Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

21 1. That §§ 9-6.14:4.1, 54.1-2900, as it is currently effective and as it will become effective, 54.1-3200, 54.1-3207, and 54.1-3401 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted, and that 22 the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 32 of Title 54.1 an article numbered 5, 23 consisting of sections numbered 54.1-3222, 54.1-3223 and 54.1-3224, as follows: 24 25

§ 9-6.14:4.1. Exemptions and exclusions.

A. Although required to comply with § 9-6.18 of the Virginia Register Act (§ 9-6.15 et seq.), the following agencies are exempted from the provisions of this chapter, except to the extent that they are specifically made subject to §§ 9-6.14:14.1, 9-6.14:21 and 9-6.14:22:

1. The General Assembly.

2. Courts, any agency of the Supreme Court, and any agency which by the Constitution is expressly granted any of the powers of a court of record.

3. The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries in promulgating regulations regarding the management of wildlife and for all case decisions rendered pursuant to any provisions of Chapters 2 (§ 29.1-200 et seq.), 3 (§ 29.1-300 et seq.), 4 (§ 29.1-400 et seq.), 5 (§ 29.1-500 et seq.), and 7 (§ 29.1-700 et seq.) of Title 29.1.

4. The Virginia Housing Development Authority.

37 5. Municipal corporations, counties, and all local, regional or multijurisdictional authorities created 38 under this Code, including those with federal authorities, except for those created under Chapter 27 39 (§ 15.1-1228 et seq.) of Title 15.1.

40 6. Educational institutions operated by the Commonwealth provided that, with respect to § 9-6.14:22, 41 such educational institutions shall be exempt from the publication requirements only with respect to 42 regulations which pertain to (i) their academic affairs; (ii) the selection, tenure, promotion and disciplining of faculty and employees; (iii) the selection of students; and (iv) rules of conduct and 43 44 disciplining of students.

The selection, tenure, dismissal, direction or control of any officer or employee of an agency of 86 the Commonwealth. 87 8. The conduct of elections or eligibility to vote. 88 9. Inmates of prisons or other such facilities or parolees therefrom. 89 10. The custody of persons in, or sought to be placed in, mental, penal or other state institutions as 90 well as the treatment, supervision, or discharge of such persons. 91 11. Traffic signs, markers or control devices. 92 12. Instructions for application or renewal of a license, certificate, or registration required by law. 93 13. Content of, or rules for the conduct of, any examination required by law. 94 14. The administration of a pool or pools authorized by Article 7.1 (§ 2.1-234.9:1 et seq.) of Chapter 95 14 of Title 2.1. 96 15. Any rules for the conduct of specific lottery games, so long as such rules are not inconsistent 97 with duly adopted regulations of the State Lottery Board, and provided that such regulations are 98 published and posted. 99 16. Orders condemning or closing any shellfish, finfish, or crustacea growing area and the shellfish, 100 finfish or crustacea located thereon pursuant to Article 2 (§ 28.2-803 et seq.) of Chapter 8, Title 28.2. 17. Any operating procedures for review of child deaths developed by the State Child Fatality 101 102 Review Team pursuant to § 32.1-283.1. 103 C. The following agency actions otherwise subject to this chapter and § 9-6.18 of the Virginia 104 Register Act are excluded from the operation of Article 2 (§ 9-6.14:7.1 et seq.) of this chapter: 1. Agency orders or regulations fixing rates or prices. 105 2. Regulations which establish or prescribe agency organization, internal practice or procedures, 106 107 including delegations of authority. 108 3. Regulations which consist only of changes in style or form or corrections of technical errors. Each promulgating agency shall review all references to sections of the Code of Virginia within their 109 110 regulations each time a new supplement or replacement volume to the Code of Virginia is published to ensure the accuracy of each section or section subdivision identification listed. 111 112 4. Regulations which: (a) Are necessary to conform to changes in Virginia statutory law or the appropriation act where no 113 114 agency discretion is involved; (b) Are required by order of any state or federal court of competent jurisdiction where no agency 115 116 discretion is involved; or 117 (c) Are necessary to meet the requirements of federal law or regulations, provided such regulations do not differ materially from those required by federal law or regulation, and the Registrar has so 118 determined in writing; notice of the proposed adoption of these regulations and the Registrar's above 119 determination shall be published in the Virginia Register not less than thirty days prior to the effective 120 121 date thereof.

