AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Education and Health
on February 13, 1997)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Weatherholtz)

*A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 15.1-1682 and 19.2-389 of the Code of Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding a section numbered 37.1-197.2, relating to background checks.***Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:****1. That §§ 15.1-1682 and 19.2-389 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 37.1-197.2 as follows:**

§ 15.1-1682. Behavioral health authorities; powers and duties.

Every authority shall be deemed to be a public instrumentality, exercising public and essential governmental functions to provide for the public mental health, welfare, convenience and prosperity of the residents and such other persons who might be served by the authority and to provide behavioral health care and related services to such residents and persons. An authority is authorized to exercise the following powers:

1. Review and evaluate all existing and proposed public community mental health, mental retardation, and substance abuse services and facilities available to serve the community and such private services and facilities as receive funds through the authority and advise the locality as to its findings.

2. Within amounts allocated by local, state, federal, Medicaid, and other payers, execute programs and services for consumers in need.

3. Make and enter into all contracts or agreements, as the authority may determine, which are necessary or incidental to the performance of its duties and to the execution of powers granted by this chapter, including contracts with any federal agency, the Commonwealth, or with any unit thereof, behavioral health providers, insurers, and managed care/health care networks on such terms and conditions as the authority may approve.

4. Make rules or regulations concerning the rendition or operation of services and facilities under its direction or supervision, subject to applicable standards or regulations promulgated by the State Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services Board.

5. Appoint a chief executive officer of the behavioral health authority and prescribe his duties. The compensation of such chief executive officer shall be fixed by the authority and he shall serve at the pleasure of the authority.

6. Empower the chief executive officer to maintain a complement of professional staff to operate the behavioral health authority's service delivery system.

7. Prescribe a reasonable schedule of fees for services provided by personnel or facilities under the jurisdiction or supervision of the authority and collection of the same. Every authority shall institute a reimbursement system to maximize the collection of fees from persons receiving services under the jurisdiction or supervision of the authority consistent with the provisions of § 37.1-202.1 and from responsible third-party payers.

8. Accept loans, grants or assistance from the federal government, the Commonwealth, any municipality thereof, or from any other sources, public or private, to carry out any of its purposes and enter into any agreement or contract regarding or relating to the acceptance or use or repayment of any such loan, grant or assistance.

9. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, disburse funds allocated to it in accordance with applicable regulations.

10. Develop joint annual written agreements, consistent with policies and procedures established by the State Board, with local school divisions; health departments; boards of social services; housing agencies, where they exist; courts; sheriffs; area agencies on aging and regional Department of Rehabilitative Services offices. The agreements shall specify what services will be provided to consumers. All participating agencies shall develop and implement the agreements and shall review the agreements annually.

11. Fulfill all other duties specified in the Code of Virginia pertaining to community services boards including: § 37.1-65.1 - judicial certification of eligibility for admission of mentally retarded persons; §§ 37.1-67.1 through 37.1-67.6 - involuntary detention; § 37.1-197.1 - prescription team; § 37.1-197.2 - background checks; § 37.1-198 - plans and budgets; § 37.1-199 - allocation of funds by the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation, and Substance Abuse Services; and § 37.1-202.1 - consumer liability for expenses of services.

12. Fulfill all applicable rules, regulations and standards pertaining to the rendition of mental health, mental retardation, and substance abuse services including, but not limited to, confidentiality, human

60 research assurances, service and facility licensing, and client rights' protection.

61 13. As a public instrumentality, ensure compliance with all applicable organizational and
62 administrative rules, regulations and standards pertaining to human resources; equal employment; fair
63 labor practices; public procurement; risk management; and governmental finance and accounting
64 requirements.

65 14. Make loans and provide other assistance to corporations, partnerships, associations, joint ventures
66 or other entities in carrying out any activities authorized by this chapter.

67 15. Transact its business, locate its offices and control, directly or through stock or nonstock
68 corporations or other entities, facilities that will assist the authority in carrying out the purposes and
69 intent of this chapter, including without limitations the power to own or operate, directly or indirectly,
70 behavioral health facilities in its service area.

