10	WHEREAS, the protection of individual property rights was a core concern of the framers of the
11	United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights, and was regarded by the framers as "the first object of
12	government"; and
13	WHEREAS, the framers designed the "just compensation clause" of the Constitution to bar
14	Government from forcing a small group to bear burdens that, in all fairness and justice, should be borne
15	by the public as a whole; and
16	WHEREAS, government may properly force individuals to give up the use of their property for the
17	common good, but only upon receipt of equitable compensation; and
18	WHEREAS, history proves that there is no greater foundation for a successful free society than
19	secure private property; and
20	WHEREAS, private property owners are being forced by federal policy to resort to lengthy and
21	expensive litigation, with uncertain results, to protect basic rights guaranteed by the Constitution; and
22	WHEREAS, some courts have failed to recognize the importance and centrality of private property
23	rights, have failed consistently to protect this fundamental right, and have implemented insurmountable
24	procedural and substantive legal barriers in pursuit of a taking claim; and
25	WHEREAS, the 1993 General Assembly adopted House Joint Resolution No. 624 calling for the
26	creation of a Joint Subcommittee To Study Governmental Actions Affecting Private Property Rights,
27 28	which was continued by HJR 74 (1994) and HJR 526 (1995), all of which have completed their work;
20 29	now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Virginia General Assembly call
29 30	on the United States Congress to pass legislation that implements the framers' intentions in adopting the
30 31	Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States by guaranteeing substantive protection for
32	private property; and, be it
33	RESOLVED FURTHER, That it is essential that Congress clarify that compensation is
33 34	constitutionally required whenever government takes for public purposes, by regulation or otherwise,
35	some part of an owner's land, or regulates so as to substantially diminish the value of the land; and, be
36	it
37	RESOLVED FURTHER, That property owners be able to pursue their compensation claims free of
38	complex, difficult-to-understand, and unduly burdensome procedural barriers, and to recover attorneys'
39	fees and any and all costs associated with pursuing their claims; and, be it
40	RESOLVED FURTHER, That it is essential to encourage, support, and promote the private
41	ownership of property and to ensure that the constitutional and legal rights of private property owners
42	are preserved as the framers intended; and, be it
43	RESOLVED FINALLY, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates prepare a copy of this resolution
44	for presentation to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the United States
45	Senate, and the Virginia Congressional Delegation to apprise them of the sense of the Virginia General
46	Assembly in this matter.