122 5. Regulations which an agency finds are necessitated by an emergency situation. For the purposes of 123 this subdivision, "emergency situation" means (i) a situation involving an imminent threat to public 124 health or safety or (ii) a situation in which Virginia statutory law or the appropriation act or federal law 125 or federal regulation requires that a regulation shall be effective in 280 days or less from enactment of 126 the law or the appropriation act or the effective date of the federal regulation, and the regulation is not 127 exempt under the provisions of subdivision C 4 of this section. In such cases, the agency shall state in 128 writing the nature of the emergency and of the necessity for such action and may adopt such regulations 129 with the prior approval of the Governor. Such regulations shall be limited to no more than twelve 130 months in duration. During the twelve-month period, an agency may issue additional emergency 131 regulations as needed addressing the subject matter of the initial emergency regulation, but any such 132 additional emergency regulations shall not be effective beyond the twelve-month period from the 133 effective date of the initial emergency regulation. If the agency wishes to continue regulating the subject 134 matter governed by the emergency regulation beyond the twelve-month limitation, a regulation to replace 135 the emergency regulation shall be promulgated in accordance with Article 2 (§ 9-6.14:7.1 et seq.) of this chapter. The Notice of Intended Regulatory Action to promulgate a replacement regulation shall be published within sixty days of the effective date of the emergency regulation, and the proposed 136 137 138 replacement regulation shall be published within 180 days after the effective date of the emergency 139 regulation.

Whenever regulations are adopted under this subsection C, the agency shall state as part thereof that
it will receive, consider and respond to petitions by any interested person at any time with respect to
reconsideration or revision. The effective date of regulations adopted under this subsection shall be in
accordance with the provisions of § 9-6.14:9.3, except in the case of emergency regulations, which shall
become effective as provided in subsection A of § 9-6.14:9.

D. The following agency actions otherwise subject to this chapter are excluded from the operation of Article 3 (§ 9-6.14:11 et seq.) of this chapter:

153 1. The assessment of taxes or penalties under the tax laws.

154 2. The award or denial of claims for workers' compensation.

155 3. The grant or denial of public assistance.

156 4. Temporary injunctive or summary orders authorized by law.

activity undertaken pursuant to Title 62.1 by the Marine Resources Commission shall be in accordance
with the provisions of this chapter.

A regulation for which an exemption is claimed under this section and which is placed before a 167 board or commission for consideration shall be provided at least two days in advance of the board or 168 commission meeting to members of the public that request a copy of that regulation. A copy of that 169 regulation shall be made available to the public attending such meeting.

G. The Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission shall conduct a review periodically of
exemptions and exclusions authorized by this section. The purpose of this review shall be to assess
whether there are any exemptions or exclusions which should be discontinued or modified.

176 § 54.1-2900. (Effective until January 1, 1997) Definitions.

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

"Acupuncturist" means individuals approved by the Board to practice acupuncture. This is limited to
"licensed acupuncturist" which means an individual other than a doctor of medicine, osteopathy or
podiatry, who has successfully completed the requirements for licensure established by the Board
(approved titles are limited to: Licensed Acupuncturist, Lic.Ac., L.Ac.) and "physician acupuncturist"
which means doctors of medicine, osteopathy and podiatry who have fulfilled the physician requirements

for licensure to practice acupuncture established by the Board. 183

184 "Auricular acupuncture" means the subcutaneous insertion of sterile, disposable acupuncture needles 185 in predetermined, bilateral locations in the outer ear when used exclusively and specifically in the 186 context of an approved chemical dependency treatment program, under the appropriate supervision of a 187 licensed physician acupuncturist or licensed acupuncturist.

188 "Board" means the Board of Medicine.

189 "Certified optometrist" means an optometrist who is licensed under Chapter 32 of this title and who 190 has successfully completed the requirements for certification established by the Board of Medicine. This definition shall not be construed to limit or 200 restrict any person licensed by a health regulatory board as defined in § 54.1-2500 from rendering 201 services which he is licensed to provide.

202 "Healing arts" means the arts and sciences dealing with the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure 203 or alleviation of human physical or mental ailments, conditions, diseases, pain or infirmities.