71 16. Plan, design, construct, renovate, enlarge, equip, maintain and operate programs for the purpose
72 of providing behavioral health care and related services and other appropriate purposes.

73 17. Acquire property, real or personal, by purchase, gift, devise on such terms and conditions, and in
74 such manner as it may deem proper, and such rights, easements or estates therein as may be necessary
75 for its purposes, and sell, lease and dispose of the same, or any portion thereof or interest therein,
76 whenever it shall become expedient to do so.

77 18. Participate in joint ventures with individuals, corporations, partnerships, associations or other
78 entities for providing behavioral health care or related services or other activities that the authority may
79 undertake to the extent that such undertakings assist the authority in carrying out the purposes and intent
80 of this chapter.

81 19. Conduct or engage in any lawful business, activity, effort or project, necessary or convenient for
82 the purposes of the authority or for the exercise of any of its powers.

83 20. As a public instrumentality, operationalize its administrative management infrastructure in whole
84 or in part independent of the local governing body; however, nothing in the chapter precludes behavioral
85 health authorities from acquiring support services through existing government entities.

86 21. Operationalize capital improvements and bonding through existing economic or industrial
87 development authorities.

88 22. Establish retirement, group life insurance, and group accident and sickness insurance plans or
89 systems for its employees in the same manner as cities, counties and towns are permitted under
90 § 51.1-801.

91 23. Make an annual report to the State Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse
92 Services Board of the authority's activities.

93 24. Ensure a continuation of all client services during any transition period.

94 § 19.2-389. Dissemination of criminal history record information.

95 A. Criminal history record information shall be disseminated, whether directly or through an
96 intermediary, only to:

97 1. Authorized officers or employees of criminal justice agencies, as defined by § 9-169, for purposes
98 of the administration of criminal justice and the screening of an employment application or review of
99 employment by a criminal justice agency with respect to its own employees or applicants, and
100 dissemination to the Virginia Parole Board, pursuant to this subdivision, of such information on all
101 state-responsible inmates for the purpose of making parole determinations pursuant to subdivisions 1, 2,
102 3, and 5 of § 53.1-136 shall include collective dissemination by electronic means every thirty days;

103 2. Such other individuals and agencies which require criminal history record information to
104 implement a state or federal statute or executive order of the President of the United States or Governor
105 that expressly refers to criminal conduct and contains requirements and/or exclusions expressly based
106 upon such conduct, except that information concerning the arrest of an individual may not be
107 disseminated to a noncriminal justice agency or individual if an interval of one year has elapsed from
108 the date of the arrest and no disposition of the charge has been recorded and no active prosecution of
109 the charge is pending;

110 3. Individuals and agencies pursuant to a specific agreement with a criminal justice agency to provide
111 services required for the administration of criminal justice pursuant to that agreement which shall
112 specifically authorize access to data, limit the use of data to purposes for which given, and ensure the
113 security and confidentiality of the data;

114 4. Individuals and agencies for the express purpose of research, evaluative, or statistical activities
115 pursuant to an agreement with a criminal justice agency which shall specifically authorize access to data,
116 limit the use of data to research, evaluative, or statistical purposes, and ensure the confidentiality and
117 security of the data;

118 5. Agencies of state or federal government which are authorized by state or federal statute or
119 executive order of the President of the United States or Governor to conduct investigations determining
120 employment suitability or eligibility for security clearances allowing access to classified information;

121 6. Individuals and agencies where authorized by court order or court rule;

7. Agencies of any political subdivision of the Commonwealth for the conduct of investigations of applicants for public employment, permit, or license whenever, in the interest of public welfare or safety, it is necessary to determine under a duly enacted ordinance if the past criminal conduct of a person with a conviction record would be compatible with the nature of the employment, permit, or license under consideration;

8. Public or private agencies when and as required by federal or state law or interstate compact to investigate applicants for foster or adoptive parenthood subject to the restriction that the data shall not be further disseminated by the agency to any party other than a federal or state authority or court as may be required to comply with an express requirement of law for such further dissemination;

