CHAPTER 49.

VIRGINIA GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION AUTHORITY.

129 § 9-371. Definitions.

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130 As used in this chapter:

131 "Attribute data" means geographically referenced data that can be linked to base map data. Attribute
132 data provide descriptive information (graphic or nongraphic) about people, places or things that can be
133 linked to an area or a specific location.

134 "Authority" means the political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia created by this chapter.
 135 "Base map data" means the digitized common geographic data that are used by most geographic
 136 information systems applications to reference or link attribute or other geographic data.

137 "Board" means the board of directors of the Authority.

138 "Board of directors" means a group of individuals who provide oversight and policy direction to the
139 activities of the Authority as set forth in § 9-376.

140 "Digital orthophoto" means an image that contains coordinate information that can be
 141 geographically referenced. It is developed from aerial photography and can be used as a base map or
 142 as a consistent base to create other base map data.

143 "Geographic data" means data that contain either coordinates that reference a geographic location
144 or area or attribute data that can be related to a geographic area or location.

145 "Geographic information system (GIS)" means a computerized system that stores and links
146 geographic data to allow a wide range of information processing and display operations, as well as
147 map production, analysis, and modeling.

148 "Hydrography" means the description of bodies of water, such as lakes, rivers, and streams.

149 "Map scale" means the ratio of units of linear measurement on a map to units of measurement on
150 the earth, expressed as a ratio (e.g., 1:12,000) or in specific units of measurement (e.g., 1"=100' or one
151 inch equals 100 feet).

152 "Topographic features" means features that define elevation, including contour lines, point elevations,
 153 and elevation values.

154 § 9-372. Authority created; purpose.

155 There is hereby created, as a political subdivision of the Commonwealth, the Virginia Geographic 156 Information Authority.

157 The Virginia Geographic Information Authority shall oversee the development of standards and
158 procedures relating to the acquisition, storage, or use of geographic or base map data, procure or
159 acquire statewide base map data, coordinate the development or purchase of priority geographic or
160 base map data, and foster the creative utilization of geographic information via the timely distribution of
161 statewide base map data to state agencies and local and regional governments.

162 § 9-373. Data development.

A. The Authority shall maintain, store, and distribute, in the most cost-effective manner feasible, a
shared repository and catalog of Virginia geographic data. An initial statewide digital base map shall
be prepared for the Commonwealth at the 1:12,000 scale. Additional digital base maps may be prepared
as the Authority deems necessary.

167 *B.* Statewide base map data shall be developed according to priority categories, including:

168 *1. Transportation*,

169 *2. Hydrography,*

170 *3. Topography,*

- 171 *4. Political boundaries, and*
- 172 5. Geodetic survey control.

173 C. Any other geographic data product that is identified by the Authority may be considered a 174 high-priority geographic data category if it is deemed as such by the board of directors. Otherwise, any 175 such product shall be considered special to particular applications and shall not take precedence over the timely and expedient development of the five high-priority data categories identified above. Products 176 177 that are required for particular applications or that require immediate development may be developed at 178 the discretion of the requesting agency. Such products, if not exempt from the Freedom of Information 179 Act (§ 2.1-340 et seq.), shall be reported to the Authority to be included in the inventory of state **180** geographic information resources.

181 § 9-374. Board of directors.

182 A. The Authority shall be governed by a board of directors consisting of fifteen members appointed

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183 as follows: (i) ten members to be appointed by the Governor, including: three state agency officials, one 184 from the Virginia Economic Development Partnership, one from the Virginia Department of 185 Transportation, and one from a state university; two elected officials of localities in the Commonwealth; 186 one elected official who serves on a planning district commission; two representatives of utilities or 187 transportation industries utilizing geographic data; and two representatives of private businesses with 188 expertise and experience in the establishment, operation, and maintenance of geographic information 189 systems, and (ii) five members of the General Assembly, three of whom shall be members of the House 190 of Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates, and two of whom shall be members of the Senate, to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections. Any 191 192 representatives of private businesses who are providers of geographic information services, and their 193 companies, are precluded from contracting to provide goods or services to the Authority.