204 "Practice of acupuncture" means the stimulation of certain points on or near the surface of the body by the insertion of needles to prevent or modify the perception of pain or to normalize physiological functions, including pain control, for the treatment of certain ailments or conditions of the body and 205 206 207 includes the techniques of electroacupuncture, cupping and moxabustion moxibustion. The practice of acupuncture does not include the use of physical therapy, chiropractic, osteopathic manipulative 208 209 techniques, the use or prescribing of any drugs, medications, herbal preparations, nutritional 210 supplements, serums or vaccines, nor the procedure of auricular acupuncture as exempted in § 54.1-2901 when used specifically and exclusively in the context of a publicly supported comprehensive drug 211 212 treatment program by an employee of the program who is trained and approved by the National 213 Acupuncture Detoxification Association.

214 "Practice of chiropractic" means the adjustment of the twenty-four movable vertebrae of the spinal 215 column, and assisting nature for the purpose of normalizing the transmission of nerve energy, but does 216 not include the use of surgery, obstetrics, osteopathy or the administration or prescribing of any drugs, 217 medicines, serums or vaccines.

"Practice of clinical psychology" means the offering by an individual of his services to the public as 218 219 a clinical psychologist.

220 "Practice of medicine or osteopathic medicine" means the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of 221 human physical or mental ailments, conditions, diseases, pain or infirmities by any means or method.

222 "Practice of physical therapy" means, upon medical referral and direction, the evaluation, testing, 223 treatment, reeducation and rehabilitation by physical, mechanical or electronic measures and procedures 224 of individuals who, because of trauma, disease or birth defect, present physical and emotional disorders, 225 but does not include the use of Roentgen rays and radium for diagnostic or therapeutic purposes or the 226 use of electricity for shock therapy and surgical purposes including cauterization.

"Practice of podiatry" means the medical, mechanical and surgical treatment of the ailments of the 227 228 human foot and ankle, but does not include amputation proximal to the metatarsal-phalangeal joints. The 229 Board of Medicine shall determine whether a specific type of treatment of the foot and ankle is within 230 the scope of practice of podiatry. 231

288 "Radiologic technologist" means an individual, other than a licensed doctor of medicine, osteopathy, 289 podiatry, or chiropractic, or a dentist licensed pursuant to Chapter 27 (§ 54.1-2700 et seq.) of this title, who (i) performs, may be called upon to perform, or who is licensed to perform a comprehensive scope 290 291 of diagnostic radiologic procedures employing equipment which emits ionizing radiation and (ii) is 292 delegated or exercises responsibility for the operation of radiation-generating equipment, the shielding of 293 patient and staff from unnecessary radiation, the appropriate exposure of radiographs or other procedures 294 which contribute to any significant extent to the site or dosage of ionizing radiation to which a patient is 295 exposed.

296 "Radiologic technologist, limited" means an individual, other than a licensed radiologic technologist,
297 dental hygienist or who is otherwise authorized by the Board of Dentistry under Chapter 27 of this title
298 and the regulations pursuant thereto, who performs diagnostic radiographic procedures employing
299 equipment which emits ionizing radiation which is limited to specific areas of the human body.

301 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

302 "Board" means the Board of Optometry.

"Optometrist" means any person practicing the profession of optometry as defined in this chapter andthe regulations of the Board.

305 "Practice of optometry" means the examination of the human eye to ascertain the presence of defects

306 or abnormal conditions which may be corrected or relieved by the use of lenses, prisms or ocular 307 exercises, visual training or orthoptics; the employment of any subjective or objective mechanism to 308 determine the accommodative or refractive states of the human eye or range or power of vision of the 309 human eye; the use of testing appliances for the purpose of the measurement of the powers of vision; 310 the examination, diagnosis, and optometric treatment in accordance with this chapter, of conditions and 311 visual or muscular anomalies of the human eye; and the prescribing or adapting of lenses, prisms or 312 ocular exercises, visual training or orthoptics for the correction, relief, remediation or prevention of such conditions. An optometrist may treat certain diseases or abnormal conditions of the human eye and its 313 314 adnexa with certain therapeutic pharmaceutical agents only as permitted under Chapter 29 (\$ 54.1-2900 315 et seq.) of this title chapter.

