterized when the supplier is required 158 by 16 C.F.R. Part 433 to so provide, use, or include the statement, disclosure, notice, or other 159 information in connection with the consumer transaction;

160 14. Using any other deception, fraud, false pretense, false promise, or misrepresentation in connection 161 with a consumer transaction;

162 15. Violating any provision of § 3.2-6509, 3.2-6512, 3.2-6513, 3.2-6513.1, 3.2-6514, 3.2-6515, 3.2-6516, or 3.2-6519 is a violation of this chapter; 163

164 16. Failing to disclose all conditions, charges, or fees relating to:

165 a. The return of goods for refund, exchange, or credit. Such disclosure shall be by means of a sign 166 attached to the goods, or placed in a conspicuous public area of the premises of the supplier, so as to be 167 readily noticeable and readable by the person obtaining the goods from the supplier. If the supplier does 168 not permit a refund, exchange, or credit for return, he shall so state on a similar sign. The provisions of 169 this subdivision shall not apply to any retail merchant who has a policy of providing, for a period of not 170 less than 20 days after date of purchase, a cash refund or credit to the purchaser's credit card account 171 for the return of defective, unused, or undamaged merchandise upon presentation of proof of purchase. 172 In the case of merchandise paid for by check, the purchase shall be treated as a cash purchase and any 173 refund may be delayed for a period of 10 banking days to allow for the check to clear. This subdivision does not apply to sale merchandise that is obviously distressed, out of date, post season, or otherwise 174 175 reduced for clearance; nor does this subdivision apply to special order purchases where the purchaser 176 has requested the supplier to order merchandise of a specific or unusual size, color, or brand not 177 ordinarily carried in the store or the store's catalog; nor shall this subdivision apply in connection with a 178 transaction for the sale or lease of motor vehicles, farm tractors, or motorcycles as defined in

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179 § 46.2-100;

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180 b. A layaway agreement. Such disclosure shall be furnished to the consumer (i) in writing at the time 181 of the layaway agreement, or (ii) by means of a sign placed in a conspicuous public area of the 182 premises of the supplier, so as to be readily noticeable and readable by the consumer, or (iii) on the bill 183 of sale. Disclosure shall include the conditions, charges, or fees in the event that a consumer breaches 184 the agreement;

185 16a. Failing to provide written notice to a consumer of an existing open-end credit balance in excess 186 of \$5 (i) on an account maintained by the supplier and (ii) resulting from such consumer's overpayment 187 on such account. Suppliers shall give consumers written notice of such credit balances within 60 days of 188 receiving overpayments. If the credit balance information is incorporated into statements of account 189 furnished consumers by suppliers within such 60-day period, no separate or additional notice is required;

- 190 17. If a supplier enters into a written agreement with a consumer to resolve a dispute that arises in 191 connection with a consumer transaction, failing to adhere to the terms and conditions of such an 192 agreement;
 - 18. Violating any provision of the Virginia Health Club Act, Chapter 24 (§ 59.1-294 et seq.);
- 194 19. Violating any provision of the Virginia Home Solicitation Sales Act, Chapter 2.1 (§ 59.1-21.1 et 195 seq.);

69. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by
inhalation, that contains a synthetic derivative of tetrahydrocannabinol. As used in this subdivision,
"synthetic derivative" means a chemical compound produced by man through a chemical transformation
to turn a compound into a different compound by adding or subtracting molecules to or from the
original compound. This subdivision shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by
the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or
(ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1;

70. Selling or offering for sale to a person younger than 21 years of age any substance intended for
human consumption, orally or by inhalation, that contains tetrahydrocannabinol. This subdivision shall
not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and
scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct
permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1;

282 71. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by 283 inhalation, that contains tetrahydrocannabinol, unless such substance is (i) contained in child-resistant 284 packaging, as defined in § 4.1-600; (ii) equipped with a label that states, in English and in a font no less 285 than 1/16 of an inch, (a) that the substance contains tetrahydrocannabinol and may not be sold to 286 persons younger than 21 years of age, (b) all ingredients contained in the substance, (c) the amount of 287 such substance that constitutes a single serving, and (d) the total percentage and milligrams of 288 tetrahydrocannabinol included in the substance and the number of milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol 289 that are contained in each serving; and (iii) accompanied by a certificate of analysis, produced by an 290 independent laboratory that is accredited pursuant to standard ISO/IEC 17025 of the International 291 Organization of Standardization by a third-party accrediting body, that states the tetrahydrocannabinol 292 concentration of the substance or the tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the batch from which the 293 substance originates. This subdivision shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by 294 the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or 295 (ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1;

296 72. Manufacturing, offering for sale at retail, or selling at retail an industrial hemp extract, as defined
297 in § 3.2-5145.1, a food containing an industrial hemp extract, or a substance containing
298 tetrahydrocannabinol that depicts or is in the shape of a human, animal, vehicle, or fruit;

299 73. Selling or offering for sale any substance intended for human consumption, orally or by300 inhalation, that contains tetrahydrocannabinol and, without authorization, bears, is packaged in a

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301 container or wrapper that bears, or is otherwise labeled to bear the trademark, trade name, famous mark as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1125, or other identifying mark, imprint, or device, or any likeness thereof, of 302 303 a manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor of a product intended for human consumption other 304 than the manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor that did in fact so manufacture, process, pack, or 305 distribute such substance;

306 74. Selling or offering for sale a topical hemp product, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that does not include a label stating that the product is not intended for human consumption. This subdivision shall 307 308 not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and 309 scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.), (ii) be construed to prohibit any conduct permitted under Chapter 16 (§ 4.1-1600 et seq.) of Title 4.1, or (iii) apply to topical hemp products that 310 311 were manufactured prior to July 1, 2023, provided that the person provides documentation of the date of 312 manufacture if requested;

75. Violating any provision of § 59.1-466.8;

76. Violating subsection F of § 36-96.3:1;

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315 77. Selling or offering for sale (i) any kratom product to a person younger than 21 years of age or 316 (ii) any kratom product that does not include a label listing all ingredients and with the following guidance: "This product may be harmful to your health, has not been evaluated by the FDA, and is not 317 318 intended to diagnose, treat, cure, or prevent any disease." As used in this subdivision, "kratom" means 319 any part of the leaf of the plant Mitragyna speciosa or any extract thereof; and

320 78. Failing to disclose the total cost of a good or continuous service, as defined in § 59.1-207.45, to 321 a consumer, including any mandatory fees or charges, prior to entering into an agreement for the sale of 322 any such good or provision of any such continuous service; and 323

79. Violating any provision of the Unfair Real Estate Service Agreement Act (§ 55.1-3200 et seq.).

324 B. Nothing in this section shall be construed to invalidate or make unenforceable any contract or 325 lease solely by reason of the failure of such contract or lease to comply with any other law of the 326 Commonwealth or any federal statute or regulation, to the extent such other law, statute, or regulation 327 provides that a violation of such law, statute, or regulation shall not invalidate or make unenforceable such contract or lease. 328

329 2. That, except for the provisions of § 55.1-3205 of the Code of Virginia, as created by this act, the 330 provisions of this act shall apply to all service agreements executed or renewed on or after July 1, 331 2024.