B. The gubernatorial appointees to the board of directors shall serve five-year terms, except that three initial appointees shall serve three-year terms, three shall serve four-year terms, and four shall 194 195 196 serve five-year terms. Directors appointed by the Governor shall serve no more than two consecutive 197 full terms. All members of the board of directors appointed by the Governor shall be confirmed by each 198 house of the General Assembly.

199 C. The terms of General Assembly members appointed to the board of directors shall be coincident 200 with their service in the house from which appointed.

201 D. Vacancies among the gubernatorial appointees to the board of directors shall be filled by 202 appointment of the Governor for the unexpired portion of the term. Vacancies among General Assembly 203 members shall be filled by the Speaker of the House of Delegates, for House of Delegate members, and 204 by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections, for Senate members.

E. The board shall establish a fifteen-member technical advisory committee, comprised of the following: the Director of the Council on Information Management or his designee; one member of the 205 206 207 Virginia State Bar; one member of the Virginia Association of Land Surveyors; three employees of state agencies that employ automated land information systems or geographic information systems; four 208 209 members of local governments, regional bodies, or planning district commissions that employ land 210 information systems or geographic information systems; two members representing private businesses 211 engaged in the sale or service of geographic information systems; one member representing users of 212 geographic information systems and products; and two members representing state universities. 213

§ 9-375. Executive director.

214 The board shall employ an executive director to administer, manage, and direct the affairs and 215 business of the Authority, subject to the policies, control, and direction of the board. The executive 216 director shall employ such other persons as he shall deem necessary to assist him in carrying out his 217 duties under this section. The executive director shall serve as an ex officio member of the board of 218 directors of the nonstock corporation established pursuant to § 9-380. 219

§ 9-376. Powers.

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220 The Authority is hereby granted and shall have and may exercise all powers necessary or convenient 221 for the carrying out of its statutory purposes, including the following rights and powers: 222

1. To sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, complain and defend in all courts.

2. To adopt, use, and alter at will a corporate seal.

224 3. To acquire, purchase, hold, use, lease or otherwise dispose of any project and property, real, 225 personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein necessary or desirable for carrying out 226 the purposes of the Authority, and, without limitation of the foregoing, to lease as lessee, any project 227 and any property, real, personal or mixed, or any interest therein, at such annual rental and on such 228 terms and conditions as may be determined by the board of the Authority and to lease as lessor to any 229 person, any project and any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein, at any time acquired by the Authority, whether wholly or partially completed, at such annual 230 231 rental and on such terms and conditions as may be determined by the board of the Authority, and to sell, transfer or convey any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible or any interest 232 233 therein, at any time acquired or held by the Authority on such terms and conditions as may be 234 determined by the board of the Authority.

235 4. To plan, develop, undertake, carry out, construct, improve, rehabilitate, repair, furnish, maintain, 236 and operate projects. 237

5. To make bylaws for the management and regulation of its affairs.

238 6. To fix, alter, charge, and collect rates, rentals, and other charges for the use or sale of projects 239 of, or services rendered by, the Authority, at rates to be determined by it for the purpose of (i)providing for the payment of the expenses of the Authority; (ii) the planning, development, construction, 240 241 improvement, rehabilitation, repair, furnishing, maintenance, and operation of its projects and 242 properties; (iii) the payment of the costs of accomplishing the purposes set forth in § 9-372; (iv) the 243 payment of the principal of and interest on its obligations; and (v) the fulfillment of the terms and provisions of any agreements made with the purchasers or holders of any such obligations. The 244

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245 Authority shall fund its operations, after start-up, from revenues generated from subscribers, sales, or
246 licensing and from money, goods, or in-kind services donated or contracted through private sources.
247 The Authority shall work to support and provide funding for state agency GIS needs.

248 7. To borrow money.

249 8. To make and enter into all contracts and agreements necessary or incidental to the performance
250 of its duties, the furtherance of its purposes and the execution of its powers under this chapter,
251 including agreements with any person or federal agency.

9. To employ, in its discretion, consultants, attorneys, photogrammetrists, surveyors, engineers,
accountants, financial experts, investment bankers, superintendents, managers and such other employees
and agents as may be necessary, and to fix their compensation to be payable from funds made available
to the Authority.