316 "TPA-certified optometrist" means an optometrist who is licensed under this chapter and who has successfully completed the requirements for TPA certification established by the Board pursuant to 317 318 Article 5 of this chapter. Such certification shall enable an optometrist to treat certain diseases, including abnormal conditions, of the human eye and its adnexa, as determined by the Board, with 319 320 certain therapeutic pharmaceutical agents specified by the Board. Such certification shall not, however, 321 permit treatment through surgery [, including, but not limited to, laser surgery] or other invasive 322 modalities, except for treatment of emergency cases of anaphylactic shock with intramuscular 323 epinephrine.

324 The foregoing shall not restrict the authority of any optometrist licensed or certified under this 325 chapter for the removal of superficial foreign bodies from the human eye and its adnexa or from 326 delegating to personnel in his personal employ and supervised by him, such activities or functions as are 327 nondiscretionary and do not require the exercise of professional judgment for their performance and which are usually or customarily delegated to such persons by optometrists, if such activities or 328 functions are authorized by and performed for such optometrists and responsibility for such activities or 329 330 functions is assumed by such optometrists.

§ 54.1-3207. Board of Optometry.

332 The Board of Optometry shall be composed of six members as follows: five licensed optometrists 333 and one citizen member. The terms of office of the members shall be four years. The professional 334 members of the Board shall have been engaged in the practice of optometry for at least five years prior 335 to the date of their appointment. After July 1, 1996, all professional members newly appointed to the 336 Board shall be certified in the administration of therapeutic pharmaceutical agents pursuant to Article 5 337 of this chapter. 338

Article 5.

Certification for Administration of Therapeutic Pharmaceutical Agents.

340 § 54.1-3222. TPA certification; Certification for treatment of certain diseases or abnormal conditions 341 with certain therapeutic pharmaceutical agents.

342 A. The Board shall certify an optometrist to prescribe for and treat certain diseases or abnormal conditions of the human eye and its adnexa with certain therapeutic pharmaceutical agents, if the 343 344 optometrist files a written application, accompanied by the fee required by the Board and satisfactory 345 proof that the applicant:

346 1. Is licensed by the Board as an optometrist and certified to administer diagnostic pharmaceutical 347 agents pursuant to Article 4 of this chapter;

348 2. Has satisfactorily completed such didactic and clinical training programs for the treatment of 349 diseases and abnormal conditions of the eye and its adnexa as are determined, after consultation with a school or college of optometry and a school of medicine, to be reasonable and necessary by the Board 350 351 to ensure an appropriate standard of medical care for patients; and

352 3. Passes such examinations as are determined to be reasonable and necessary by the Board to 353 ensure an appropriate standard of medical care for patients.

354 B. TPA certification shall enable an optometrist to treat certain diseases and abnormal conditions of 355 the human eye and its adnexa as determined by the Board with certain therapeutic pharmaceutical 356 agents specified by the Board, within the following conditions:

357 1. Treatment with oral therapeutic pharmaceutical agents shall be limited to the analysis included 358 on Schedules III and VI, as defined in §§ 54.1-3450 and 54.1-3455 of the Drug Control Act, which are 359 appropriate to alleviate ocular pain.

360 2. Prescriptions for oral analgesics to relieve ocular pain shall be limited to dosages for no more 361 than seventy-two hours.

362 3. Therapeutic pharmaceutical agents shall include topically applied Schedule VI drugs as defined in 363 § 54.1-3455 of the Drug Control Act.

364 4. Treatment of glaucoma shall require prior consultation with the patient's physician or other appropriate physician, and shall exclude treatment of congenital and infantile glaucoma. Treatment of 365 angle closure glaucoma shall be limited to initiation of immediate emergency care. 366

367 5. Treatment through surgery or other invasive modalities shall not be permitted, except for

368 treatment of emergency cases of anaphylactic shock with intramuscular epinephrine, such as that **369** included in a bee sting kit.

6. Entities permitted or licensed by the Board of Pharmacy to distribute or dispense drugs, including,
but not limited to, wholesale distributors and pharmacists, shall be authorized to supply TPA-certified
optometrists with those therapeutic pharmaceutical agents specified by the Board on the
TPA-Formulary.