9. To the extent permitted by federal law or regulation, public service companies as defined in § 56-1, for the conduct of investigations of applicants for employment when such employment involves personal contact with the public or when past criminal conduct of an applicant would be incompatible with the nature of the employment under consideration;

10. The appropriate authority for purposes of granting citizenship and for purposes of international travel, including but not limited to, issuing visas and passports;

11. A person requesting a copy of his own criminal history record information as defined in § 9-169 at his cost, except that criminal history record information shall be supplied at no charge to a person who has applied to be a volunteer (i) with a Virginia affiliate of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America, (ii) with a volunteer fire company or volunteer rescue squad, (iii) as a court-appointed special advocate, or (iv) with the Volunteer Emergency Families for Children;

12. Administrators and board presidents of and applicants for licensure or registration as a child welfare agency as defined in § 63.1-195 for dissemination to the Commissioner of Social Services' representative pursuant to § 63.1-198 for the conduct of investigations with respect to employees of and volunteers at such facilities, caretakers, and other adults living in family day-care homes or homes approved by family day-care systems, and foster and adoptive parent applicants of private child-placing agencies, pursuant to § 63.1-198.1, subject to the restriction that the data shall not be further disseminated by the facility or agency to any party other than the data subject, the Commissioner of Social Services' representative or a federal or state authority or court as may be required to comply with an express requirement of law for such further dissemination;

13. The school boards of the Commonwealth for the purpose of screening individuals who are offered or who accept public school employment;

14. The State Lottery Department for the conduct of investigations as set forth in the State Lottery Law (§ 58.1-4000 et seq.);

15. Licensed nursing homes, hospitals and home care organizations for the conduct of investigations of applicants for compensated employment in licensed nursing homes pursuant to § 32.1-126.01, hospital pharmacies pursuant to § 32.1-126.02, and home care organizations pursuant to § 32.1-162.9:1, subject to the limitations set out in subsection E;

16. Licensed homes for adults, licensed district homes for adults, and licensed adult day-care centers for the conduct of investigations of applicants for compensated employment in licensed homes for adults pursuant to § 63.1-173.2, in licensed district homes for adults pursuant to § 63.1-189.1, and in licensed adult day-care centers pursuant to § 63.1-194.13, subject to the limitations set out in subsection F;

17. The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the conduct of investigations as set forth in § 4.1-103.1;

18. The State Board of Elections and authorized officers and employees thereof in the course of conducting necessary investigations with respect to registered voters, limited to any record of felony convictions;

19. The Commissioner of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services for those individuals who are committed to the custody of the Commissioner pursuant to §§ 19.2-169.2, 19.2-169.6, 19.2-176, 19.2-177.1, 19.2-182.2, 19.2-182.3, 19.2-182.8 and 19.2-182.9 for the purpose of placement, evaluation, and treatment planning;

20. Any alcohol safety action program certified by the Commission on the Virginia Alcohol Safety Action Program for (i) assessments of habitual offenders under § 46.2-360, (ii) interventions with first offenders under § 18.2-251, or (iii) services to offenders under § 18.2-266 or § 18.2-266.1;

21. Residential facilities for juveniles regulated or operated by the Department of Social Services, the Department of Education, or the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services for the purpose of determining applicants' fitness for employment or for providing volunteer or contractual services;

22. The Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services and facilities operated by the Department for the purpose of determining an individual's fitness for employment pursuant to departmental instructions;

23. Pursuant to § 22.1-296.3, the governing boards or administrators of private or parochial

185 24. *Executive directors of community services boards for the purpose of determining an individual's*

188 *determining an individual's fitness for employment pursuant to § 37.1-197.2;*

189 24-26. Other entities as otherwise provided by law.

190 Upon an ex parte motion of a defendant in a felony case and upon the showing that the records
191 requested may be relevant to such case, the court shall enter an order requiring the Central Criminal
192 Records Exchange to furnish the defendant, as soon as practicable, copies of any records of persons
193 designated in the order on whom a report has been made under the provisions of this chapter.