256 10. To receive and accept from any federal or private agency, foundation, corporation, association 257 or person grants to be expended in accomplishing the objectives of the Authority, and to receive and 258 accept from the Commonwealth or any state, and any municipality, county or other political subdivision 259 thereof and from any other source, aid or contributions of either money, property, or other things of 260 value, to be held, used and applied only for the purposes for which such grants and contributions may 261 be made. The Authority may apply for and accept any gifts, grants, loan guarantees, loans of funds or property, or financial or other aid in any form from the federal government or any agency or 262 263 instrumentality thereof; from the state or any agency or instrumentality thereof; or from any other 264 source for any or all of the purposes specified in this chapter. The Authority shall comply, subject to the 265 provisions of this chapter, with the terms and conditions thereof.

266 11. To pledge or otherwise encumber all or any of the revenues or receipts of the Authority as **267** security for all or any of the obligations of the Authority.

12. To receive, administer, and market any interest in patents, copyrights and materials which are
potentially patentable or copyrightable. Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to effect a transfer of
ownership of any data from any state agency, institution, board, bureau, commission, or council to the
Authority, unless so authorized by such state agency, institution, board, bureau, commission, or council.

272 13. To formulate recommendations for conventions and standards for developing, acquiring, storing,
 273 sharing, and distributing geographic data.

14. To coordinate the procurement of base map and other geographic data products, with particular
emphasis on state-level activities related to this chapter, and to foster the development of a coordinated
comprehensive system for providing ready access to electronic state government geographic data
products for individuals, businesses, and other entities.

15. To provide advice and guidance on all agreements and contracts of entities from all branches of
state government for geographic data acquisition and design and the installation and maintenance of
geographic information systems. Agencies of the Commonwealth shall not purchase or procure
geographic data products that substantially duplicate any data products developed by or available
through the Authority pursuant to § 9-373 or any other provisions of this chapter.

283 16. To acquire, lease, or construct such facilities and equipment as necessary to fulfill the duties of
 284 the Authority.

285 17. To provide technical assistance to public and/or private sector organizations in such areas as (i) 286 acquisition of geographic data products; (ii) design, procurement, installation, management, and 287 maintenance of geographic information systems; (iii) technical training and demonstrations to local 288 professional groups, such as police departments, assessors, utility companies, and planners; (iv) creation 289 and promulgation of standards, specifications, procedures, and techniques related to manipulation and 290 management of geographic data; (v) effecting economies in the acquisition of geographic data and 291 geographic information systems; and (vi) planning and forecasting needs for geographic and base map 292 data and related services.

293 § 9-377. Moneys received deemed trust funds.

All moneys received pursuant to the authority of this chapter shall be deemed to be trust funds to be held and applied solely as provided in this chapter. Any resolution authorizing the bonds of any issue or the trust agreement securing such bonds shall provide that any officer with whom, or any bank or trust company with which, such moneys shall be deposited shall act as a trustee of such moneys and shall hold and apply the same for the purposes hereof, subject to such regulations as this chapter and such resolution or trust agreement may provide.

300 § 9-378. Grants or loans of public or private funds.

301 The Authority is authorized to accept, receive, receipt for, disburse, and expend federal and state 302 moneys and other moneys, public or private, made available by grant or loan or both or otherwise, to 303 accomplish, in whole or in part, any of the purposes of this chapter. All federal moneys accepted under 304 this section shall be accepted and expended by the Authority upon such terms and conditions as are 305 prescribed by the United States and as are consistent with state law, and all state moneys accepted 306 under this section shall be accepted and expended by the Authority upon such terms and conditions as 307 are prescribed by the Commonwealth.

308 § 9-379. Exemption from taxes or assessments.

309 The exercise of the powers granted by this chapter shall be in all respects for the benefit of the 310 people of the Commonwealth, for the increase of their commerce and prosperity, and for the 311 improvement of their health and living conditions, and as the operation and maintenance of projects by 312 the Authority and the undertaking of activities in furtherance of the purpose of the Authority will 313 constitute the performance of essential governmental functions, the Authority shall not be required to 314 pay any taxes or assessments upon any project or any property acquired or used by the Authority under 315 the provisions of this chapter or upon the income therefrom, including sales and use taxes on tangible personal property used in the operations of the Authority, and any bonds issued under the provisions of 316 317 this chapter, their transfer and the income therefrom (including any profit made on the sale thereof) 318 shall at all times be free from state and local taxation. The exemption hereby granted shall not be 319 construed to extend to persons conducting on the premises of a facility businesses for which local or 320 state taxes would otherwise be required. 321

§ 9-380. Auxiliaries.