374 § 54.1-3223. Regulations relating to instruction and training, examination, and therapeutic 375 pharmaceutical agents; Board to determine TPA-Formulary; appointment of TPA-Formulary Committee. 376 A. The Board shall promulgate such regulations governing the treatment of certain diseases and 377 abnormal conditions of the human eye and its adnexa with certain therapeutic pharmaceutical agents by 378 TPA-certified optometrists as are reasonable and necessary to ensure an appropriate standard of 379 medical care for patients, including, but not limited to, determinations of the diseases and abnormal conditions of the human eye and its adnexa which may be treated by TPA-certified optometrists, 380 381 treatment guidelines, and the drugs specified on the TPA-Formulary. In establishing standards of 382 instruction and training, the Board shall consult with a school or college of optometry and a school or 383 college of medicine and shall set a minimum number of hours of clinical training to be supervised by an 384 ophthalmologist. The didactic and clinical training programs may include, but need not be limited to, 385 programs offered or designed either by schools of medicine or schools or colleges of optometry or both 386 or some combination thereof.

387 The Board may prepare, administer, and grade appropriate examinations for the certification of
388 optometrists to administer therapeutic pharmaceutical agents or may contract with a school of medicine,
389 school or college of optometry, or other institution or entity to develop, administer, and grade the
390 examinations.

391 In order to maintain a current and appropriate list of therapeutic pharmaceuticals on the 392 TPA-Formulary, current and appropriate treatment guidelines, and current and appropriate 393 determinations of diseases and abnormal conditions of the eve and its adnexa which may be treated by 394 TPA-certified optometrists, the Board may, from time to time, amend such regulations. Such regulations 395 shall be exempt from the requirements of the Administrative Process Act (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.), except to 396 any extent that they may be specifically made subject to §§ 9-6.14:14.1, 9-6.14:21, and 9-6.14:22; the 397 Board's regulations shall, however, comply with § 9-6.18 of the Virginia Register Act (§ 9-6.15 et seq.). 398 The Board shall, however, conduct a public hearing prior to making amendments to the TPA-Formulary, 399 the treatment guidelines or the determinations of diseases and abnormal conditions of the eye and its 400 adnexa which may be treated by TPA-certified optometrists. Thirty days prior to conducting such 401 hearing, the Board shall give written notice by mail of the date, time, and place of the hearing to all 402 currently TPA-certified optometrists and any other persons requesting to be notified of the hearings and 403 publish notice of its intention to amend the list in the Virginia Register of Regulations. During the public hearing, interested parties shall be given reasonable opportunity to be heard and present information prior to final adoption of any TPA-Formulary amendments. Proposed and final amendments 404 405 of the list shall also be published, pursuant to § 9-6.14:22, in the Virginia Register of Regulations. Final 406 407 amendments to the TPA-Formulary shall become effective upon filing with the Registrar of Regulations. 408 The TPA-Formulary shall be the inclusive list of the therapeutic pharmaceutical agents that a 409 TPA-certified optometrist may prescribe.

410 B. To assist in the specification of the TPA-Formulary [- the Board shall appoint a seven-member 411 TPA-Formulary Committee consisting of three Virginia TPA-certified optometrists, one pharmacist 412 licensed in Virginia, two ophthalmologists licensed in Virginia, and one member of the Board who shall 413 serve as chair of the Committee, there shall be a seven-member TPA-Formulary Committee, as follows: 414 three Virginia TPA-certified optometrists to be appointed by the Board of Optometry, one pharmacist to 415 be appointed by the Board of Pharmacy from among its licensees, two ophthalmologists appointed by 416 the Board of Medicine from among its licensees, and the chairman who shall be appointed by the Board 417 of Optometry from among its members. The ophthalmologists appointed by the Board of Medicine shall 418 have demonstrated, through professional experience, knowledge of the optometric profession. In the 419 event the Board of Pharmacy or the Board of Medicine fails to make appointments to the 420 TPA-Formulary Committee within thirty days following July 1, 1996, or within thirty days following any 421 subsequent vacancy, the Board of Optometry shall appoint such members.

422 The TPA-Formulary Committee shall recommend to the Board those therapeutic pharmaceutical
423 agents to be included on the TPA-Formulary for the treatment of certain diseases and abnormal
424 conditions of the eye and its adnexa by TPA-certified optometrists.

425 § 54.1-3224. Denial, etc., of TPA-certification; disciplinary actions.

426 The Board of Optometry may deny, refuse to renew, revoke, or suspend any TPA-certificate issued to
427 a TPA-certified optometrist, or applied for by a licensed optometrist in accordance with the provisions
428 of this article, or may discipline or reprimand any certificate holder for violations of this chapter or the

429 Board's regulations.

430 § 54.1-3401. Definitions.