194 Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter to the contrary, upon a written request sworn to
195 before an officer authorized to take acknowledgments, the Central Criminal Records Exchange or the
196 criminal justice agency in cases of offenses not required to be reported to the Exchange, shall furnish a
197 copy of conviction data covering the person named in the request to the person making the request;
198 however, such person on whom the data is being obtained shall consent in writing, under oath, to the
199 making of such request. A person receiving a copy of his own conviction data may utilize or further
200 disseminate that data as he deems appropriate. In the event no conviction data is maintained on the data
201 subject, the person making the request shall be furnished at his cost a certification to that effect.

202 B. Use of criminal history record information disseminated to noncriminal justice agencies under this
203 section shall be limited to the purposes for which it was given and may not be disseminated further.

204 C. No criminal justice agency or person shall confirm the existence or nonexistence of criminal
205 history record information for employment or licensing inquiries except as provided by law.

206 D. Criminal justice agencies shall establish procedures to query the Central Criminal Records
207 Exchange prior to dissemination of any criminal history record information on offenses required to be
208 reported to the Central Criminal Records Exchange to ensure that the most up-to-date disposition data is
209 being used. Inquiries of the Exchange shall be made prior to any dissemination except in those cases
210 where time is of the essence and the normal response time of the Exchange would exceed the necessary
211 time period. A criminal justice agency to whom a request has been made for the dissemination of
212 criminal history record information that is required to be reported to the Central Criminal Records
213 Exchange may direct the inquirer to the Central Criminal Records Exchange for such dissemination.
214 Dissemination of information regarding offenses not required to be reported to the Exchange shall be
215 made by the criminal justice agency maintaining the record as required by § 15.1-135.1.

216 E. Criminal history information provided to licensed nursing homes, hospitals and to home care
217 organizations pursuant to subdivision A 15 shall be limited to the convictions on file with the Exchange
218 for any offense specified in §§ 32.1-126.01, 32.1-126.02 and 32.1-162.9:1.

219 F. Criminal history information provided to licensed adult care residences, licensed district homes for
220 adults, and licensed adult day-care centers pursuant to subdivision A 16 shall be limited to the
221 convictions on file with the Exchange for any offense specified in §§ 63.1-173.2, 63.1-189.1 or
222 § 63.1-194.13.

223 § 37.1-197.2. *Background checks required.*

224 A. *Every community services board and behavioral health authority shall, on and after July 1, 1997,*
225 *require any applicant who accepts employment in any direct client care position with the community*
226 *services board or behavioral health authority to submit to fingerprinting and provide personal*
227 *descriptive information to be forwarded through the Central Criminal Records Exchange to the Federal*
228 *Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for the purpose of obtaining national criminal history record information*
229 *regarding such applicant.*

230 *The Central Criminal Records Exchange, upon receipt of an individual's record or notification that*
231 *no record exists, shall submit a report to the requesting executive director of the community services*
232 *board or the behavioral health authority. If any applicant is denied employment because of information*
233 *appearing on the criminal history record and the applicant disputes the information upon which the*
234 *denial was based, the Central Criminal Records Exchange shall, upon request, furnish the applicant the*
235 *procedures for obtaining a copy of the criminal history record from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.*
236 *The information provided to the executive director of any community services board or behavioral*
237 *health authority shall not be disseminated except as provided in this section.*

238 B. *The community services boards and behavioral health authorities shall also require, as a*
239 *condition of employment for all such applicants, written consent and personal information necessary to*
240 *obtain a search of the registry of founded complaints of child abuse and neglect maintained by the*
241 *Department of Social Services pursuant to § 63.1-248.8.*

242 C. *The cost of obtaining the criminal history record and search of the child abuse and neglect*
243 *registry record shall be borne by the applicant, unless the community services board or behavioral*
244 *health authority, at its option, decides to pay such cost.*

245 *D. As used in this section, the term "direct client care position" means any position with a job*
246 *description that includes responsibility for (i) treatment, case management, health, safety, development*
247 *or well-being of a client, or (ii) immediately supervising a person in a position with such responsibility.*