322 A. The Authority shall establish a nonstock corporation to carry out the purposes of this chapter. 323 The board of directors of the nonstock corporation shall consist of fifteen members, to be appointed by 324 the board of directors of the Authority. However, neither General Assembly members nor any other 325 elected officials serving on the board of the Authority shall serve on the board of directors of the 326 nonstock corporation. The articles of incorporation of the nonstock corporation shall provide that upon 327 dissolution the net assets of the corporation shall be transferred to the Commonwealth of Virginia. The 328 nonstock corporation shall ensure that the economic benefits attributable to the income and property 329 rights arising from any transactions in which the nonstock corporation is involved are allocated on a basis which is equitable in the reasonable business judgment of the board of directors, with due account 330 331 being given to the interest of the citizens of the Commonwealth and the needs of the nonstock 332 corporation. The nonstock corporation shall not be deemed to be a state or governmental agency, 333 advisory agency, public body or agency or instrumentality for purposes of Chapters 10 (§ 2.1-110 et 334 seq.), 13 (§ 2.1-153 et seq.), 14 (§ 2.1-173 et seq.), 18 (§ 2.1-327 et seq.), 21 (§ 2.1-340 et seq.), 23 335 (§ 2.1-359 et seq.), 26 (§ 2.1-377 et seq.) and 40.1 (§ 2.1-639.1 et seq.) of Title 2.1; Chapter 7 (§ 11-35 336 et seq.) of Title 11; and Chapter 1 (§ 51.1-124.1 et seq.) of Title 51.1, nor shall any director, officer or 337 employee of the nonstock corporation be deemed to be an officer or employee for purposes of Chapter 338 40.1 (§ 2.1-639.1 et seq.) of Title 2.1. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Auditor of Public Accounts, or 339 his legally authorized representatives, shall annually audit the financial accounts of the Authority and 340 the nonstock corporation; however, the working papers and files of the Auditor of Public Accounts relating to such audits shall not be subject to the provisions of Chapter 21 (§ 2.1-340 et seq.) of Title 341 342 2.1.

343 B. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection A of this section, as an entity receiving state funds, 344 the nonstock corporation shall be subject to periodic external review either (i) under the provisions of 345 the Legislative Program Review and Evaluation Act (§ 30-64 et seq.) or (ii) by an entity appointed for 346 that purpose by the Governor. The nonstock corporation shall be deemed to be an institution of higher 347 education within the meaning of §§ 23-3.1 and 23-9.2, but only for the limited purposes therein stated.

348 C. The board of directors of the nonstock corporation shall submit quarterly reports, including 349 financial statements, to the board of directors of the Authority, the Governor, the House Committee on 350 Appropriations, and the Senate Committee on Finance. 351

§ 9-381. Exemption of Authority from personnel and procurement procedures.

The provisions of Chapter 10 (§ 2.1-110 et seq.) of Title 2.1 and Chapter 7 (§ 11-35 et seq.) of Title 11 shall not apply to the Authority in the exercise of any power conferred under this chapter.

§ 9-382. Moneys of Authority.

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All moneys of the Authority, from whatever source derived, shall be paid to the treasurer of the 355 356 Authority. Such moneys shall be deposited in the first instance by the treasurer in one or more banks or 357 trust companies, in one or more special accounts. All banks and trust companies are authorized to give 358 security for such deposits, if required by the Authority. The moneys in such accounts shall be paid out 359 on the warrant or other order of the treasurer of the Authority or of other person or persons as the 360 Authority may authorize to execute such warrants or orders. The Auditor of Public Accounts of the 361 Commonwealth, or his legally authorized representatives, shall examine the accounts and books of the 362 Authority. 363

§ 9-383. Title to property.

364 The Authority may acquire title to property in its own name or in the name of the Commonwealth 365 for and on behalf of the Authority.