431 As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

432 "Administer" means the direct application of a controlled substance, whether by injection, inhalation, 433 ingestion or any other means, to the body of a patient or research subject by (i) a practitioner or by his 434 authorized agent and under his direction, or (ii) the patient or research subject at the direction and in the 435 presence of the practitioner.

436 "Advertisement" means all representations disseminated in any manner or by any means, other than 437 by labeling, for the purpose of inducing, or which are likely to induce, directly or indirectly, the 438 purchase of drugs or devices.

"Anabolic steroid" means any drug or hormonal substance, chemically and pharmacologically related 439 to testosterone, other than estrogens, progestins, and corticosteroids, that promotes muscle growth. 440 441

"Animal" means any nonhuman animate being endowed with the power of voluntary action.

442 "Agent" means an authorized person who acts on behalf of or at the direction of a manufacturer, 443 distributor, or dispenser. It does not include a common or contract carrier, public warehouseman, or 444 employee of the carrier or warehouseman.

445 "Board" means the Board of Pharmacy.

446 "Compound" means the taking of two or more ingredients and fabricating them into a single 447 preparation, usually referred to as a dosage form.

448 'Controlled substance" means a drug, substance or immediate precursor in Schedules I through VI of 449 this chapter. The term shall not include distilled spirits, wine, malt beverages, or tobacco as those terms 450 are defined or used in Title 3.1 or Title 4.1.

"Cosmetic" means all articles intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled or sprayed on, introduced into 451 or otherwise applied to the human body for cleansing, beautifying, promoting attractiveness or altering 452 453 the appearance, and articles intended for use as a component of any such articles except soap.

454 "DEA" means the Drug Enforcement Administration, United States Department of Justice, or its successor agency. 455

"Deliver" or "delivery" means the actual, constructive, or attempted transfer of any item regulated by 456 457 this chapter, whether or not there exists an agency relationship.

458 "Device" means instruments, apparatus, and contrivances, including their components, parts and 459 accessories, intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in 460 man or animals or to affect the structure or any function of the body of man or animals.

461 "Dispense" means to deliver a drug to an ultimate user or research subject by or pursuant to the 462 lawful order of a practitioner, including the prescribing and administering, packaging, labeling or 463 compounding necessary to prepare the substance for that delivery. 464

"Dispenser" means a practitioner who dispenses. 465

"Distribute" means to deliver other than by administering or dispensing a controlled substance.

"Distributor" means a person who distributes.

"Drug" means (i) articles or substances recognized in the official United States Pharmacopoeia 467 468 National Formulary or official Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or any supplement to 469 any of them; (ii) articles or substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or 470 prevention of disease in man or animals; (iii) articles or substances, other than food, intended to affect 471 the structure or any function of the body of man or animals; or (iv) articles or substances intended for 472 use as a component of any article specified in clause (i), (ii) or (iii). "Drug" does not include devices or 473 their components, parts or accessories.

474 "Hashish oil" means any oily extract containing one or more cannabinoids, but shall not include any 475 such extract with a tetrahydrocannabinol content of less than twelve percent by weight.

"Immediate precursor" means a substance which the Board of Pharmacy has found to be and by 476 477 regulation designates as being the principal compound commonly used or produced primarily for use, 478 and which is an immediate chemical intermediary used or likely to be used in the manufacture of a 479 controlled substance, the control of which is necessary to prevent, curtail, or limit manufacture.

480 "Label" means a display of written, printed or graphic matter upon the immediate container of any 481 article. A requirement made by or under authority of this chapter that any word, statement or other information appear on the label shall not be considered to be complied with unless such word, statement 482 483 or other information also appears on the outside container or wrapper, if any, of the retail package of such article, or is easily legible through the outside container or wrapper. 484

485 "Labeling" means all labels and other written, printed or graphic matter on an article or any of its 486 containers or wrappers, or accompanying such article.

"Manufacture" means the production, preparation, propagation, compounding, conversion or processing of any item regulated by this chapter, either directly or indirectly by extraction from 487 488 489 substances of natural origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of 490 extraction and chemical synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or

491 labeling or relabeling of its container. This term does not include the preparing, compounding, 492 packaging or labeling of a controlled substance by a practitioner as an incident to his administering or 493 dispensing of a controlled substance or marijuana in the course of his professional practice, or by a 494 practitioner, or by his authorized agent under his supervision, for the purpose of, or as an incident to, 495 research, teaching, or chemical analysis and not for sale.

496 "Manufacturer" means every person who manufactures.

497 "Marijuana" means any part of a plant of the genus Cannabis whether growing or not, its seeds or 498 resin; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such plant, its seeds, 499 or its resin. Marijuana shall not include any oily extract containing one or more cannabinoids unless 500 such extract contains less than twelve percent of tetrahydrocannabinol by weight, or the mature stalks of 501 such plant, fiber produced from such stalk, oil or cake made from the seeds of such plant, any other 502 compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of such mature stalks, fiber, oil, or cake, 503 or the sterilized seed of such plant which is incapable of germination.

504 "Medical equipment supplier" means any person, as defined in § 1-13.19, engaged in the delivery to 505 the ultimate consumer, pursuant to the lawful order of a practitioner, of hypodermic syringes and 506 needles, medicinal oxygen, Schedule VI controlled devices, and those Schedule VI controlled substances 507 with no medicinal properties which are used for the operation and cleaning of medical equipment.

508 "Narcotic drug" means any of the following, whether produced directly or indirectly by extraction 509 from substances of vegetable origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a 510 combination of extraction and chemical synthesis: (i) opium, opiates, and any salt, compound, derivative, 511 or preparation of opium or opiates; (ii) any salt, compound, isomer, derivative, or preparation thereof 512 which is chemically equivalent or identical with any of the substances referred to in clause (i), but not 513 including the isoquinoline alkaloids of opium; (iii) opium poppy and poppy straw; (iv) coca leaves and any salt, compound, derivative, or preparation of coca leaves, and any salt, compound, isomer, 514 derivative, or preparation thereof which is chemically equivalent or identical with any of these 515 516 substances, but not including decocainized coca leaves or extraction of coca leaves which do not contain 517 cocaine or ecgonine.

518 "New drug" means: (i) any drug, except a new animal drug or an animal feed bearing or containing 519 a new animal drug, the composition of which is such that such drug is not generally recognized, among 520 experts qualified by scientific training and experience to evaluate the safety and effectiveness of drugs, 521 as safe and effective for use under the conditions prescribed, recommended, or suggested in the labeling, 522 except that such a drug not so recognized shall not be deemed to be a "new drug" if at any time prior 523 to the enactment of this chapter it was subject to the Food and Drugs Act of June 30, 1906, as 524 amended, and if at such time its labeling contained the same representations concerning the conditions 525 of its use; or (ii) any drug, except a new animal drug or an animal feed bearing or containing a new 526 animal drug, the composition of which is such that such drug, as a result of investigations to determine 527 its safety and effectiveness for use under such conditions, has become so recognized, but which has not, 528 otherwise than in such investigations, been used to a material extent or for a material time under such 529 conditions.

530 'Official compendium" means the official United States Pharmacopoeia National Formulary, official 531 Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or any supplement to any of them.

532 "Official written order" means an order written on a form provided for that purpose by the United 533 States Drug Enforcement Administration, under any laws of the United States making provision therefor, 534 if such order forms are authorized and required by federal law, and if no such order form is provided 535 then on an official form provided for that purpose by the Board of Pharmacy.

536 "Opiate" means any substance having an addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability similar to 537 morphine or being capable of conversion into a drug having such addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability. It does not include, unless specifically designated as controlled under Article 4 (§ 54.1-3437 et seq.) of this chapter, the dextrorotatory isomer of 538 539 3-methoxy-n-methylmorphinan and its salts (dextromethorphan). It does include its racemic and 540 541 levorotatory forms. 542

"Opium poppy" means the plant of the species Papaver somniferum L., except the seeds thereof.

543 "Original package" means the unbroken container or wrapping in which any drug or medicine is 544 enclosed together with label and labeling, put up by or for the manufacturer, wholesaler, or distributor 545 for use in the delivery or display of such article.

"Person" means both the plural and singular, as the case demands, and includes individual, 546 547 partnership, corporation, association, governmental agency, trust, or other institution or entity.

548 "Poppy straw" means all parts, except the seeds, of the opium poppy, after mowing.

549 "Practitioner" means a physician, dentist, licensed nurse practitioner pursuant to § 54.1-2957.01, licensed physician's assistant pursuant to § 54.1-2952.1, TPA-certified optometrist pursuant to Article 5 550 (§ 54.1-3222 et seq.) of Chapter 32 of this Title, veterinarian, scientific investigator, or other person 551

552 licensed, registered or otherwise permitted to distribute, dispense, prescribe and administer, or conduct

553 research with respect to, a controlled substance in the course of professional practice or research in this 554 Commonwealth.

555 "Prescription" means an order for drugs or medical supplies, written or signed or transmitted by word 556 of mouth, telephone, telegraph or other means of communication to a pharmacist by a duly licensed 557 physician, dentist, veterinarian or other practitioner, authorized by law to prescribe and administer such 558 drugs or medical supplies.

559 "Prescription drug" means any drug required by federal law or regulation to be dispensed only 560 pursuant to a prescription, including finished dosage forms and active ingredients subject to § 503 (b) of 561 the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

"Production" or "produce" includes the manufacture, planting, cultivation, growing or harvesting of a 562 controlled substance or marijuana. 563

564 "Proprietary medicine" means a completely compounded nonprescription drug in its unbroken, 565 original package which does not contain any controlled substance or marijuana as defined in this chapter and is not in itself poisonous, and which is sold, offered, promoted or advertised directly to the general 566 public by or under the authority of the manufacturer or primary distributor, under a trademark, trade 567 568 name or other trade symbol privately owned, and the labeling of which conforms to the requirements of 569 this chapter and applicable federal law. However, this definition shall not include a drug which is only 570 advertised or promoted professionally to licensed practitioners, a narcotic or drug containing a narcotic, 571 a drug which may be dispensed only upon prescription or the label of which bears substantially the statement "Warning - may be habit-forming," or a drug intended for injection. "Sale" includes barter, exchange, or gift, or offer therefor, and each such transaction made by any 572

573 574 person, whether as individual, proprietor, agent, servant or employee.

575 "Warehouser" means any person, other than a wholesale distributor, engaged in the business of 576 selling or otherwise distributing prescription drugs or devices to any person who is not the ultimate user 577 or consumer. No person shall be subject to any state or local tax by reason of this definition.

578 "Wholesale distribution" means distribution of prescription drugs to persons other than consumers or 579 patients, subject to the exceptions set forth in § 54.1-3401.1.

580 "Wholesale distributor" means any person engaged in wholesale distribution of prescription drugs 581 including, but not limited to, manufacturers; repackers; own-label distributors; private-label distributors; 582 jobbers; brokers; warehouses, including manufacturers' and distributors' warehouses, chain drug 583 warehouses conducting wholesale distributions, and wholesale drug warehouses; independent wholesale 584 drug traders; and retail pharmacies conducting wholesale distributions. No person shall be subject to any 585 state or local tax as a wholesale merchant by reason of this definition.

The words "drugs" and "devices" as used in Chapter 33 (§ 54.1-3300 et seq.) of this title and in this 586 587 chapter shall not include surgical or dental instruments, physical therapy equipment, X-ray apparatus or glasses or lenses for the eyes. 588

The terms "pharmacist," "pharmacy" and "practice of pharmacy" as used in this chapter shall be 589 590 defined as provided in Chapter 33 of this title unless the context requires a different meaning.

591 2. That §§ 54.1-2957.1, 54.1-2957.2 and 54.1-2957.3 of the Code of Virginia are repealed.

3. That the regulations of the Board of Medicine relating to TPA-certified optometrists as in effect 592 593 on January 1, 1996, shall continue in effect and shall be deemed to be the regulations of the Board 594 of Optometry until such time as the Board of Optometry shall adopt valid regulations pursuant to 595 this provision and the Board of Optometry regulations shall become effective. The Board of 596 Optometry shall have sole authority to regulate all aspects of the scope of optometry practice.

597 4. That, on the effective date of this act, the Board of Optometry shall be deemed to be the 598 successor in interest to the Board of Medicine to the extent this act transfers certain powers and 599 duties for the certification of optometrists to administer therapeutic pharmaceutical agents; all rightful title and interest in and records for such TPA-certification of optometrists vested in the 600 601 Board of Medicine prior to such effective date shall be transferred to and shall be deemed to be 602 standing in the name of the Board of Optometry.

603 5. That the Director of the Department of Health Professions is authorized, from the effective date 604 of this act, to transfer funds between the Boards of Medicine and Optometry for the 605 reimbursement of outstanding expenses associated with TPA certification of optometrists.
